> The USDA predicted last fall that farm income for 1967 would decline. They now estimate that the decline will likely be more than the forecast indicated, and may be down as much as five percent or more from last year's net

The anticipated decline in farm income may not be as bad as it appears. It is predicted that the farm popullation will continue to decline. In that case it is estimated the per capita income of farm people from both farm and non-farm sources will change little from the Mary Joyce Hitt, 41 1966 average of \$1.731. This is only 66 percent of the non-farm average

A few days later (right: President Johnson welcomed Mrs. Renate Lazear and her two sons, Peter, 10, and Craig, 8, to the White House. Widow of 1st Lt. Robert Lazear, Mrs. Lazear was denied citizenship at naturalization ceremonies because the documents did not reflect the death of her husband by sniper fire in Vietnam. Presidential intervention quickly straightened the matter out.
