Civic Club Asks For Highway Study

At a recent Hico Civic Club meeting, members present voted unanimously to ask the Texas State Highway Department to conduct a complete and intensive study of the intersection of Highways 6 and 281 four miles north of town.

The action was taken following the latest accident at the intersection which claimed the life of Mrs. Grace Partain of Clairette. Her death was the fourth since the traffic interchange was constructed several years ago.

Some changes have already been made by the Highway Department, and others have been promised.

In a letter to Resident Engineer George Black of Stephenville, club president Harold Walker made the following comments:

"We are appreciative of the continuing efforts of the Highway Department to make our highways safer and more attractive. A number of years ago a traffic interchange was constructed north of Hico where the Dublin Highway intersects with Highway 281. Since that time several fatal accidents have occurred. Four people have been killed. We recognize a need for a change in the old 'Y' and welcome any change for the better. No one can recall a fatality at the old intersection.

"We submit that a survey be made at the new intersection to review it from a safety standpoint. It is the expressed opinion of the Department of Public Safety Officers, as well as many of our citizens that there is a serious defect as it is constructed. View is limited where crossings are made and with 281 traffic at 70 miles per hour careful drivers are frequently caught and trucks report it most difficult to maneuver.

"The Hico Civic Club with 33 members present last Wednesday voted unanimously to request this study. It is our hope that something can be done that will result in a safer interchange. Will you please inform us of any such progress toward this end. Yours very truly, Harold D. Walker, President."

By return mail, Mr. Black gave the following reply:

"We received your letter regarding the intersection of S.H. 6 and U.S. 281 north of Hico. All of us are concerned about the accidents that have occurred at this intersection. We have discussed each one of these accidents with the Officer from the Department of Public Safety. It is hard for us to understand exactly how this last accident happened, since it is possible to see about 700 feet in the direction from which the vehicle was traveling when it struck Mrs. Partain's automobile.

"Mr. R. W. Crook District Engineer from Fort Worth, looked at this intersection with me today. It is difficult for us to say at this time just what changes might be made. We want to assure you and the members of the Hico Civic Club that a study is being made at this time. Yours very truly, G. W. Black, Sr. Resident Engineer."

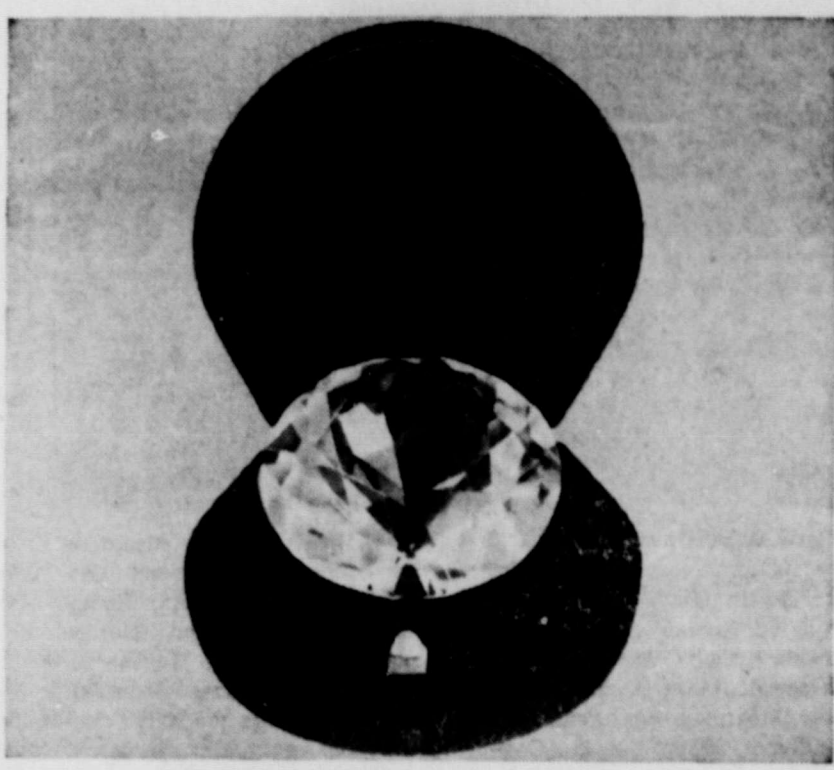

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Hobart's Delayed Retirement Story

From Falls Creek to New Mexico

(Ed Note: The following story, in a sense, is the life history of Hobart Proffitt, the "sage of Polecat Hollow." It is being reprinted from "The Western Tower," Phillips' Petroleum Co. publication, as a delayed retirement story. Hobart retired from the company in 1959, and moved to his ranch south of Hico. Only one thing wrong with the story, however, and that is brother D. R. "Ras" Proffitt of Tahoka will want equal space when he retires, and about all we can say about him is that he "sure is a good skunk trapper." Anyway, Hobart's friends will find the story interesting.)

In 1890, George and Margaret Proffitt loaded their belongings on a wagon and headed for Waco, Texas from Tennessee. George Proffitt rented land around Waco and went into cotton farming. On May 28, 1897, the fifth child was born, and they named him David Hobart.

In 1898 George decided he would purchase his own land and decided on a farm located near Hico (in the Falls Creek community). He then proceeded to build a house for his family. After this job was completed, he sent word for his family to board a train and he would meet them at the station in Hico.

Hobart remarked that his mother told him years later that the thought of getting her family on the train was quite frightening. It would probably be the equivalent of loading a family today aboard a jet airliner.

The Proffitt family lived on the land purchased in 1898 for 14 years before purchasing a larger place in the same area.

In 1919 Miss Maggie Parker became Mrs. David Hobart Proffitt and two years later, they moved to Breckenridge where Hobart was employed as a line rider with the National Gasoline Co. In May 1924 Phillips Petroleum Co., then only seven years old, purchased the National Gasoline Co. and credited Proffitt with his service from 1821 to Phillips. His experience

with Phillips almost spanned the life of the company since it was incorporated in June 1917.

In 1925 Proffitt was promoted to a meterman and remained in that classification 12 years before transferring to the Western district as a gas tester at Hobbs, New Mexico plant in 1937. During the twenties and early thirties the test cars were early model Dodges, and it was necessary to jack up the rear wheels to run the compressors. A belt was then applied from the wheel to the compressor, making it a tedious operation compared to the push-button operation of today.

In an issue of "The Western Tower" appeared an article written by Hugh Smith, Hobbs plant superintendent, from which the following statements were taken:

"Proffitt moved from the Breckenridge district to the Western district in June 1937 of his own free will, so he says, but his being such a devout Republican, some people doubt the integrity of his announced reasons for leaving Breckenridge. Some think his inability to get his share of rabbits at that time prompted him to come West where there was one other Republican and more rabbits. Mr. Proffitt is noted for his ability to make and keep money. Proof is ascertained by the size and fullness of his purse and his ability in defending that purse when threatened for coffee money!"

Rambling Thoughts of Our Time

You hear it said that this world is in crisis. Perhaps this is correct. We read in the newspapers and we hear over the radio of children having killed their parents or grandparents or a man or a woman having killed his or her spouse. But maybe there was more of this kind of behavior in the past than we recall as of now.

I attended a cemetery working at Duffau a few days ago. People come to it from hundreds of miles away because they were devoted to their now deceased kinsmen who perhaps they had not seen within many moons. Duffau has reared some of the best people that I ever knew, but I am reasonably sure it never had a 100-percent monopoly on love. We believe that genuine love still exists. Greed is something else.

Greed, seemingly, is the primary cause of our social crisis. It breeds corruption in our politics, our religion and in other branches of modern society. No, absence of love is not our society's trouble. There certainly are places where love is absent and there have always been such. Yes, maybe we are in the midst of a fatal crisis. What I saw at the Duffau cemetery has convinced me that absence of love is not even a factor in our modern social troubles. Our modern social troubles are primarily based on greed. Look at the many who love and are deeply devoted to their kinsmen and their neighbors, but use shady conduct for money which is greed in action. Perhaps such person's behavior is in agreement with custom and law; on the other hand, it is very much inconsistent with the best interests of our society. There is the source of the crisis, if there be one. Remember, I did not say my society or your society. The welfare of all people must come first or chaos will come next (so our philosophers imply.) Rome is one classical example. There are other aplenty—read your history—they are there. The schoolboy or the schoolgirl can point them out to you. Incidentally these are the saviors of our social world. We of the ancestry have fumbled the ball. We sincerely believe that the educated youth of today can and will bring society out of its present tailspin. We hope and trust.
