In addition to posting at least a 2.25 grade average, a student qualifying for Distinguished Student honors must have been enrolled for a minimum of 15 semester hours and have no grade lower than a "C". Distinguished Student ranking is limited to 10 percent of A&M's undergraduate enrollment.

Hico wrapped another Old Settlers Reunion—the 81st—last Saturday night on the usual successful note. Typical weather, hot and dry, greeted visitors but didn't hamper spirits any as thousands upon thousands packed into City Park each of the four nights.

Including the Tuesday night street dance, estimates placed the number of people here at around 40,000. Which could be conservative. Manager Ray Keller said this week that receipts from all phases were about the same as last year, with money received from the carnival slightly lower than the previous year.

Wednesday night featured Don Foley and the Westerners from Stephenville, which drew a large crowd to the park. Thursday night a band composed of Gary and Wayne Duncan, Jerry Casey, and Doyle Crews played for the teenagers.

Friday night's Miss Reunion contest took on added interest this year, with a 3 to 6 age group competing for a "Little Miss" title. The park was again packed for the evening.

Saturday night, the people came early and stayed late, as Eddie McDuff and the Country Gentlemen played from 8 until midnight. The band was such a success that Keller booked McDuff back for September Firemen's benefit show.

Everything considered, Reunion officials were well pleased with the overall results of the homecoming, and started making plans for next year.

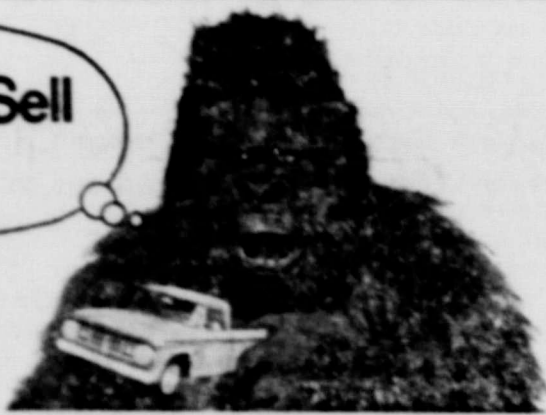

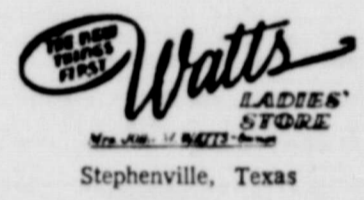

"HANDS"

Our hands are the servants of our mind, our emotions, and our hearts. No other member of our body more nearly expresses our true inward feeling than does our hands. We may attempt to make vocal expressions that would overshadow the true revelation of our hands, but the truth of the real intent of thought and purpose cannot be concealed by the touch of a hand. The most outward expression of our inner being is conveyed by our servants, that we cannot master; those hands that are attached to the end of our arms.

In spite of all efforts to blind the truth to others, our attempt is vain if we permit the contact of hands. Many statements of one effect has been completely shattered by the touch of one's hand. Messages of truth are relayed by those servants we are not able to master. How often have we received the most valued assurance of another's true, innermost emotion by the touch of their hand? A little child reaches up a tiny hand, to be clasped in yours, and the contact tells you the child has full confidence and trust in you. Your friend touches your hand, and complete understanding passes between you, even though not a word is spoken. The one you love most can say all you want to hear, not by word, but by the tender touch of a hand. Our hands are truly our servants, but we cannot master the revealing touch if we allow them in contact with others.

The next time we meet, may the touch of your hand tell me the things you fail to say in words.

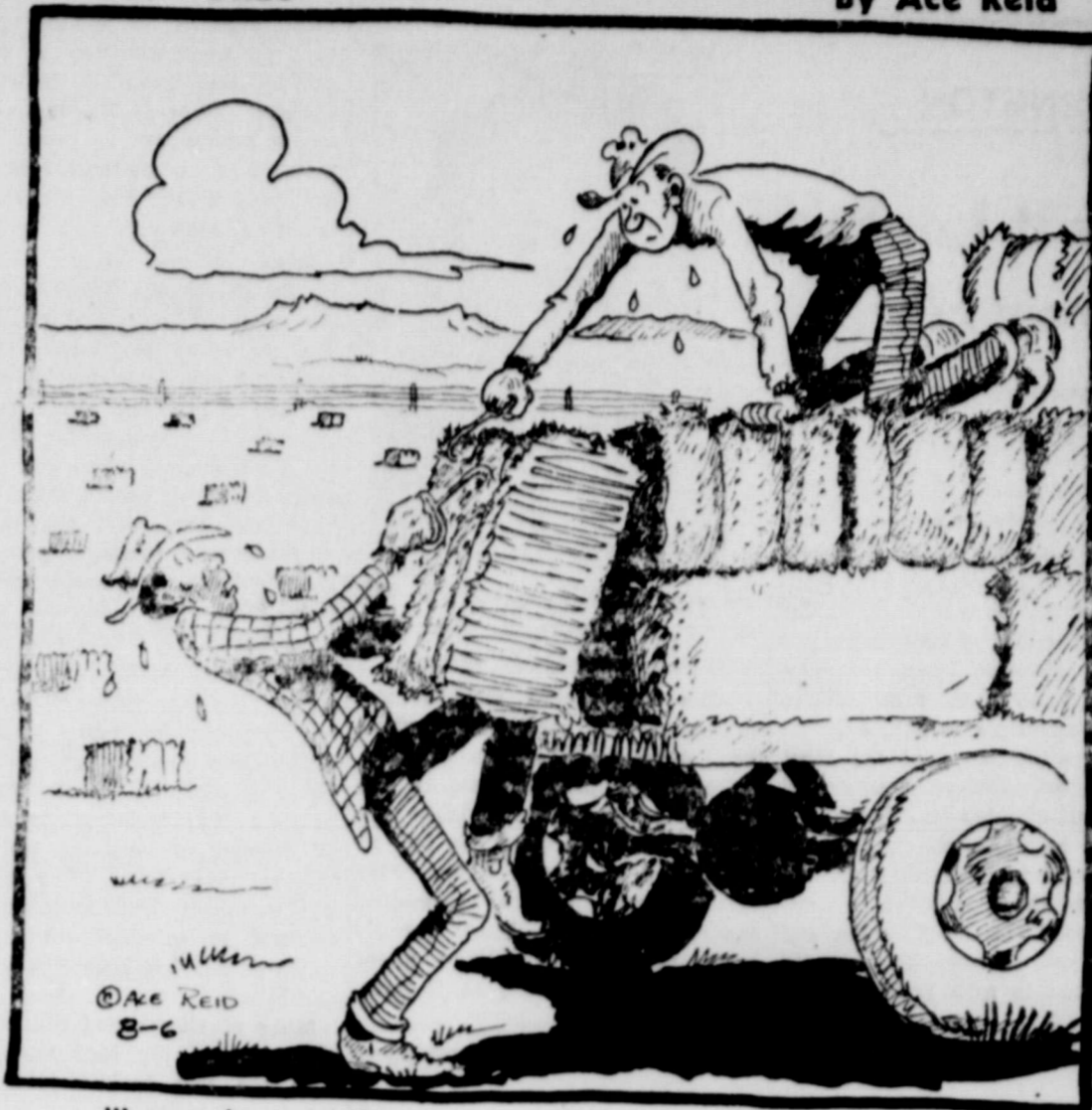

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—About everybody with a pencil has been writing about the riots occurring in our larger cities. About every politician is talking about it. There are about as many ideas as there are talkers and writers. Here is another.

It seems that one of the most singular and obvious facts in all these disturbances is that they have not been confined to the poverty stricken. There is definite proof that those in what is commonly called the middle class, and in fairly prosperous circumstances have joined in mob action.

ment expense, to sporting events to keep them occupied. A resolution of this nature is before the Congress. Here in Washington, five movie houses are to provide free pictures in the afternoon (the Romans tried it with free circuses, but it did not work very well for them).

What will not likely be said by the President's Commission, and not admitted in official circles, is that too many people have mistaken Civil Rights legislation as a conferment of privilege. Many of those who are supposed to be benefited by Civil Rights legislation have found that they cannot eat it. They have felt that with the passage of the several measures guaranteeing "rights" they would suddenly come into the possession of all good things.

In addition to these misconceptions is another rather obvious fact not admitted by those who honestly believe they are about to cure all social ills by the passage of laws. This factor is the decline of chances of detection and punishment for crime. Fear of prison has long been a natural deterrent to criminal actions, but much of this has been removed by the Courts.

Mobs of rioters and pillagers in cities across the land would not take the risk against officers of the law if police had not been deprived of their principal weapons of law enforcement.

Officers of the law trained to pull no punches when they see lawlessness have had to become hesitant to act. They are accused of brutality when they do their duty. Mobs have a way of taking advantage of this situation. A minority creates instant anarchy.

The emphasis on "freedom of speech" allows the agitators to turn listeners into a howling, lawless mob. In past decades our highest courts have affirmed the principle that public utterances which incite to crime are not immune from prosecution. Today the agitators receive publicity and become heroes and martyrs.

No less a person than former Associate Justice of the Supreme Court Charles E. Whitaker had this to say: "While all crime is not due to any one cause, it can hardly

be denied that a large part of our current rash and rapid spread of lawlessness has derived from planned and organized mass disrespect for, and defiance of the law and the courts, induced by the irresponsible and inflammatory preachments of some self-appointed leaders of minority groups to obey the good laws but to violate the bad ones—in other words, the taking of the law into their own hands."

The responsibility is broader than the courts alone. It is also the hesitancy of politicians in Government to use the powers of law enforcement promptly and intensively for fear of political backfires.

This brings to mind the passage in I Corinthians: "If the trumpet gives an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself for battle?" The trumpeters in high places have been giving off uncertain sounds as clear as they hoped the tone would be. The result has been the mob responding to the call of the drums.

Thomas Jefferson in his eighth Annual Message to Congress in 1808, said: "Love of liberty, obedience to law and support of the public authorities—a sure guarantee of the permanence of our Republic."
