COUNTY AGENT

By BILL MCCUTCHEON

It is time for county farmers to start thinking about small grain crops. Variety is of course a big consideration when planning a small grain crop and it may be difficult to find some small grain seed this year, particularly seed oats of the better variety. Ora is the oat variety primarily recommended for this area. Alamo-X, Taggart, New Nortex, and Moregrain are also adapted but are susceptible to the prevalent races of rust. The hard winter wheat varieties recommended for this area are Sturay is a newly developed wheat Sturd yis a newly developed wheat with high quality, production, cold tolerance, disease resistance, and standability but should be grown primarily on heavy river bottom soil or under irrigation, as the short stem would make it difficult to combine under normal upland conditions. The other varieties mentioned are familiar to area farmers as they have been used for several years. Barley varieties recommended for this area are Cordova, Rogers, and Zora. I understand that seed barley is also likely to be hard to find this year due to the drouth last year. For the farmer or rancher primarily interested in small grain for winter pasture, rve might be the answer, Elbon, Gator, Explorer and Bonel are excellent winter forage ryes for this area. Dove season is just around the corner, and according to a recent the Agricultural Agencies in the county and interested persons, this is the number one possibility of bringing in additional revenue to area farmers, ranchers, and local businesses.
