Hico Students, Teacher Attend Science Symposium

Mike Robinson, Steve Jones, and Mrs. W. P. Brummett were among approximately 500 science-oriented persons selected to attend the Seventh Annual Texas Nuclear Science Symposium on the campus of the University of Texas June 11-14.

The three from Hico, along with eight other participants were sent to the informative and challenging nuclear conference by Community Public Service Company. All 11 students and teachers came from schools in the power company's service areas in Texas.

Community Public Service Co. is a member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation which co-sponsored with the University the three-day symposium. Those attending the conference heard a panel of distinguished speakers discuss various areas of scientific activity in relationship to the nuclear era.

Far from being upstaged by nuclear advances, the fields of chem-

istry and chemical engineering are providing tremendously interesting applications in the nuclear era according to Dr. Richard E. Wainerdi of Texas A&M University.

"Chemistry and chemical engineering are the basis for the operation of breeder reactors used in the separation of uranium and plutonium," Dr. Wainerdi said, "and the preservation of foods by radiation heavily involves the biochemist."

Enough electrical power from nuclear fusion reactions to meet the needs of the entire world for centuries to come were envisioned by Dr. William E. Drummond, director of the University's Center for Plasma Physics and Thermonuclear Research.

Dr. J. R. Maxfield, well-known radiologist and one of the pioneer investigators in the field of nuclear medicine, told students and teachers:

"On tomorrow's horizon we see in medicine more knowledge in the problems of life itself, accurate identification, and correction of disease by the use of radio-active tracers and more precise diagnostic aids."

Other speakers discussed the parts being played by physics, mathematics, engineering, fusion, and nuclear propulsion in the nuclear area. Speakers included Dr. Harold P. Hanson, University of Texas; Dr. H. O. Pollak, Bell Telephone Laboratories; Dr. Stephen J. Gage, University of Texas; Carl Schwink, National Aeronautics and Space Administration; and Dr. William E. Drummond, University of Texas.

Symposium participants, all of whom were quartered in air-conditioned Kinsolving dormitory, were honored with an informal reception there and later were taken in chartered buses to the Fiesta Gardens for an evening of food and entertainment.

John Young, Texas congressional representative, made the address at the commencement exercises, which came as the climax of the 3-day meeting, following which each of the students and teachers received a certificate of symposium attendance.

Reunion to Be Held Last Week in July

Planning was underway this week for Hico's Annual Reunion, dates for which are July 26, 27, 28 and 29th.

Ray Keller will again serve as general manager, and he is expected to name committees for the parade, Miss Reunion Contest, etc. within a few days.

The Reunion, granddaddy of all homecoming events in the state, will be observing its 81st year. Started as a reunion of Confederate veterans, the celebration has been held continuously with the exception of four years during World War II.

Free entertainment for the four nights is being lined up, and Keller is tentatively planning a big street dance again this year to precede the opening of the celebration on Wednesday. The dance, if held, will be staged Tuesday night.

The celebration draws thousands of people to Hico each year, with many former area residents planning vacations around the dates. Traffic congestion at and near City Park, site of the Reunion, is expected to be relieved somewhat this year since the bridge spanning the Bosque River has been replaced. The bridge was out last year, causing reunion officials to make a low-water crossing to the park in order to handle traffic congestions.

Hico Civic Club is sponsor of the celebration, using funds received for annual projects carried out.

Funeral services for Wilburn Hood Howerton, 75, were conducted Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock in Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel, with Rev. Sam Drake officiating.

Mr. Howerton passed away at 4:40 a.m. Thursday, June 15, in Hico City Hospital, where he had been a patient 18 days.

He was born June 17, 1890 in Erath County, and was the son of the late Charley and Jo Moore Howerton. A retired farmer, he was a longtime resident of Hico and this area, and was a member of the Olin Baptist Church for 27 years.

Hico school trustees, faced with the same rising costs that other businesses have experienced, voted this week to raise the current tax rate from \$1.20 to \$1.40 per \$100 valuation.

In making the announcement, school officials cited rising budget requirements, and the fact that an extra teacher would have to be employed and paid for out of local funds.

More specifically, board members cited a \$3,000 increase in local fund assignment, from \$9,800 to \$12,800, and an insurance premium on buildings and fixtures that amounted to \$1,222. The local fund assignment is the Hico district's portion used for payment of teachers. The state's portion is upwards of \$70,000 annually.

Reason for hiring the extra teacher out of local funds was explained by the fact that average daily attendance during the 1966-67 school year was not sufficient to maintain the present number of teaching units in the local system, and Supt. O. C. Cook said that board members felt that every teacher employed last year was essential to maintaining high teaching standards for another year.

The estimated budget for 1967-68 which must be paid from local funds—tax monies—is \$43,588, as compared to \$36,704 the past year. The increase in taxes will bring in an estimated \$41,062, which is still a deficit of over \$2,000 that the district will have after next year. No explanation was given on how the deficit would be made up, but it is assumed that additional property renditions would take care of the difference.

In other business transacted in the Monday session, board members re-hired all auxiliary personnel (custodian, lunch room, and bus drivers, and also re-elected the band teacher.

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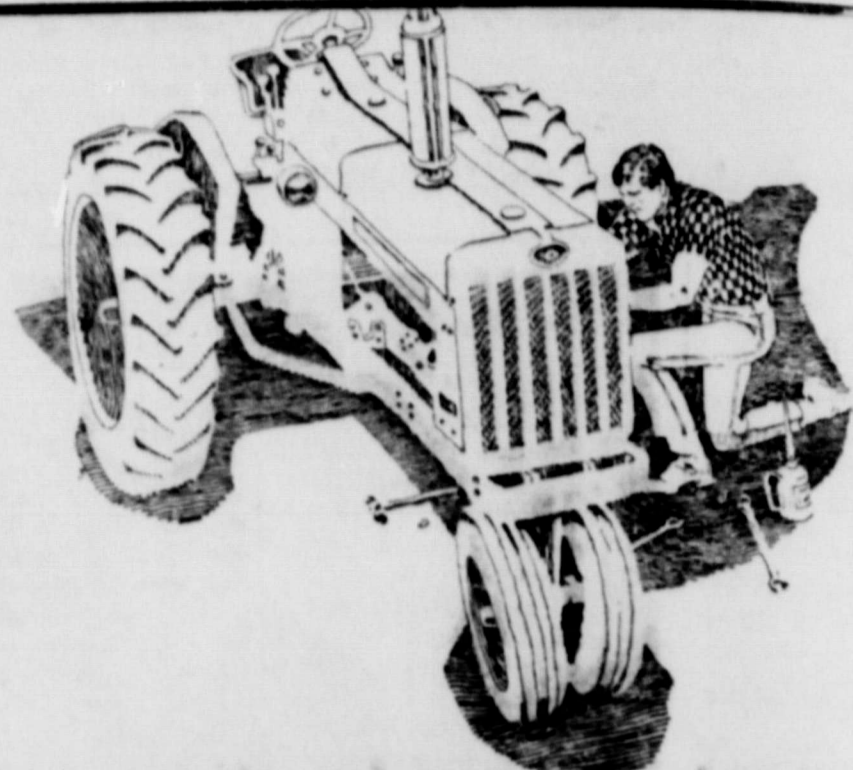

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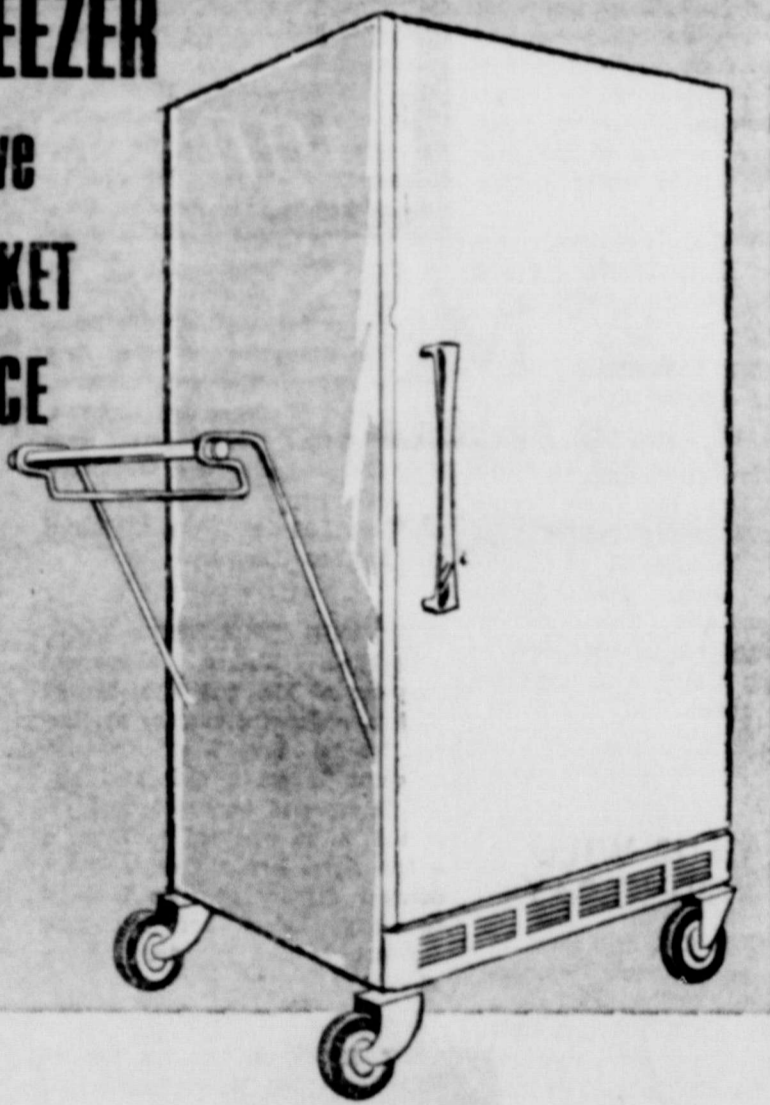

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—“A funny thing happened on the way to the forum”—the subject of a Broadway theatrical a few years ago—based on certain facets of Roman political life.

A funny thing happened last week in the House of Representatives when legislation to again raise the National Debt Limit was defeated by 13 votes. The peculiar aspect was the fact that some of the most liberal and the most conservative voted together, but for different reasons.

During the last 13 years the debt limit has been raised 19 times, but this is the first time for defeat.

The more conservative of the Congress have usually voted against the increase in the Debt Limit by reason of the inner satisfaction that they were not responsible for the necessity of raising the Debt Ceiling. If expenditures had been kept within the bounds as voted for by those who felt we should live reasonably within our means, the Government would not have to continue to borrow huge sums for its operation.

The more liberal element has voted against the increase in the Debt Limit—not consistently but recently—because they say it enables our government to borrow money to finance its national defense and the Viet Nam war.

From the standpoint of fiscal responsibility, both theories are somewhat short of being on solid ground.

This is one issue on which some of us have been on both sides over the years, but good and different reasons. As mentioned, when one feels he is not responsible for necessity of giving the government greater borrowing power, there is personal satisfaction in opposing raising the ceiling on what the government can borrow. William Randolph Hurst II wrote a number of years ago, “I always feel that it is not as important to be consistent as it is to be correct. A man who is completely consistent never learns anything. Conditions change and he does not.”

We are at war, and not to have governmental authority to finance what it may take to win could be calamitous. For the government not to be able to manage its Public Debt could, on down the line, cause chaotic conditions at a time when it could ill afford to do so.

The debt ceiling is simply the limit to which the treasury can borrow money to meet the government's obligations. It comes down to the simple fact that when the government's obligations reach a point where shortly they total more than the debt ceiling, Congress must give a latitude for the issuance of more government securities.

On every occasion when the Congress has had this issue under debate, some very fine economy speeches are made by just about everyone. Those who support raising the debt limit talk about fiscal responsibility and, of course, they are correct. They usually urge that the authority be granted “this time” and it will not be necessary in the future. Usually, they say that we must watch our actions in authorizations and appropriations in order that future raises will not be necessary.

The place and time to practice economy and fiscal responsibility is when each appropriation bill is first considered. Once appropriations are made the obligation must be met and, of course, that is what causes the debt—spending money beyond and above our income.

It is too late to practice economy when the necessity arises for raising the debt limit. In fact, raising the limit has nothing to do with economy at all.

Unless the Congress puts first things first, we will be going through this exercise time and time again.

Raising the limit on government borrowing authority is something like the line in the Farmer's Al-

manac of 1797—“If you want the time to pass quickly, just give your note for 90 days.”

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Dry weather in our area has resulted in delayed planting and maturity of grain sorghum. In recent years most producers have avoided heavy yield losses by planting sufficiently early that the crop could bloom out during or before the week of June 15-20. This year most of the grain sorghum will be in full bloom when the sorghum midge populations have reached economic levels.

County farmers should begin looking for evidence of the sorghum midge. The small, orange gnats is best seen as it crawls over spikelets of pollinating grain sorghum.

Destroying thousands of dollars of grain every year, the midge is one of the most damaging insects attacking the Texas sorghum crop. Farmers are frequently unaware of the midge until tell-tale “blighted” or “blasted” heads begin to appear. Then it is too late to attempt control.

Sorghum midge, whose adults are about 1-12 inch long, overwinter as larvae in the spikelets of Johnson-grass, late or tillering grain sorghum and various wild host plants. Sorghum midge buildups do not occur until grain sorghum is available for egg laying.

Females deposit their eggs in the individual grain florets of young heads during a four to ten-day period following booting. The eggs produce larvae or maggots that feed on and consume the developing seed.

The only economical way to control midge is by destroying the females before they deposit their eggs. This requires precise timing, since it must be done during the four to 10-day period when the sorghum heads in the particular field are susceptible to attack.

If a producer has sorghum beginning to emerge from the boot, he should first determine the midge population in his area. This can be done by checking adjoining fields in which the heads are pollinating.

Where damaging midge populations are found, research shows that the best results are obtained if insecticides are applied when approximately 90 percent of the heads are out of the boot. Applications should be repeated in three to five days where adult activity continues.

Carbaryl (sevin), toxaphene, endrin, parathion, carbophenathion (Trithion), diazinon and ethion are effective in controlling sorghum midge.

On the Home Range

Any home storage situation can be improved by following a few simple rules. Storage space, of course, goes further than the attic, the basement, and the back hall closet. It also means all those places where things are put when they are not in immediate use.

Rule one is to place items where they are most used. For example, in cooking, mending, or stamp collecting, it makes sense to put the needed materials in the most convenient location.

The second rule is to store articles together which are used at the same time. For example, writing supplies should all be in one place—not a typewriter in one room, paper in another, and pencils hidden away in yet another place. In a relatively large work area such as the kitchen, which has several separate activity centers, some supplies such as salt and measuring spoons might be duplicated to save steps.

Take a look at your storage patterns. When you unpack your groceries, do you put all the canned and packaged goods together in one cupboard, or do you consider where they will be used first? In preparing rice, macaroni and oat-

meal, boiling water is needed. Do you store these things near your range or are they some distance away?

Arrange frequently used items so that they are easy to reach and put back. Store items at a convenient height, one row deep and unstacked, if possible. Packaged goods should be arranged so that labels are clearly visible. Heavy items may be lifted more easily if they are stored at, or slightly below, elbow height.

Test your iron on a scrap or seam when pressing crepe or any spongy fabric. Too much moisture may cause a puckered effect on the fabric.

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This new planting is up and growing with runners over a foot long. We still have plenty of grass available, so start now and turn your land into profitable grazing. Visitors welcome anytime.

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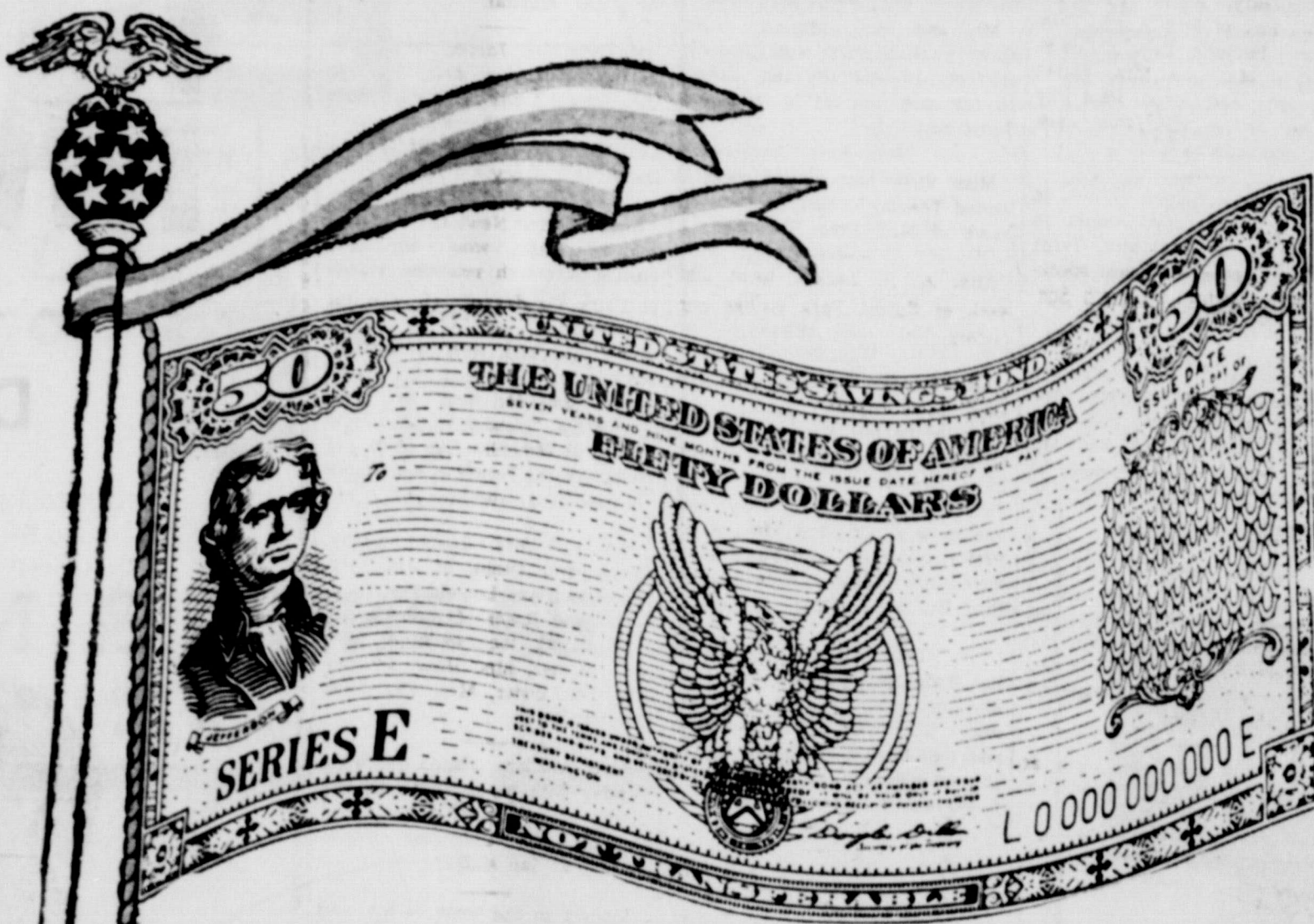

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AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF HICO, HAMILTON COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY; BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HICO:

SECTION 1: Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 1st day of July, 1967, the general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Hico by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 600 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.67 gross; \$1.50 net. All over 600 cu. ft. at \$8433 per MCF gross; \$7590 per MCF net. No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENT
The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustment: Plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to January 1, 1966, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of this adjustment; however, failure of Company to apply such adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make such adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect. The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an ordinance fixing and determining the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency, and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the Mayor.

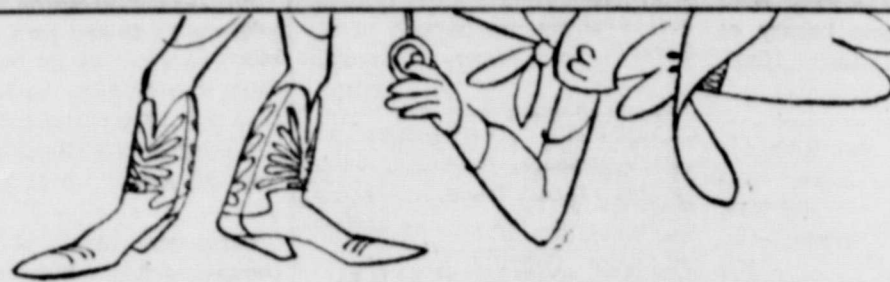

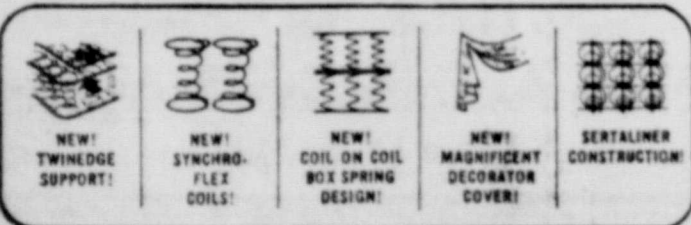

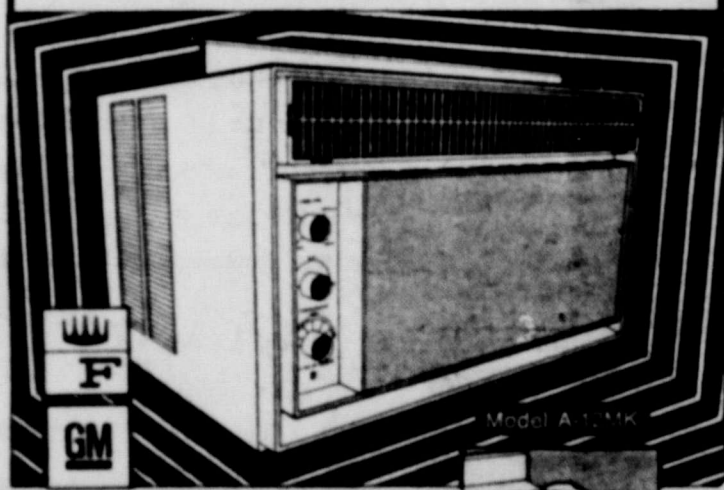
