Fish For Farm Ponds Available Friday at County Seat

Bomer Harris of the Soil Conservation Service reported this week that about 125 farm ponds in this part of the Hamilton-Coryell SCD will receive 16,925 bass to stock ponds this Friday, May 12.

The Fish and Wildlife Service of the Department of Interior will be at Lawson's Gin in Hamilton at 11:15 a.m., according to a notice received from John Anderson, Hatchery Manager, Austin.

These fish will come to landowners in the Hico, Evant, Jonesboro and Pottsville area from Inks Lake Hatchery.

Each landowner that will receive fish should bring a clean container such as a 10-gallon milk can, almost filled with pond or creek water. Landowners are urged not to bring city water, as it might kill the small fish.

screams rang in the oak-paneled courtroom: "They're going to kill my son."

The trial took place three years ago during Holy Week—a circumstance that undoubtedly shaped the mood of the man on the bench. He says he believes it did.

Can't Forget.

"I shall never forget," said Judge Roberts the other day, "the sadness that touched the lives of those people."

The boy, David E. Williams, 18, had confessed to slaying Donna Jean Tweedt, 17, on Nov. 19, 1963, in her Sharpstown home.

"Each man, whether he wants to admit it," says Judge Roberts, "is affected by exposure to such tragedy."

This particular tragedy was brought more sharply into focus by the victim involved.

"The victim, the girl, was from a good hold family," recalls the judge. "So was the young man. And the parents of each were substantial and apparently respected in the community."

The boy said he killed her because she had refused to tell him what his own girl friend had confided to the Tweedt girl about him.

Attended Service.

On Good Friday—the trial was still in progress—Judge Roberts was invited by Judge Arnold Krichamer to hear Dr. Charles L. Allen at the First Methodist Church.

"Above the altar was a cross of lilies of the field," he re-

calls, "and Dr. Allen delivered a fine sermon. Then he requested the congregation to sing 'The Old Rugged Cross.'"

"I may never again feel that way," he says, "but that was an unforgettable moment. And I attribute it, of course, to a series of factors. A deep sense of sadness over the lives of the people at the trial. The girl had had so much to live for. The boy had ruined his life. The senseless nature of his act and its consequences have stayed with me and perhaps always will."

A jury found David Williams guilty and gave him life in prison, where he is now.

Met Parents.

After Judge Roberts left the Criminal Courts Building on his way to the Rice Hotel, that day, he ran into Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Tweedt, parents of the slain girl.

"We'd like to say something to you judge," said Tweedt, his voice calm.

"My wife and I just wanted a jury to decide what should happen to a person who would kill our daughter."

The judge recalls: "There was no animosity or bitterness in the father's voice. I got the impression he and his wife felt the ends of justice had been met."

Roberts earned his law degree at Baylor in 1949. He has a reverence for the profession.

"There is kinship, of course, in our profession," he says, "and

this makes it disturbing to have to sit on the bench at a trial for a lawyer accused of wrongdoing."

Heard Three Cases.

On three occasions, he's presided over the trial of an attorney accused of a criminal act or unethical practices. In each case the attorney was convicted and sent to prison or disbarred.

This is disquieting to him because "a lawyer, more than any other citizen, has a greater responsibility to obey the law."

Judge Roberts lives in the North Central Texas city of Hamilton. He bears the name of his father who was a country store-keeper in the village of Craw-

ford, a station on the Santa Fe Railway in western McLennan County.

As a visiting judge here and elsewhere in Texas, including Dallas, San Antonio and El Paso, he spends 10 weeks of each term on the road.

His wife, the former Gloria Stevens, a long-legged attractive blonde, quips:

"Just say about him: Have gavel, will travel."

They have two children, a daughter, Robin 13, and a son, Tracy, 10.

"We've made friends all over the state," says Mrs. Roberts, "that's the wonderful part of my husband's work."

Judge Roberts holds the opinion that the people of Harris County are "very fortunate in the quality of their judiciary here."

He says he has found the court personnel, clerks, bailiffs, and reporters extremely efficient.

Judge Roberts finished high school in Crawford (pop. 600) and matriculated at Baylor in the fall of 1937. His stay there was brief and he "became a dropout" because of financial woes.

He tried his hand in various ventures and finally joined the Army where he spent five years before he was discharged a captain in 1945.

Back to Baylor he went, enrolled as a law school student and came out with his degree,

no practice and prospects that were bright only in his mind.

In the little town of Hico in Hamilton County he saw a shingle on an office building: "C. E. Persons: Attorney-at-Law."

But, it turned out, Mr. Persons had died. Hico had no lawyer.

A year or so later the county attorney resigned and he was offered the job, \$50 a month and fees. He took it.

In 1956 he made a race against the incumbent district attorney of the 52d Judicial District (Hamilton, Comanche, Coryell and Bosque counties) and won easily.

In 1960, he was elected president of the Texas District Attorney and County Attorneys Association.

A year later the district judge, H. W. (Bill) Allen, died and Gov. Price Daniel appointed Roberts to serve out the unexpired term.

Since that time Roberts has been re-elected twice to the judicial post he holds today.

His four-county jurisdiction covers 3962 square miles, an area which is larger than the states of Rhode Island and Delaware combined.

Most of the 10-weeks he is traveling the circuit as visiting judge is spent in Harris County.

"I'm just as much at home here," he says, "as I am in Hamilton, my home county."

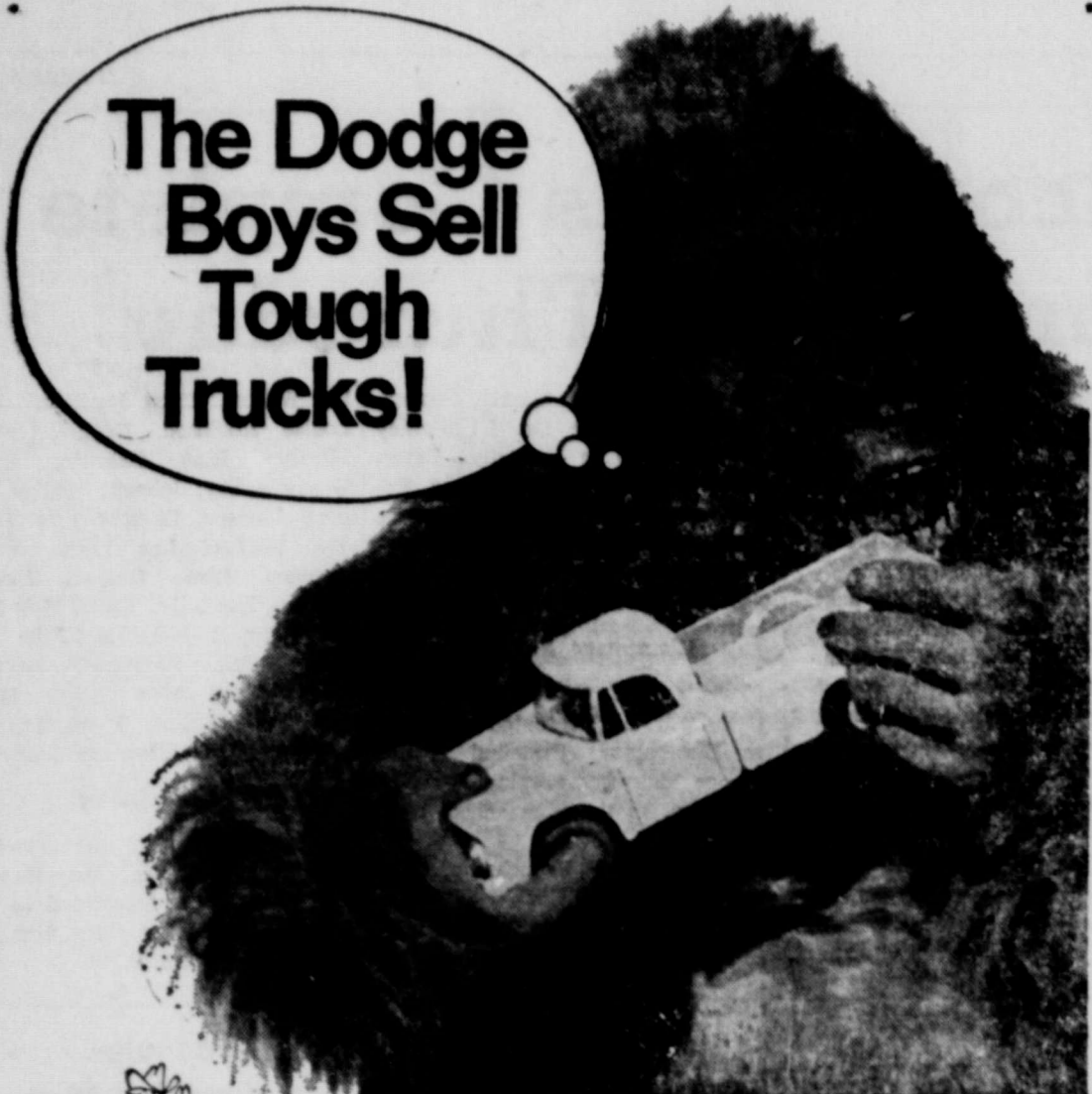

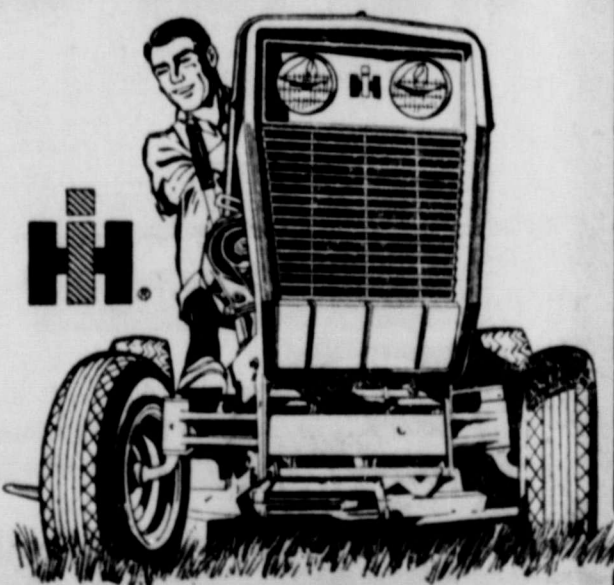

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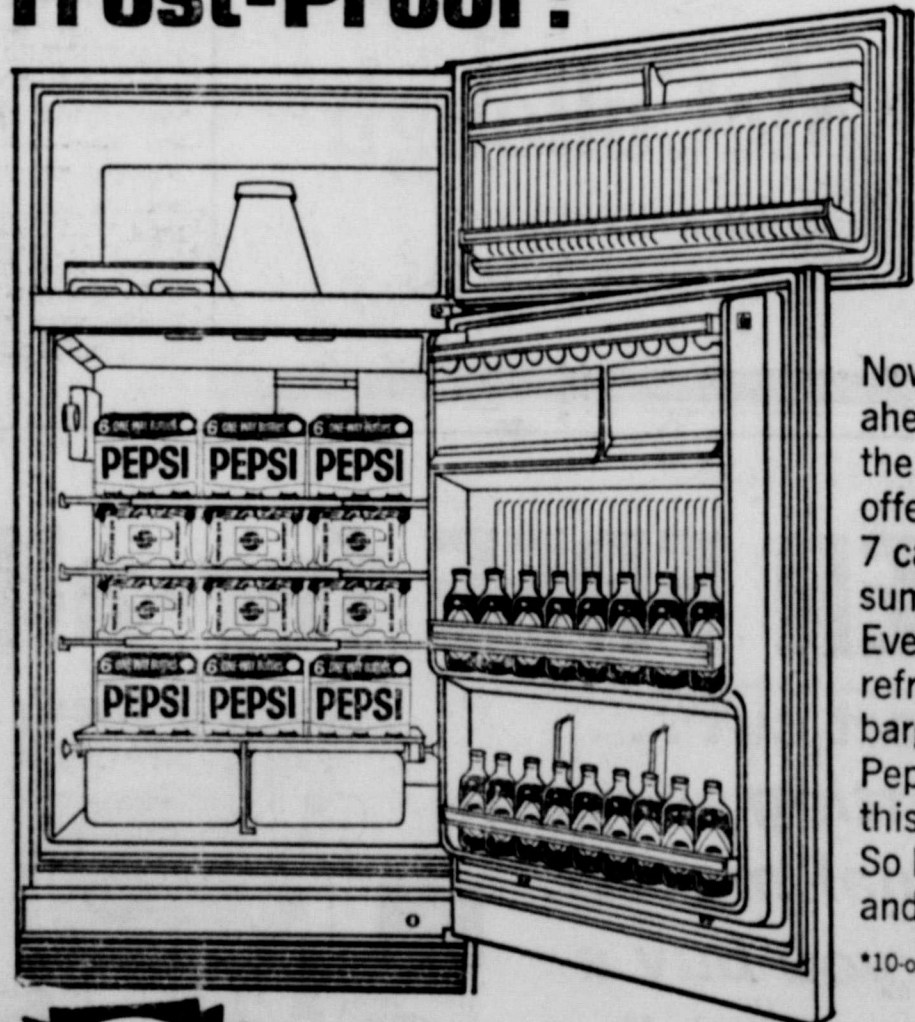

Some have been asking when the town of Iredell was founded. From some of the old settlers I have this information:

It seems that Bosque County was formed by a sufficient number of petitioners on Feb. 4, 1854 and Meridian was made the county seat.

Then somewhere near 1860 the area of where Iredell now is began. A man by the name of Manse Walker was the first settler. R. A. Hester was another early settler, and his daughter, Mary, the late Mrs. John Myers, was the first white child born, the date being March 4, 1857.

A Mr. Ward Keeler, first surveyor of Bosque County, built a log cabin which was the first building at the Iredell site. Mr. Keeler then laid off about 50 acres for the town. Several stories are told of how Iredell received its name. The first store was said to have been that of Thomas Loader who later became postmaster. The post office was granted Iredell in 1871, with William G. Keeler as the first postmaster, followed by Mr. Loader.

Mr. Loader was an Englishman, having come direct from England, and always using his English dialect. This story of his coming to America and to Iredell is told in the book "Aunt Clara," who is the distinguished artist of which we have read so much about recently. Mr. Loader also is the grandfather of Mrs. George Collier, who lives in Iredell and perhaps is the only descendant of any of the early settlers who has always made Iredell her home.

Iredell has had good days and bad days. At one time there were two saloons. Fires and floods have almost destroyed the town. Churches had a hard time trying to form their organizations and keep them, but through the faith and courage of the early settlers Iredell grew and continues to have churches.

Many can remember the story of the killing of a negro and two white men by a mob. These three lie in unmarked graves in the Riverside Cemetery. There was a connection between this killing and that of the Olds-Snow killing near Selden in Erath County in 1926.

Iredell has always maintained a good school, now has three good churches, but like most small towns, is having to cope with the changing times and losing the young people, who go to the open spaces to seek their fortunes.

The book "Aunt Clara" can give a good picture of our town. In 1888 Iredell had a population of 350 with a drug store, four merchandise stores, a hotel, two blacksmith shops, livery stable, and two gins. Later more businesses were established, and at one time there was two banks and three gins.

More could be written, but these are the highlights of the history of Iredell, and I for once can say I am happy that I am a native of Iredell.



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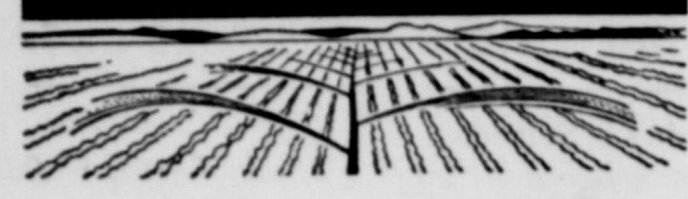
