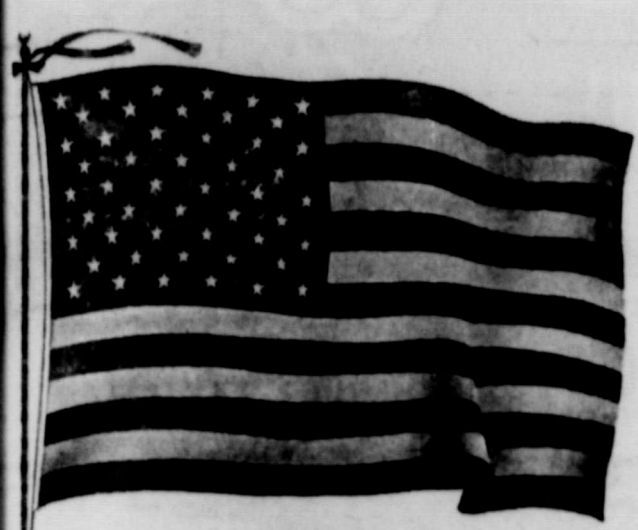

5.2 Miles of Farm to Market Road Approved for Carlton

The Texas Highway Commission this week approved development of 5.2 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Hamilton County as part of the 1967 program.

District Engineer Elton B. Evans of the Texas Highway Department said the work will be under supervision of Billy T. Perry, Senior Resident Engineer, Hamilton.

The projects approved for Hamilton County are:

Additional funds for grading, structures and surfacing of FM 1744 from FM 219 in Carlton south for a distance of approximately 2.9 miles.

Additional funds for grading, structures and surfacing of FM 3048 from FM 219 in Carlton west to Comanche County line for a distance of approximately 2.3 miles.

The work authorized for this county is part of 949.3 miles of Texas Farm and Ranch to Market Roads earmarked for development in the new program.

The program lists 228 projects in 166 counties. Estimated cost is \$24.6 million.

New mileage included in the program totals 623 miles. Other mileage was previously designated or is being constructed in stages.

The additional mileage brings designated Farm and Ranch to Market Roads in Texas to 38.7 thousand miles. This is greater than the entire state-maintained highway mileage of many other states.

Plans call for an eventual FM-RM system of 50 thousand miles. Originally conceived to move agricultural products to market, the FM system has contributed both to the social and economic well-being of rural areas.

For example, 69 percent of the new mileage included in the program is on school bus routes. Six-

ty three percent of the new mileage is along rural mail delivery routes.

It is estimated that rural mail carriers travel almost 50 thousand mile a day over FM roads.

Cost of construction of FM roads has almost doubled in the last 15 years due to increased traffic and the necessity for designing facilities to accommodate heavier vehicles.

Average maintenance costs have climbed more than 80 percent in the same period.

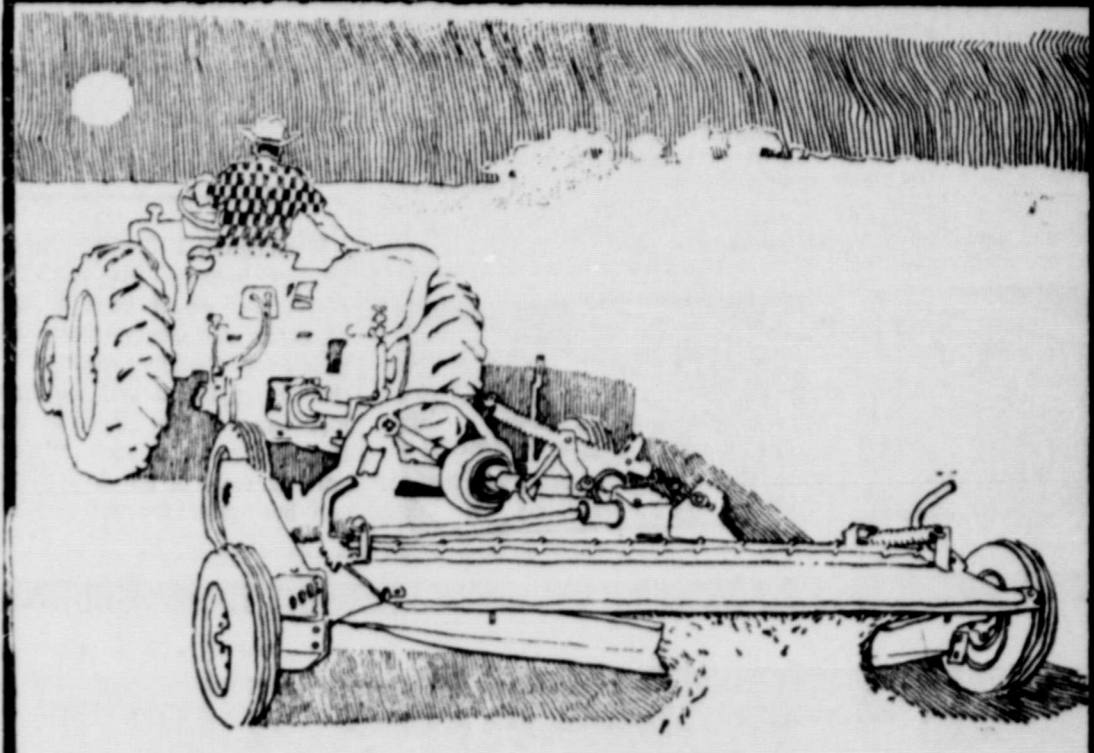
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

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—The threatened conflict between the Arab States and Israel should have a sobering effect on our Government's official policy of "building bridges" with the Soviet Union and its Communist satellites in Eastern Europe. It should put a damper on the support by some of the largest American businesses for the Administration's policy of increasing trade with the Russians.

On more than one occasion Ambassador to the United States Arthur Goldberg has made it clear that peace in Viet Nam rests with the Soviet Union. According to the statements of Nassar of Egypt, the official line of the Russians is complete support for attacks against the State of Israel.

Not only are the Russians blocking any action in the United Nations, but they are checkmating any possible moves by the Geneva Conference machinery provided in the 1964 Agreements for settlement of the Viet Nam war.

All the talk about a policy for the United States to make concessions in East-West Trade Agreements has a hollow sound unless the Moscow Government declares its efforts for peace in the Middle East and in Viet Nam.

It is strange indeed that our government and American businessmen have started a campaign to break a log-jam in trade with the Soviet Union. Washington is supporting the participation of American companies in a Trade Fair in Moscow at this very time. The exhibition, concentrating particularly on food processing and food packaging equipment, opened May 16.

It should be clear to policy makers that we can not satisfactorily end the war in Viet Nam in a reasonable time or bring about a satisfactory peace by making unilateral concessions to Russia or by blinding ourselves to the realities of world power politics. The world politics in this instance wears the same brand which it has always worn—world Communist domination.

Now, after feeding Hanoi the supplies to kill our men in South Viet Nam, their long range strategy in the Middle East is showing itself at a frightening speed.

A glance at the map is enough to show that Russian ambitions in that part of the world include the control of the Red Sea and beyond it. They include the Persian Gulf, source of Western Europe's oil supply, and to control that supply is an invaluable advantage. The complete control would mean a dominant influence on the economic life of Western Europe.

For more than 40 years the secret intent of the Communists has been known. The center of their strategy is to find conditions where strife of any sort or kind can be fomented. It then becomes a vehicle for their use. Although it is presently

played down by our officials, the numerous trouble spots around the world do not appear to be accidents.

Their efforts for crisis in Berlin, in Indonesia, in Hong Kong, were unsuccessful. Earlier they were unsuccessful in Greece, Cyprus, the Middle East and, of course, Viet Nam, supported by Soviet intrigue, is a threat to the United States. It is not a matter of our being the policeman of the world, but a matter of meeting aggression which eventually will threaten our own shores.

While we talk of "building bridges" to Russia via a Consular Treaty and promises of more trade, the Communists are destroying bridges of stability in every part of the world they can reach.

Not only should we not contribute to the welfare of the Russians by increased trade, whether it be strategic or otherwise, but we should in strongest terms tell our friends of the free world that they are no longer our friends if they do so. To do otherwise is to help them through trade and aid to achieve their world aims through armed aggression.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

There will be something new in the Hamilton County farming picture this year. The name is soybeans. Following the small grain failure this year farmers were looking for new cash crops to put on this land. Much of this interest has been directed toward soybeans. Two outstanding farmers, Willie Perry and C. I. Thomas plan to try some this year on a test basis, and their results will bear watching.

Soybeans have several problems that may cause difficulty in our area. One of the big problems in soybean production is water. Water is highly critical in the bloom and early pod stage and this period will be during our driest, hottest months. Prolonged temperatures over 90 degrees also reduce root set and we can certainly expect some of this.

One of the county's top farmers, Bill Lawson, tried soybeans several years ago on his river bottom place. Bill said they made a beautiful stalk and put on lots of blooms and small pods but heat and dry weather caused them all to shed.

Even with all the hazards I think there may be some possibilities for soybeans where some irrigation is available. New varieties are being developed that may do well on dryland farms in our area.

Several persons from the county attended a regional Farm Policy Conference in Hillsboro May 25. This is just one of many such meetings Secretary Freeman has asked to be conducted.

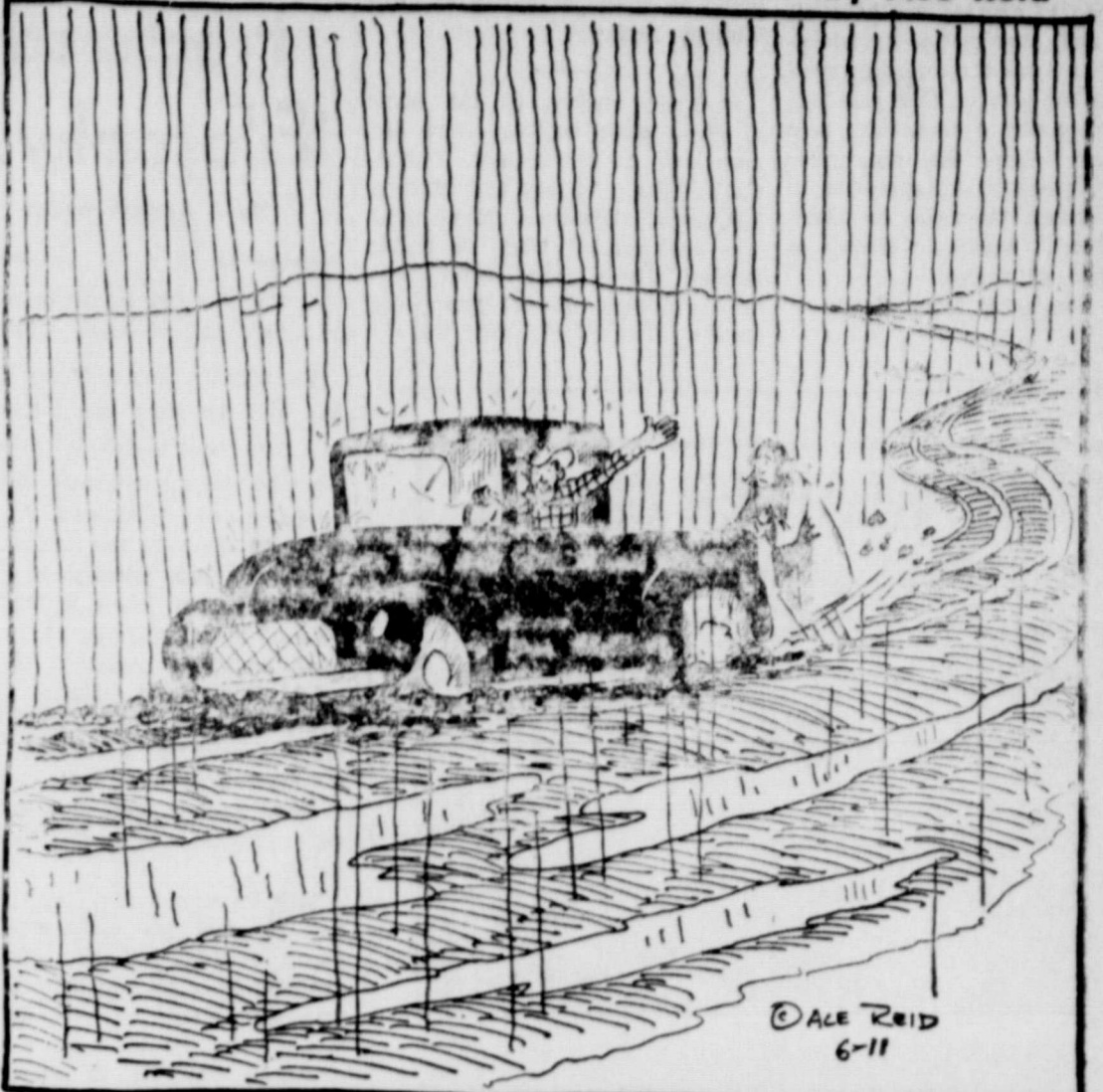

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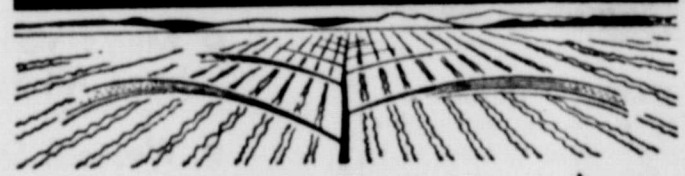

They done had 16 kilt and cleaned, and they wuz everyone of them razorback hawgs hangin' on the clothes line. This heer purty girl wuz a dancin' all over the place with pret-near everybody there, but Pa afeared to ast her to dance with him. He wuz jest a standin' and a lookin' when sudden like this heer purty girl let out a holler and come a hoppin' on one foot right over to whar Pa wuz a standin'. Great big tears wuz showin' on her purty fave and a'fore Pa thought, he blurted out, "What happened that would make a purty girl like you cry so?" The girl let out another holler and caught ahold on Pa, then she said, "Jest look at what a big splinter I got in my foot." Pa looked down at her foot and the blood wuz oozin' out around a big, ole, ugly splinter. Pa said, "Jest hold still and I will dig it out with my knife." She whimpered some, but Paw got the splinter, then he ast her to set down awhile. So she set down by Pa on a bench by the wall, and they talked and talked. Her name wuz Mirandy Beasley, and Pa thought she wuz the purtiest girl he had ever laid eyes on. Course all the girls in Arkansaw dance barefooted, and that wuz the reason Mirandy got such a bad splinter."

"Pa wuz in now, and he ast Mirandy fer a date a'fore the night wuz over. Course Pa didn't know it at that time, but Mirandy turned out to be my Ma. 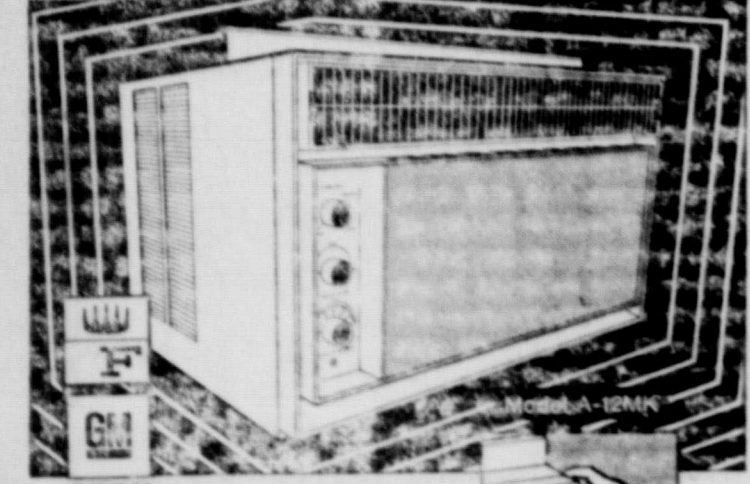
