## Erath Electric Members Receive Patronage Refund Checks for '57

Refund checks totaling \$41,533.47 were mailed last week to 5,256 customers of Erath County Electric Cooperative, according to Clinton C. manager. The refunds were for the year 1957.

This is the fourth consecutive year for the Cooperative to refund money to its members. The amount each member received represents over 8 cents of each dollar paid for electricity during 1957.

The refund represents the amount members paid in excess of actual cost of providing electric service to the member-consumer.

Since Erath Cooperative is a non-profit corporation, this amount is refunded to the members as the financial condition of the cooperative permits. Sufficient reserves must be maintained to take care of unforeseen emergencies and to maintain and improve the distribution system to provide dependable electric service.

# Everything Ready For School Start

Hico Public Schools will open for the 1967-68 term Monday, August 28 at 9 a.m. A general assembly will be held in the auditorium. Parents and friends are invited to attend the opening program.

Classes will meet on a 40-minute schedule the first day, with dismissal at 2:45 p.m. Buses will run the same routes and at the same times as they did last year, and lunch will be served the first day of school.

A general faculty meeting will be held Saturday morning, August 26 at 8 a.m. in the high school library.

Senate Bill 130 passed by the 59th Legislature requires all school personnel to get a certificate signed by

a doctor revealing that the person has been examined for the disease of tuberculosis. All personnel are urged to see their physician and obtain this before Sept. 1. Also, this same bill requires that sometimes during the year, those students in the first and seventh grades be examined for the same disease. The State Board of Health shall provide for this examination. The parents should wait until further notice in regard to his matter.

**Pre-Registration**  
Pre-registration for high school students will begin Friday, August 25, at 9 a.m. All grade school students will register August 28.

**Birth Certificates**  
All first year students are required to have a birth certificate to present the first day of school as proof of age.

Students who don't have a certificate may obtain one by sending \$1.50 plus the name of the child, date and place of birth, and both father and mother's names to the Records and Statistics Section, Texas State Health Department, 410 East Fifth Street, Austin, Texas.

**School Attendance Required**  
House Bill 51 raised the required school attendance of students from 16 to 17 years of age.

The bill reads, in part: "Every child in this state who is 7 years of age and not more than 17 years of age, other than a high school graduate, shall be required to attend the public schools in the district of his residence, or in some other district to which he may be transferred as provided by law a minimum of 165 days of the regular school term of the district in which said child attends school."

**General**  
All buildings have been given a general cleanup. Floors are cleaned, waxed, and polished. Desks also were cleaned and refinished. Concrete floors have been given a fresh coat of paint. The gym floor has also been given a fresh coat of gym finish.

**P-TA Project Complete**  
The Parent-Teacher Association set aside enough money last year to improve the parking area in front of the school campus. With the help of the NYC students and others, parking curbs have been made and set up and parking lines drawn so that cars may be parked in order. Traffic in front of the school will travel in one direction in order to eliminate congestion and danger in the parking area.

The school board will meet Monday night, August 21, when the 1967-68 budget will be presented. The public is always welcome to attend these meetings.

## ASC Community Committee Election Set September 30

The ASC Community Committee election date is September 30. The community boundaries have not been changed from last year, and a map showing the boundaries is posted in the county office. The communities are commonly known as:

Community A: Carlton, Hico and Fairy

Community B: Lanham, Agee and Cranfills Gap.

Community C: Ireland, Aleman and Blue Ridge.

Community D: Pottsville, Indian Gap and Gentrys Mills.

Community E: Evant, Star and Shive.

A slate of nominees will be selected by the present community committee. The county committee may add additional names. Others may be added to the slate by petition if they are found to be eligible and

Newspaper readers throughout Texas are now seeing long columns of type about important issues, as Secretary of State John Hill has begun advertising six proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on November 11. Fourteen additional amendments will be on the 1968 ballot.

Amendments to be voted on this year will appear on the ballot in this order:

- No. 1, House Joint Resolution 3, to permit counties to put all tax money in a single general fund rather than dividing income in specified amounts among separate funds for ear-marked purposes as is now required.
- No. 2, HJR 37, allowing cities and other governmental units within hospital districts to levy taxes for participation in mental health and mental retardation community centers.
- No. 3, HJR 17, reviving the veterans land program and authorizing a total of \$400,000,000 in bonds to finance continued purchase of farm and ranchland by veterans, including those who have served in Southeast Asia during present hostilities.
- No. 4, HJR 6, authorizing counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills of county law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.
- No. 5, HJR 12, authorizing a \$75,000,000 state revenue bond issue for the development of state parks and recreational areas. Bonds are expected to be financed by a small admission fee.
- No. 6, HJR 27, permitting state officers and employees to hold non-elective positions under the state or U.S. governments where there is no conflict of interest and where the state might benefit.

That's all for '67.

Top interest in these amendments

doubtless will center on the park bond proposal and the veterans land amendment.

Hospital mental health and mental retardation groups will emphasize the importance of Amendment No. 2 to the new community center approach of treating mental patients close to home.

Calling the 1967 election for Veteran's Day and a Saturday, undoubtedly was to assure a large turnout for the land fund amendment. A substantial campaign to urge its passage already is taking form.

Gov. John Connally is the principal backer of the parks bond issue. Last December he unveiled a 10-year plan for acquiring and developing 150,960 acres for recreation and historical sites. This would more than triple present state park acreage and open a variety of new facilities for outdoor recreation.

Only opposition to the amendment to date has been on the \$1 a car park entry fee, initially proposed by Connally to finance the vast program; and scattered complaints that facilities included in the governor's master plan do not adequately serve some areas of the state.

He is expected to spearhead an intensive fall campaign—supported by parks, recreational and outdoor groups—to put over the bond issue.

The veterans land amendment would add another \$200,000,000 to state bonds previously authorized and through which 35,300 veterans have purchased farm and ranch properties at low interest rates spread over a 40-year pay period.

This amendment would raise the amount which could be borrowed under the program from \$7,500 to \$10,000. The program was initiated in 1949. Additional bonds were approved by voters in 1951 and 1956.

Amendments to enlarge the bond authorization were rejected at elections in 1963 and 1965. Opposition came mainly from Dallas and Houston.

Proponents emphasize that while thousands of veterans have benefited from the program, it has cost the state no money and actually has turned a profit of \$2,500,000 a year while providing an expanded land market.

Opposition has adopted the argument that it is not the function of the state government to engage in the loan business and that veterans have had plenty of time to participate. Some also contend that cheap money invites purchases of land not needed and which will not be put to productive use.

Amendment No. 2 specifies that the legislature, in providing for creation of hospital districts, does not have to require that the districts assume full responsibility for community mental health and retardation centers and services. It would permit cities and counties to levy taxes and issue bonds for such services. Subdivisions within existing districts would be authorized to do so unless statutes creating the districts expressly prohibit.

An attorney general's opinion held that the constitution does not allow political subdivisions within the boundary of a hospital district to levy taxes for medical and hospital service. Under that ruling, cities and counties located in such districts were restricted from participating in establishment of community health centers. Therefore, only hospital districts could establish such centers, a key part of the mental health program.

Amendments No. 3, 4 and 5 are self explanatory and apparently non-controversial.

Amendment No. 6 is aimed primarily at permitting educators, who are paid from state funds, to serve on federal advisory boards.

will be willing to serve if elected. Petitions must be:

- Limited to one nominee each.
- Signed by at least 6 eligible voters in the community. (Eligible voters may sign as many petitions as they desire).
- Received at the county office by August 24, 1967.

Persons nominated should be (1) currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch, and (2) well qualified for committee work.

In general a person is eligible to be a community committee member if he lives in the community in which he is eligible to vote. If a person who is nominated by petition is found to be ineligible, he will be notified and given 15 days in which to appeal to the county committee.

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be provided by the Legislature. The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund thereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

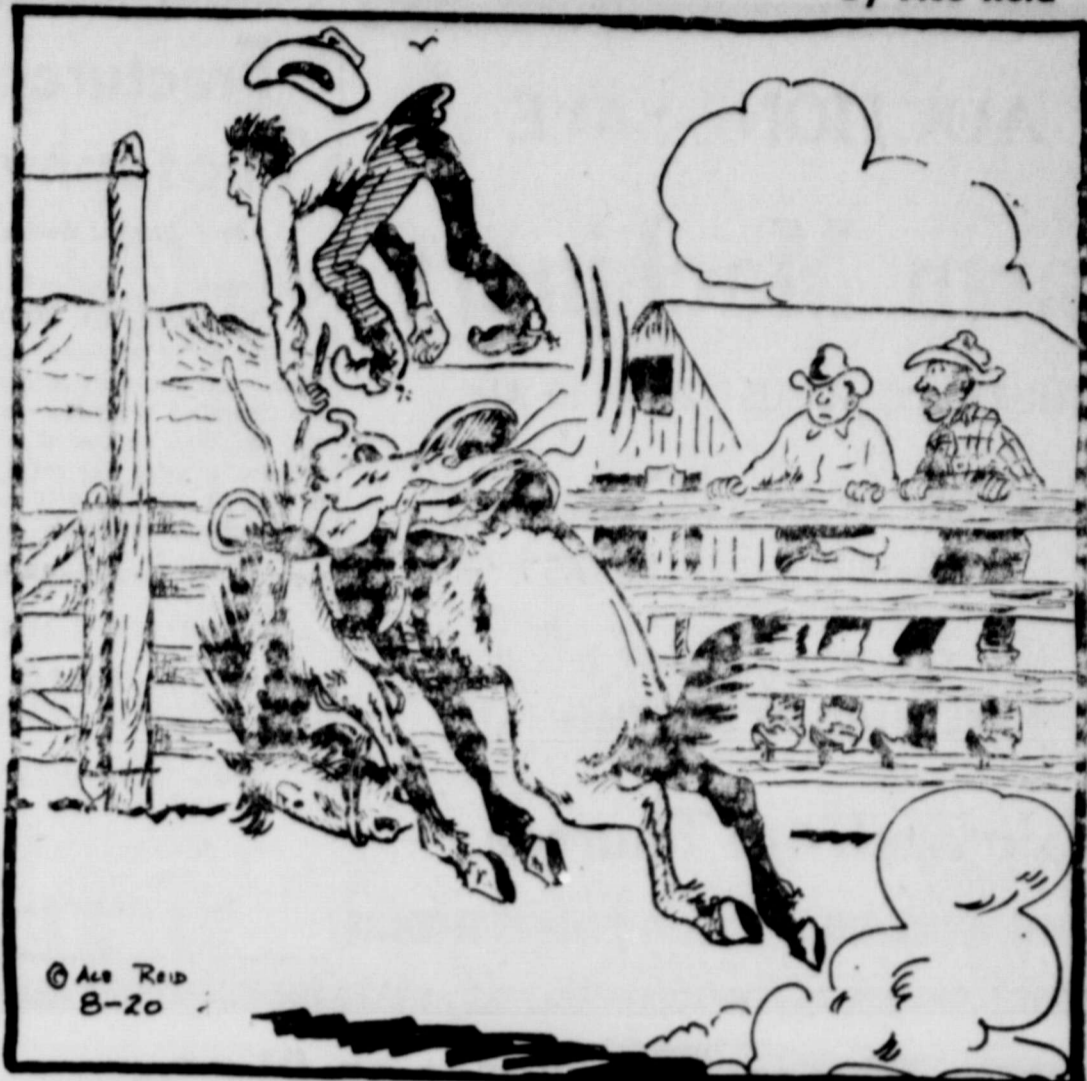
