## Programs Complete for 81st Reunion

Reunion Manager Ray Keller said that plans are complete for the four big nights of the celebration which marks the 81st year of the Old Settlers Reunion, to be held July 25-29.

Activities get underway Tuesday night, July 25, when the big street parade, which proved so popular last year, will be held. Fred Ray and his band, popular with the people, will provide music for the parade, to be held in downtown Hico.

The Reunion officially begins Wednesday afternoon, when the parade will be staged at City Park. On the agenda for that night is entertainment by the Fairy and the Westerners of Hico.

Thursday night has been declared "Mayor's Night" with appropriate music provided.

Friday night is set aside for the Miss Reunion Contest. Added to the popular event this year is a Little Miss Reunion division for young girls age 3-6, which will draw much interest and enthusiasm.

For Saturday night, Keller has secured one of the nation's most exciting dance and show bands, Eddie McDuff and the Country Gentlemen. McDuff, popular recording artist, and his band have just completed an engagement at Las Vegas, Nevada, and will provide Reunion visitors with enjoyable entertainment for the last night of the celebration.

In addition to the special activities each night, visitors will enjoy the midway rides and attractions, provided by Ralph Wagner Shows, and visits to booths and displays set up by local merchants.

## Little Miss' Division Added to Reunion Beauty Pageant

The Reunion contest committee, headed by Mrs. Oris Bakke, Mrs. Edna Kilgo, Mrs. Charles Tolliver, Mrs. Von Scott, Mrs. Wayne Wooten, Mrs. Jesse Barber, Mrs. Harold Walker, this week announced rules and deadline for entries in this year's production, which will be held Friday night, July 28, third night of the 81st Annual Old Settlers Reunion.

In addition to the popular event this year, which will draw much interest and enthusiasm, will be a Little Miss Reunion Beauty Pageant for girls age 3-6, pre-schoolers.

The committee on arrangements announced a deadline of Friday noon, July 21, for entries in the two divisions.

Contest rules, as released by the committee, are as follows:

Two divisions will be held, a Miss Reunion division for girls age 14-18, and the regular division for girls age 3-6.

Both divisions are open to any area girl. (Local area is Hico and trade territory, including Irene, Duffau, Clairette, Olin, and Chalk Mountain.)

The young division is open to

girls age 3 through 6 who have not attended school. They will not be sponsored, but must be entered by parents and pay registration fee.

- Regular division is open to any local area unmarried girl age 14 through 18. The contestants must be sponsored by a Hico business firm or area organization.
- Deadline for entry is Friday noon, July 21.
- Older contestants will be judged in formal or semi-formal wear, and younger girls will be judged in street dress attire.
- Entries will be judged on poise, personality and beauty.
- Registration fee of \$3.00 must be paid in advance to the Reunion Association, and contestants will not be qualified until fee has been paid.
- Registration fee will be paid to committee when contestant is entered.

The annual Hamilton County Farm Tour will be held Saturday, July 15, with this year's tour centered around the Hico area.

Buses will be used for the tour, with one departing from the west side of the square in Hamilton at 8:30 a.m., and the other from the old post office building in Hico at 8:45 a.m.

The tour is a joint effort by all of the agricultural agencies in the county. The first tour, held four years ago, was initiated by the Hamilton Young Farmers Chapter. Some 120 people went on last year's tour which featured agricultural enterprises in the Fairy and Agee communities.

The itinerary for this year's tour is centered around Hico, and includes stops at the following farms:

Glen King dairy farm (former Truman Pierson place) where visitors will have an opportunity to see some of the best pasture improvement in the vicinity. Mr. King sprigged over 100 acres to Coastal Bermuda last year and it is already providing much grazing for his dairy herd.

Departing the King farm, the next stop will be at the Odis and Henry Hill farm on the Bosque River west of Hico. Visitors will get a chance to see both dry land and irrigated cotton, contour farming, weed and insect control, and other types of agriculture on this farm. The Hill brothers probably had the highest cotton yield in the county two years ago, and they have another excellent crop on the way.

From the Hill farm, the tour will go next to the George Holladay dairy farm. Here they will see pasture rotation which includes some of the better irrigated coastal bermuda in the county. Visitors will also get to see one of the highest producing herds of registered Holstein cows in the state. Mr. Holladay has been a longtime member of DHIA and has won top honors with his dairy cows in some of the largest dairy shows in the state.

From the Holladay farm, the next stop will include the vastly improved Bluebonnet Country Club. The club received a rural recreation loan obtained from the Farmers Home Administration to make improvements on the established club grounds. George Krupala, County Supervisor for FHA, worked closely with the club in obtaining the recreation loan.

Final stop on the tour will be on the J. B. Woodard and Derel Fillingim farm. This stop will feature both irrigated and dryland cotton and milo, and a poultry operation. Fillingim will also have his automatic irrigation sprinkler system in operation for the visitors to observe.

From the Fillingim farm, the tour will depart to Hico City Park where a barbecue lunch will be served dutch-treat to persons making the trip.

Free cold drinks will be provided on each bus for the visitors. The agricultural agencies would like to extend an invitation to all farmers, ranchers, and businessmen in the county and surrounding areas to attend the tour and view the county's number one industry—Agriculture.

### Derel Fillingim Appointed to County FHA Committee

Derel F. Fillingim of Hico has been appointed to the three-man Hamilton County Farmers Home Administration Committee, according to George Krupala, County Supervisor. The appointment is for a 3-year term beginning July 1, 1967.

Fillingim succeeds J. J. Jones Jr. and will join the other two members of the committee, Moody Courtney of Jonesboro and Habert Kelm of the Shive community. The committee serves in an advisory capacity to the County Supervisor and makes determinations as to eligibility for loan advances for the Agency. They are also frequently called upon by the County Supervisor to render assistance in the servicing of loans and the development of other community services.

Hamilton County is serviced by the FHA office, located in the Seth Williams Building at Hamilton. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday except on legal holidays.

The action followed a rash of complaints about dogs running free over town.

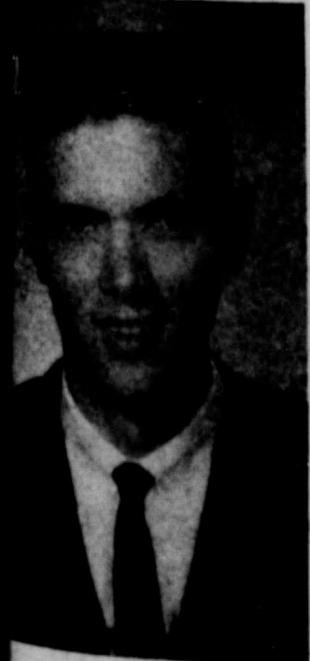
## Daehnert Named Religious Activity Director at Belton

1. VENTILATION—Open all possible doors, windows and ventilators to get air movement. If necessary, remove part of the wall for summer months.
2. KEEP HEAT OUT—Apply aluminum roofs. Paint or white-wash roofs to reflect heat. Apply insulation materials under roof.
3. INCREASE FLOOR SPACE — Double the confined floor space or shade area during the summer months.
4. INCREASE FEED AND WATER CONSUMPTION—Feed during the cool part of the day. Use lights so hogs can eat at night. Supply more feeder space so all hogs can eat during cool periods. Provide cool clean water. Add extra waterers since consumption often doubles during heat waves.
5. SPRINKLING—Run water over roofs with hose. Use fogger nozzles or other equipment during hottest part of day.
6. OTHER PRACTICES—Turn hogs out of house. This is especially good if a shaded spot is available. Be sure to have feed and water convenient to the hogs at all times.

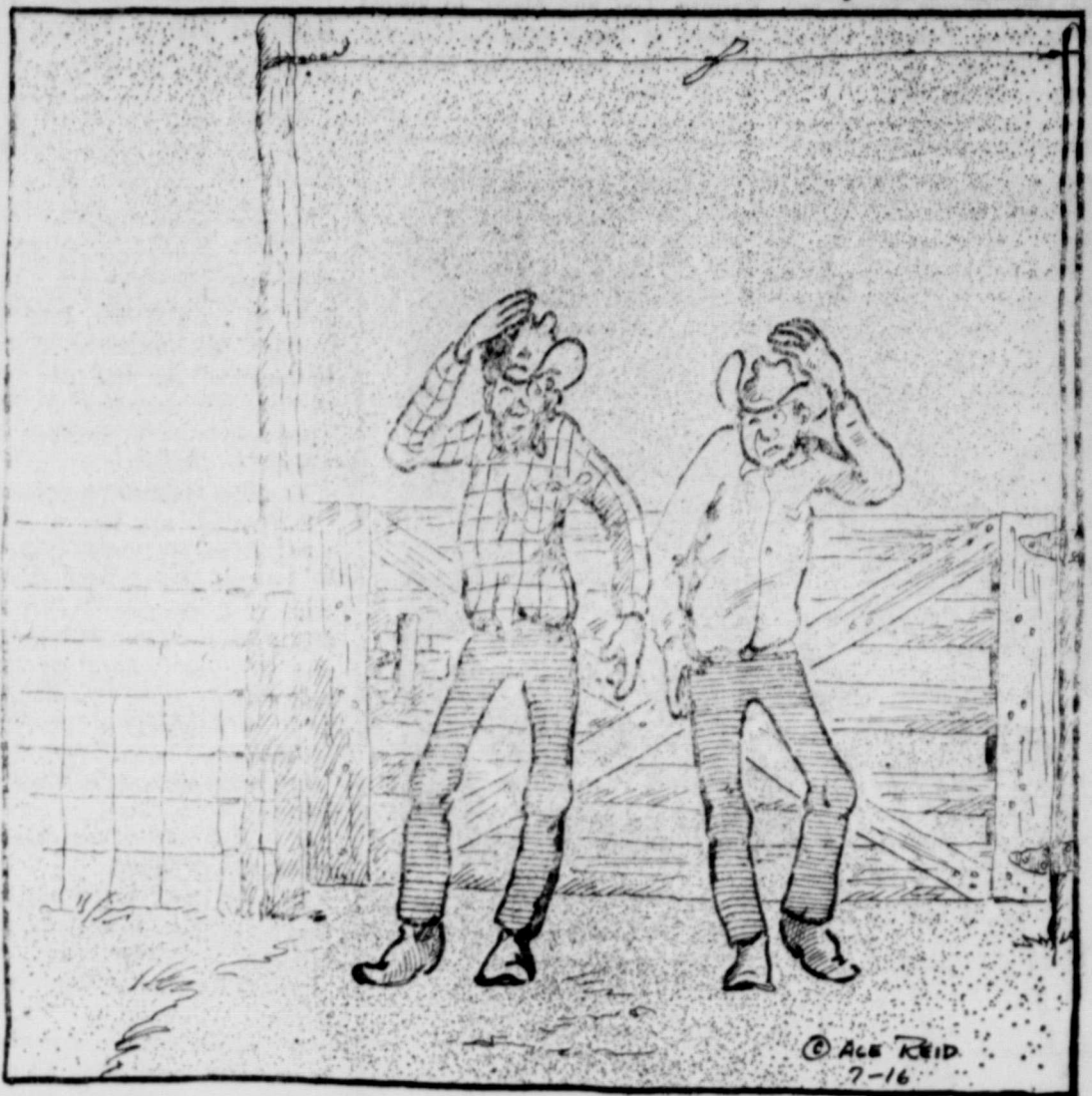

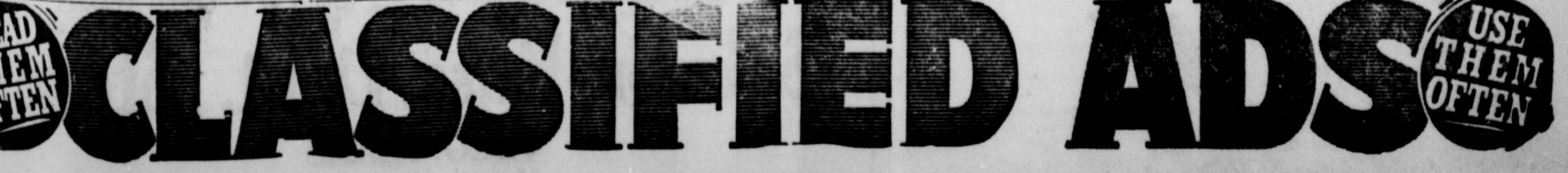
