## STARTS SUNDAY MIDNIGHT

### Early to Work, Early to Play By New Time Schedule

A light sampling of opinion on the daylight savings time change coming up Sunday, April 30, at midnight, found Hico businesses going along with the new time, but the poll also revealed a lack of understanding on the part of some people.

The time change, effective nationwide on the above date, will not greatly affect any of the merchants and individuals contacted. Most were happy about the extra hour of daylight at the end of the day.

In simple explanation, the change-over means that people will be going to work one hour earlier and quitting with one hour more of daylight. Businesses that formerly opened at 8 a.m. will actually be opening at 7 a.m., and if they have been closing at 5 p.m., the new time will be 4 p.m., by the sun.

Biggest reversal in schedule

was noted by First Methodist Church. Morning worship at the local church will begin at 9:45 instead of 10:45 as in the past. Reason for the change is that the pastor also serves churches at Fairy and Carlton. Sunday School will begin at 10:50 here. Morning worship at Fairy will be from 11:15 to 12. Night services will be at 7 p.m.

at Hico, and 8 p.m. at Carlton. Other churches will keep the same schedule as in the past.

Hico schools also will be starting one hour earlier, by the sun, but at the same time by the clock.

### Race Track, Drag Strip Planned Here

Paul Renneker of Richardson and Wilson Summers of Garland were in Hico last Friday making arrangements for start of construction of big-time auto race track and drag strip near here.

The two men have leased 40 acres of the Robert Dobbins place, formerly owned by Derwood Polk. The farm is located about four miles northeast of Hico.

The two men said construction was to start this past Wednesday on a quarter-mile steep-banked oval track, which will be sanctioned by the National Hot Rod Association. Also planned at the site is a 2600-foot drag strip. Later the pair said a rodeo arena would be constructed.

The race track will be patterned after Western speedway of Los Angeles, Calif., according to Renneker.

Tentative plans call for the oval to be finished by the third week in May, with the first racing program to be held the fourth week of that month.

During the racing season, regular programs will be staged at the track on Friday, Saturday and Sunday of each week with the season running to December, weather permitting.

Gray Qualifies in 3 Events. The regional track meet was also held at Stephenville Saturday with Dwain Gray qualifying for the state meet in three events.

Gray set a new record in the 120-yard high hurdles, won the 330-yard intermediate hurdles, and placed second in the shot put. He tallied 35 points, and was high point individual of the meet.

Gray skipped to a 14.9 clocking in the high hurdles, erasing the old regional mark of 15.1. State record in the hurdles event is 14.8 which Gray has tied twice this year.

In the intermediate hurdles, the Hico senior raced to a 40.5 clocking which established a record at the regional. It was a new event.

Gray also tossed the shotput past the 50-foot mark to qualify for the state meet.

# Fairy Community News

She was the former Miss of Hamilton, sister of the late Oscar Berry. She was buried by her husband and daughter. The family resided at 2200 N. Main in Cleburne for many years. We were very sorry we were unable to attend the services. She was a brother of the late Little Little of Fairy and lived near here. We used to visit occasionally when visit-

after the death of his parents. He was very polite and courteous, and will long be remembered by his friends. We extend sympathy to his daughter and family.

We doubt if there is scarcely a community in the county this week whose correspondent won't have a report of rain and hail, or both. At our home in Fairy our gauge showed 2.6 inches of rain which fell in a very short time. We also got some hail, but it was small, the largest not being larger than a nickel. However just two miles south, along the Agee mountains, hail fell the size of a half dollar and ruined most everything in its path and beat off all the fruit and damaged trees by breaking off timber. Then two miles farther south, storm winds struck, uprooting three large trees at the May place, the former Driver place. At the next dip winds struck at the Justin Bullard place uprooting a large tree and demolishing a garage near the house, badly damaging a new antennae they had put up recently. A gable roof was lifted from another small building. Good sized green peaches could be seen lying around the house, which had blown there from their orchard west of the home. Mrs. Bullard stated the wind was from the west. The increased cost of new houses in the last decade is accounted for partly by price increases, and partly by growing incomes capable of buying larger, better constructed, and better equipped houses. Other factors that cause variation in housing costs include location, size, type and quality.

The cost of land varies as much as does the cost of buildings. Great differences exist between the value of improved farm land and the value of the well situated lot with paved streets, sidewalks, water, gas and electricity.

The average cost of a new house will rise as much in the next ten years as it did in the last decade because of the continuous desire for land.

can mean dollars in your pocket through longer life of the garments. Here are some guidelines for storing "out of season" clothes that will help make them last longer. Wash or clean all clothing before storing. Brush clothes, turn pockets inside out, cuff sleeves, collars up to expose all parts of the garment. Have wool dry cleaned before storing. Soiled areas attacked first. Insecticides in various degrees of protection woolens. Clothing must be stored tightly sealed, airtight containers which hold in the vapors to prevent this type of treatment.

## WASHINGTON—

### As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—That painful day of April 15 is upon us again. (Out of great generosity, we are extended two days for Income Tax reporting since the 15th falls on Saturday).

It is at about this time that many people are concerned about the spending policies of their government. Anguished cries go up from Miami to Honolulu, from Maine to California. This is the time for direct complaint because we know where the pain is, but it should come at about every time an appropriation bill is passed.

One of the big troubles comes about by reason of piecemeal appropriations. There are about 12 principal appropriation bills, plus others from time to time for specific purposes and others called "supplemental." Supplemental appropriations simply means additional money to run to the end of the



fiscal year. Each department, agency, commission and bureau has its friends and supporters. To these supporters of projects and activities, it is the most important and, hence, it is difficult to see it all as a total except in the President's Budget, which is always misleading. Actually, there are three budgets and great misunderstandings of all of them.

The fact is that budgets have not been balanced but a very few times in the last three decades.

Fiscal sanity can only be brought about by a rising tide of public opinion. Individuals, organizations and areas of the country favor certain spending programs. In fact, it is obvious that every expenditure is favored by large parts of some segment of our population, or it would not be enacted. This

certain segment feels that this is the most important expenditure, and by each separate appropriation having its support, all of them are passed. Here, again no one sees the total.

Already this year the Congress has increased the National Debt limit by \$6 billion. In the months just ahead, it is likely that a request from the Executive will be made to increase the Debt by another \$2 billion to \$4 billion. Somewhere, sometime, there has got to be a stop. The assets of the Federal Government are sufficient to maintain its faith and credit, but if the time ever comes when faith and confidence are shaken in the Government's ability to pay, it will be a time of real trouble.

There are those who say that the obligations of the Federal Gov-

ernment are meaningless because we owe the debt to ourselves. This may be a good theory, but there is not very much which the Government has that we, as individuals, would want to buy, even with the inflated money itself creates. In reality, it comes down to the proposition of confidence in the ability of the Government to make its credit good.

Meanwhile, domestic spending is not being adjusted to bring the budget into balance. The cost of the war in Viet Nam places a burden upon the financial resources of our Country. This is an expense which must and can be met, but should require sacrifices of some other things which may, in themselves, be good, but should be put off until we can better afford them. We do this as individuals, and our

Government is the people. Since 1961, defense expenditures have risen by almost \$30 billion. During the same period, non-defense spending has risen by more than \$43 billion. Currently \$5 1/2 billion is called for in Defense spending over last year, compared to more than \$6 billion increase in non-defense expenditures for the same period.

The many demands upon the treasury of the United States, consequently, upon the American taxpayer, require that an order of priorities be established on spending.

The day will come when our government cannot continue to pile on debt while levying excessive taxes on its people and expect to enjoy economic health and stability.

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**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**  
By BILL McCUTCHEON

The seven-month drouth has been all but broken with good rains throughout April but the farmer's plight is still rough.

Several areas received hail that will cause the farmers to have to replant already late feed grains. After the long drouth most small grain crops were so poor that the damage to these crops was not of major importance.

The pecan budding and grafting season is in full swing. For those that were unable to attend the recent budding and grafting school I want to include some information on varieties and insect control on pecans.

The USDA pecan varieties developed at the Brownwood Experiment Station promise to do a lot for the pecan industry. The seven varieties already released are Barton, Comanche, Choctaw, Wichita, Apache, Sioux and Mohawk. Three of these will out-produce any standard variety in this area. They are the Wichita, Apache, and Sioux.

"Now let me hear you laugh, you said that it would tickle you if it rained a foot!"

These varieties are good producers commercially and have lots of quality. They can be sold as shelling or in-shell pecans.

If you are interested in a beautiful yard tree and good pecans as well, the Choctaw, Sioux and Mohawk would be a wise choice.

Chances are good for a bumper crop of pecans this year. The improved and native trees are setting good crops. There is one insect in particular that can put us out of the pecan business in a hurry and this is the Pecan Nut Casebearer.

The Casebearer must be controlled at a particular stage in his life cycle and this varies some each year. There is only a 6-7 day period usually when this insect can be controlled, thus timing is all important. This time is usually the last week in May, but entomologists warn that he may be a week or more early this year.

It is too early to set precise spraying dates as yet, but I will let you know as early as possible.

Several county sheep and goat raisers attended the field day at McGregor April 13. The morning tour of testing facilities and pens had to be cancelled because of rain but the demonstrations were explained in detail to the capacity crowd. Highlights of the program included supplemental feeding of Angora goats, lamb feeding results, performance testing of sheep and goats, an evaluation of drugs available for parasite control of sheep and goats, and multiple lambing programs.
