Duffau Community Seeking Early-Day Historical Facts

The Duffau community is in the process of securing documents and records relating to the early days of that community. Historical facts regarding the school, businesses, mineral wells, Laney oil well and mill, cemetery, graves of doctors, and dates of doctors, and dates practiced at Duffau are being compiled by the committee. Any information about old Duffau, or the Duffau that was destroyed by fire in 1924, is needed. Pictures that are especially needed are old newspaper clippings, etc. All pictures and records will be returned to the committee after copies are made.

Other information needed is the history of the Methodist Church, and the Primitive Baptist Church that stood west of cemetery, especially the dates these churches were established.

How the name of Duffau originated is also wanted. These historical facts, when compiled, will be placed in the Erath County Museum.

Commencement exercises will be held at 8 p.m. at Fouts Field. There are 772 candidates for the bachelor's degree and 13 for the doctorate.

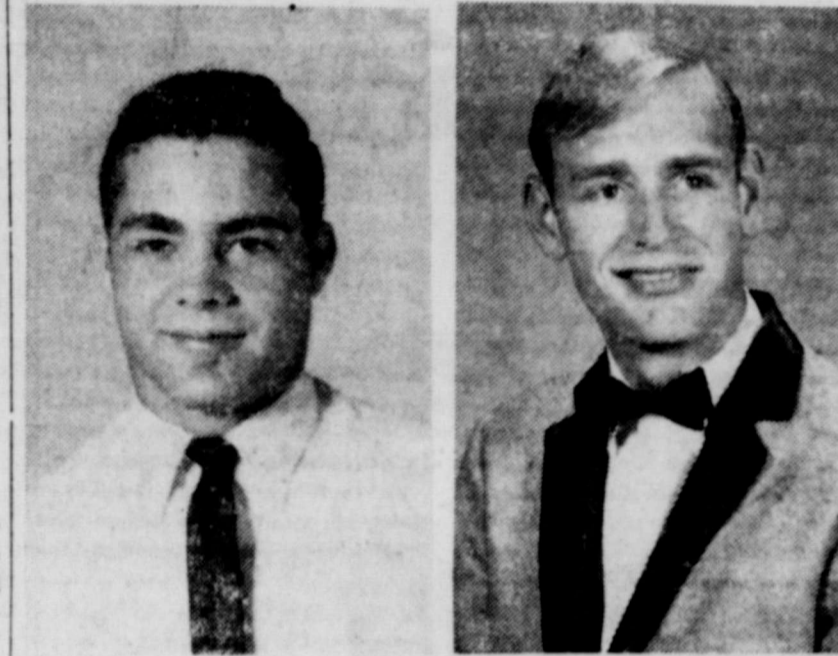
Son of Mr. and Mrs. Buster Duncan of Hico, Duncan is a candidate for the master of education degree. He is a graduate of Hico High School.

Let Nature's Wildlife Care For Its Own, Warden Says

This is the time of year when nature is replenishing herself with the many and varied forms of budding new life which constitutes her spring and summer makeup. Some of this new life will fade and die while some shall remain to enhance her splendor and provide various forms of outdoor recreational enjoyment for all who desire to partake of her many pleasures and pastimes.

A new generation of wildlife young is presently making its debut into the outdoor world. Like all children those young have a tremendous curiosity of their new surroundings. They are playing, exploring, and eager to learn from their elders the many necessary lessons which are essential for survival in a world fraught with many pitfalls for the untutored and unwary. Being naturally inquisitive they often stray from the protection of their home while the parent is off in search of food; however, the parent usually has no trouble in locating a wayward offspring and ushering it back to safety and security.

In the process of various outdoor activities, both children and adults come upon young wildlife that, apparently, are lost or abandoned. Acting with a sense of compassion and responsibility, plus the novelty of having made a unique discovery, they take these creatures home as pets. Quite naturally, these individuals usually have the best interests of the animals at heart plus an honest, sincere belief that their actions are both thoughtful and humane; however, there are substantial, logical reasons why persons should control this desire and leave these young creatures in nature's care.

Strict laws govern the taking of wildlife, especially game animals, and holding them in captivity. These laws were initiated solely for the welfare of our wildlife and, above all, for your health and protection. Removing young wildlife from its natural environment robs them of an opportunity to learn to survive. They must learn vital knowledge that is necessary for survival; knowledge that can only be learned from their parents while in their natural habitat.

Raising young wildlife in captivity prevents them from learning about their natural enemies and how to defend against these enemies. It prevents them from know-

ing how and where to obtain shelter and the proper food their systems require. If a young wild animal were kept in captivity for a prolonged period of time and managed to escape or had to be turned to his wild environment, he would be completely at the mercy of his enemies and the elements, with little chance for survival. Captivity for only a short period of time is inviting disaster for a young animal.

In many instances, captive wild animals are improperly nourished because their natural food requirements cannot be duplicated. Commercially prepared foods may not have the essential balance of nutrition required by a particular animal. Many captors experiment on their wildlife pets by trying out a wide assortment of human foods to see what the animal likes and will eat. Many animals will accept and relish some of those foods; however, many times they become sick or die because their system simply was not designed to tolerate this type nutrient. The average person has little knowledge of the balanced food requirements of our various wildlife.

Disappointment, grief, disease, injury, and even death often occur to many individuals and their loved ones in the wake of some well-meaning person bringing home a wildlife pet. These persons, very often, unknowingly introduce into the home harmful or deadly parasites and diseases. Wildlife commonly carry fleas, lice, ticks, tapeworms, roundworms, heartworms, lungworms and a variety of viruses. Rabies and tetanus are especially dangerous. Adults and many children are bitten, seriously injured or killed every year by wildlife pets which should have remained, untampered with, in nature. Many fawn deer that have been retained as pets for a lengthy period of time, thereby losing their natural fear of man, on numerous occasions have reverted to their wildlife instincts and suddenly without warning, maimed or killed their gentle captors. Remember, it is the children who usually bear the brunt of tragedies involving pets.

If you should happen upon a young wildlife creature who is apparently lost or abandoned, take heart in the knowledge that its mother is probably not far away and is keeping pretty close tabs on her offspring. Do both yourself and the wildlife young a favor by letting nature's wildlife elders care for their young.

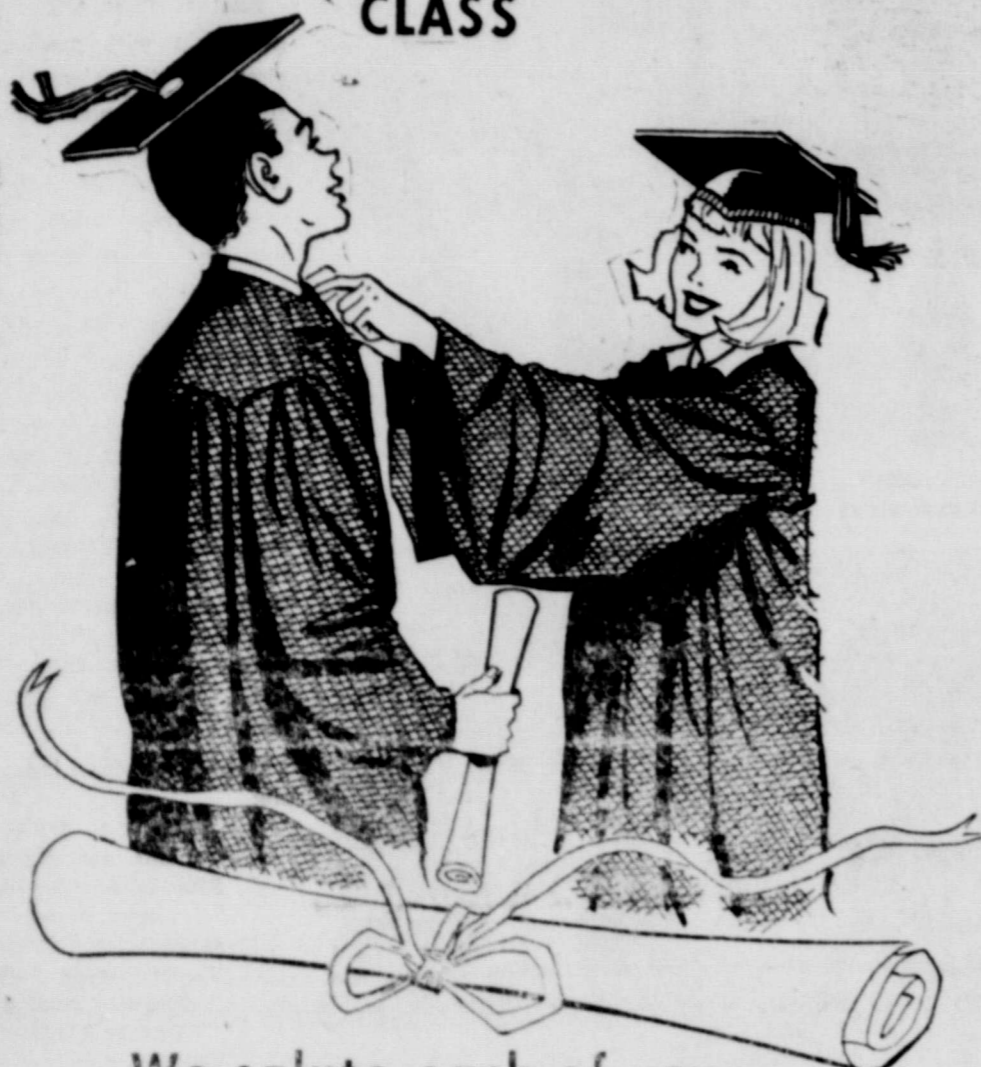

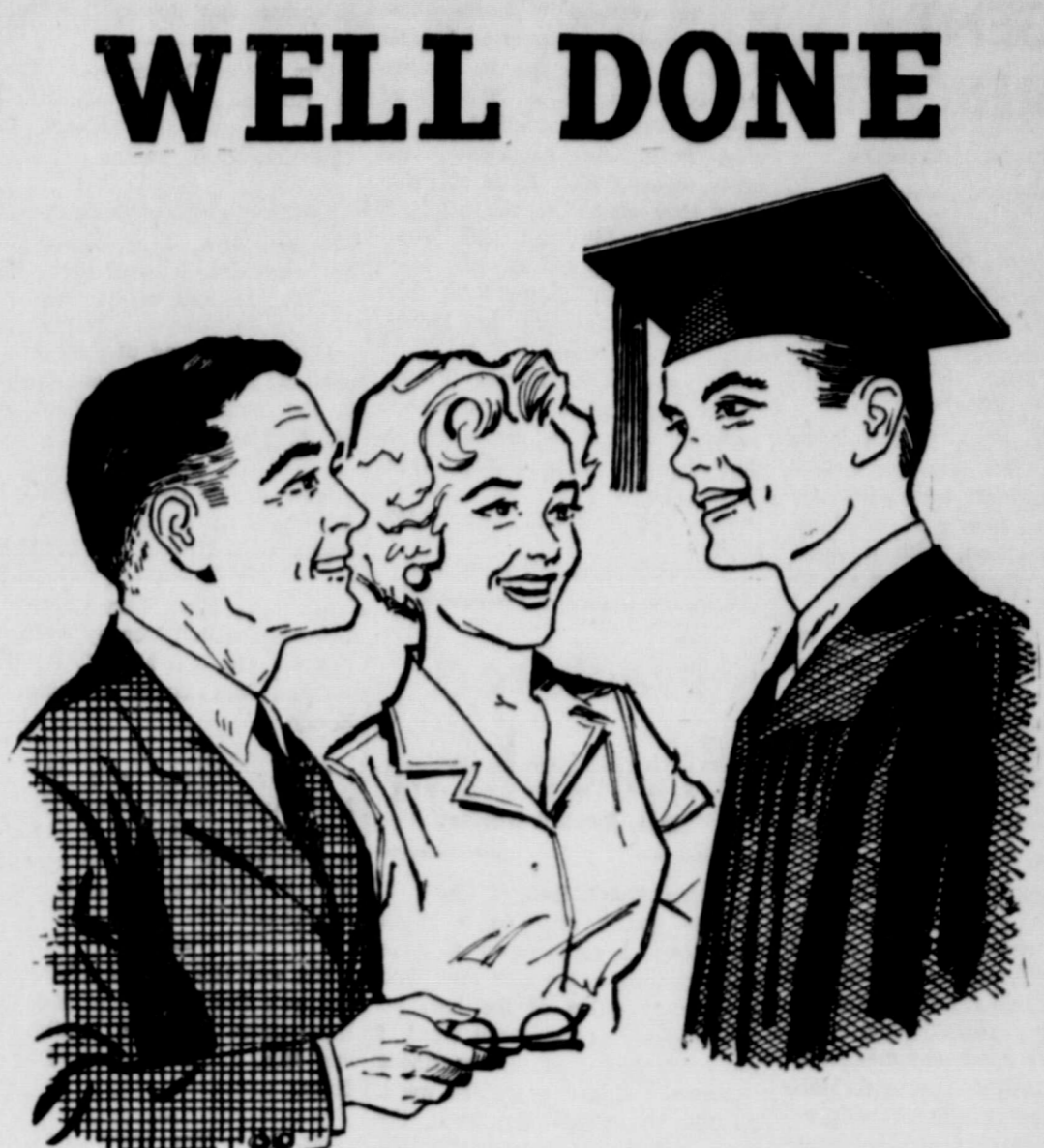

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

May 14-20 is the time to spray your pecan trees for the most destructive pest—the pecan nut casebearer. Due to the early spring and warm weather recently this destructive little insect is starting ahead of schedule.

The larvae stage of this insect is the destructive stage. The small olive grey worm will enter the small nutlets, usually at the base, and feed on them, with a single larva frequently destroying an entire cluster.

This insect can be controlled rather easily but timing is essential for good control. The larvae form of this insect must be controlled in the short period of time between hatching and entering the young nutlet. This period in the life-cycle of the pecan nut casebearer is May 14-20.

Several insecticides will give good control of the pecan nut casebearer, but the two most often recommended and used are Sevin and Malathion. Either will give satisfactory control providing the spraying time is correct and the nutlets are adequately covered. Make sure you use a sprayer with enough pressure to push the leaves back and cover the nut clusters well. It doesn't matter how much spray material you put on a tree. If you don't cover the nutlets your spray application won't be effective.

Include zinc sulphate in your spray mixture. All pecan trees in our area are deficient in zinc and it should be included in the spray material each time the tree is sprayed.

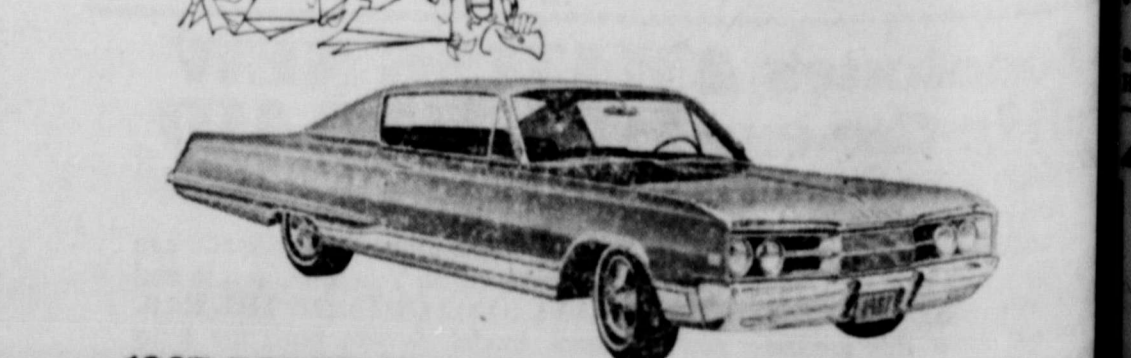

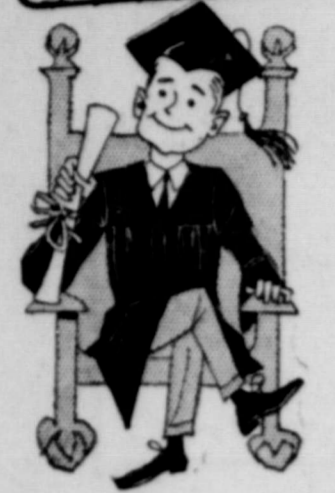

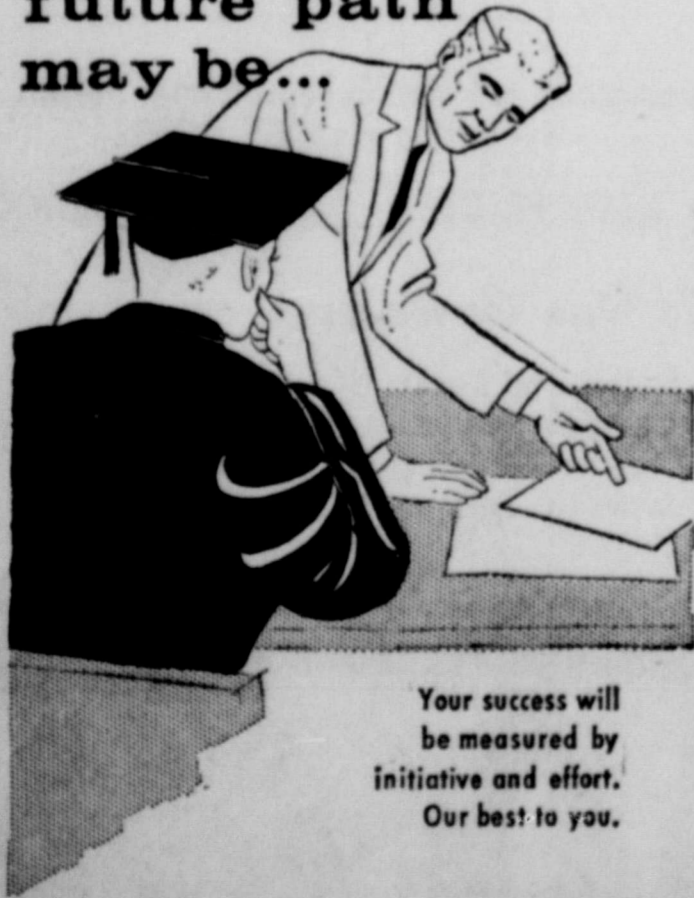
