

Over the years the Holladay operation has demanded a tremendous amount of forage to feed the almost 100 head of milk cows, dry cows and heifers for replacements. The 125-acre Bosque River bottom was used for years as temporary pasture and for hav. Some seven years ago Coastal was sprigged in a 10-acre plot that was highly susceptible to erosion. Floods along the river continually made oats and sudan pasture operations hazardous. The 10-acre plot of Coastal proved so successful that 20 acres was sprigged the next year. Drouth conditions required a re-planting

Mr. Holladay started irrigating from the river and increased his acreage to 60 acres. He had the usual poblems of grassburr and weeds to contend with but found that fertilizer took care of the grassburrs and herbicides the weeds. He also found his river irrigation a problem in that the dry years when he needed water the river was too low to pump and a little rise would catch his equipment in the river, and it was difficult to move out. He was also limited to watering about 30 acres using 30 sprinkler heads. Two years ago he drilled a 350-foot irrigation well and pumps it from 255 feet. It will deliver 540 gallons per minute at 40 pounds pressure on 90 sprinkler heads. The well is 6-inch

started about 8 years prior to the hanging. He was charged frequently with violating the law of the land, especially the local option law. He and John Adams, constable at Dublin, had clashed on many occasions. In 1891 a Mexican's house was set fire and burned in Dublin. Wright was arrested by Adams and convicted on the charge and sentenced to six years in the penitentiary for arson. After serving two years he was pardoned by Gov. Hogg and returned to Erath County, Wright was watched constantly by Adams and arrested from time to time. A mutual dislike grew between the two men.

In the latter part of 1897 Adams was told that Wright had been trying to hire someone to kill him (Adams), and a resident of Dublin named Blassengame told Adams that Wright had offered him a horse and saddle and \$50 and a Winchester if he would kill Adams. Adam started to open the door, and just as it swung open the fatal shot


was fired from behind by Tom Wright. The killer had hidden in the stair-

way which led to the offices in the old bank building. Wright had watched his chance, and when Adams' back was turned, Wright ran out behind the victim and shot him in the back of the head. Adams fell face down and Wright placed the muzzle of the gun within 18 inches of his head and fired the other charge. Then Wright waved the gun over his head and shouted "there is the last of John Adams."

He walked to the sidewalk, talked a few minutes to someone while Adams' body was being moved, then returned to the bloody spot. Waving the gun over his head he repeated the words about Adams. City Marshal Jesse Phillips placed Wright under arrest.

The preliminary trial was held before Esquire W. E. Lowe of Dublin, who remanded Wright without bail. A writ of habeas corpus was sued out before Judge Straugham, who also refused bail for Wright. The case was taken to the Court of Appeals with the same results.



I have almost been raised with him and I am glad for the change there has been in the man for the last few years. He gave me several good talks, and I honestly believe he is a changed man and he has made a great change in me. Mr. J. D. Jackson has made me several talks which was highly appreciated by me. I hope the people of this country will forgive me for the way I have lived. I feel God has forgiven me. I don't know malice against no one on earth. Mr. A. P. Hickey, one of the death guards, has been one of the faithfulest men I ever saw. He has been kind and good and civil to me in evry way. He has been on duty about seven months and he is a perfect gentleman in every way. I don't feel like I deserve hanging for the crime I committed, but I will take all of that over to the Lord and let Him be the judge. I hope the Lord will forgive the people that have mistreated me in the trouble as I freely forgive all. So I will close by saying. Goodbye forever, and hoping you will win a home in heaven. 
