Enrollment Up As School Begins

The new school year got off to a good start Monday of this week, with a total enrollment of 296. Elementary school records showed an even 200 students enrolled, and 96 were counted in high school. Last year's total enrollment on the first day was 284.

A large group of parents was present for the opening assembly Monday morning. Rev. Hubert Taylor was speaker at the program.

Supt. O. C. Cook released the following enrollment by grade:

Supt. Cook also stated that considerable stress is being placed on keeping the Average Daily Attendance as high as possible this year. If parents will see that their children attend school every day, it is hoped that the ADA will be high enough to gain back the teacher lost last year. Since the number enrolled this year is high, Mr. Cook said that there was a good chance of regaining the teacher lost. "We sincerely appreciate all efforts

made to cooperate with the school in this," the superintendent said.

Mr. Cook said that appreciation was also felt for the good participation in the lunchroom program this year. A total of 245 students ate in the lunchroom Monday, and 236 Tuesday. "If participation figures continue so high, it is hoped that the program will soon begin to gain back some of the funds lost last year. It is felt that the lunchroom is a great asset and aid to the school system, and hope that we will be able to continue to operate," Mr. Cook said.

In other information released, Mr. Cook said "This opportunity is taken to welcome the new students enrolled this year to our school and community." New enrollees

★ YOUNG AND OLD MUST REGISTER FOR VOTE IN '68

Hamilton County Tax Assessor-Collector Pearl Williams has said that according to Texas' new voter registration law, everyone in the county of voting age will be required to register to be eligible to cast ballots in 1968 elections.

In the past Hamilton County voters over 60 years of age were exempt from registering or paying poll tax since non were residents of cities of 10,000 or more population.

The new law, recently upheld by the State Supreme Court requires everyone of voting age to register regardless of the population of the town in which the voter resides.

Mrs. Williams said that persons age 60 and over may vote in any elections between now and February 1, 1968, but to be eligible to vote in elections after that date, all must register.

Voter registration will begin October 1 and continue through January 31.

8,920 Operators Become Farm Owners Since 1937 thru FHA

Since the signing of the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act by President Franklin Roosevelt on July 22, 1937, more than 8,920 farm operators in Texas have either changed their status from tenants to farm owners or have been able to enlarge and develop their family farms to more efficient units, according to George Krupala, County Supervisor for Farmers Home Administration.

In looking back upon the past 30 years of the Farm Tenant Act, Judge Marvin Jones, co-author of the Act, said "What satisfies me is that the work of financing tenant home purchases and farm home improvements and water use, in expanded form, is helping to keep our country strong and free. In fact, I feel richly compensated for being called an impractical dreamer during the fight for the program."

In observing the 30th anniversary of the farm ownership loan program, Krupala said that in the 30-year period his agency had advanced some \$121,840,216 million to farmers in Texas, and that currently there were more than 3,618 active borrows in the program, of which Hamilton County has 45.

Krupala said the Bankhead-Jones Act established the concept of advancing to tenant farmers supervised long term, low interest credit up to 100 percent of the value of the farm, allowing them to purchase and develop family size farms. The first farm ownership loan made under the Bankhead-Jones Act was made in Van Zandt County, Texas, which has since been paid in full.

Each loan is based on a sound farm and home management plan and borrowers receive guidance in carrying out planned operation,

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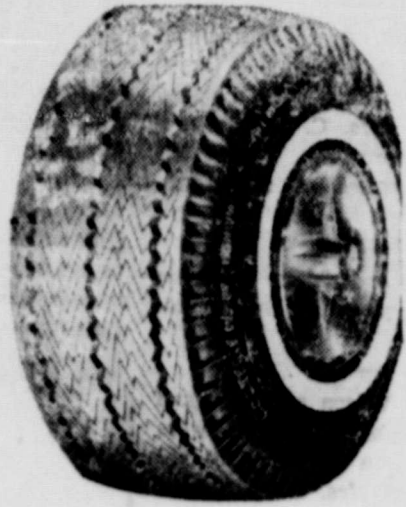

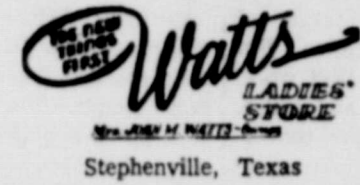
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Fractured Philosophy...

On the Home Range

Pots and pans can be shiny even with hard use, if you know how. Metal each pan is made of and treat it accordingly.

Wash aluminum utensils thoroughly in hot soap or detergent suds, then rinse with hot water. Remove stuck foods by boiling water a few minutes or by scraping with wooden spoon, plastic scouring pad or steel wool soap pad. Remove inside discoloration by cooking tomatoes, rhubarb, apples or other acid foods in the pan. Polished exterior surfaces need cleaning with a sudsy cloth or silver polish. Steel wool soap pads could scratch the surface.

Remove brownish or vari-colored "heat-tint" on pot bottoms with silver polish. Pans with copper bottoms are cleaned with vinegar or lemon juice and salt and a fine steel wool pad or commercial cleaner.

Nature offers the best materials for dried arrangements and now's the time to collect them. Dried plant materials are ideal for creat-

ing designs for fall and winter with an outdoor or nature theme.

Start now to collect grain, weeds, flowers, tree branches and driftwood and drying roses, marigolds, zinnias, salvia, pansies and carnations now in a box of dry sand. Place an inch of sand in the box. Carefully place the flowers on the sandy surface, and slowly pour additional sand over the flowers until covered. Put only one layer of flowers in a box, and allow 2 weeks for them to dry. At the end of this time, pierce holes in the bottom of the box and allow sand to drain.

Hang milkweed, poppy, yucca, and goldenrod upside down to dry. Preserve branches of magnolias, oaks, maples and some woody type flower in glycerin and water. Stand freshly cut branches in 2 inches of equal parts of glycerin and water about 2 weeks. Branches will have a glossy, fresh appearance and remain pliable.

Place leaves, ferns and grasses between sheets of newspaper and press with flat board. Spray dried materials with plastic or wax aerosols for prolonged keeping qualities.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

There has been a lot of interest in soybeans this year and several County Program Building Committee sponsored tests on this potential cash crop are being run in the county. So far the tests look promising, with the crop in the bloom and early pod stages, but there are several factors that will require a good long look.

The "Lesser Corn Stalk Borer" has damaged stands on the C. I. Thomas farm. Cotton root rot has caused some loss of plants on infested soil in other tests.

It is doubtful that present soybean varieties can be grown successfully without some irrigation. The soybean is as drought resistant as cotton until it reaches the bloom stage and water then is very critical.

The soybean looks quite promising as a high quality hay crop. Alvin and Willie Perry planted 14 acres

of the Laredo variety for hay. It was planted May 26 and harvested two weeks ago with a production of about a ton of high quality hay per acre. Samples were submitted to A&M for further analysis.

As a hay crop many problems are eliminated. It should be cut in the early bloom stage which is before the acute water need.

Make a plan, before doing any landscape work around your home. With a good plan, work can be carried out over a period of years and perhaps in keeping with available funds.

I would also advise against landscaping with so-called cheap fast growing trees and shrubs. It is far better to establish a few highly desirable ornamental trees and shrubs and to add to the plan over a period of time.

Top priority should be given to establishing the lawn area and planting of permanent shade trees. With a well developed landscape plan, the trees will have adequate room for growth and development and provide shade for your lawn rather than for a neighboring yard.

Remember to use plants, fences and walls to screen out unattractive views and to provide background, privacy and enclosures. Use trees and shrubs to frame the house or attractive views. Plants should be used to enhance the home—not hide it.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising, and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

WASHINGTON

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C.—Too often the Congress rushes in with "crash" programs in an attempt to solve problems after they have reached the crisis stage.

America has been undergoing changes more severe than occurred when it entered into the industrial age. The leap forward in scientific development and social evolution since the end of World War II have had staggering effect. With all the factors involved, one result, if not a cause itself, has been the influx of people from rural areas into urban settlement. A brief 25 years ago, Texas, for instance, was approximately 75 percent rural and small towns. Today, the reverse is true. The same is true generally all over the United States. It is pretty obvious this accounts for some of the social, political and economic upheaval which has resulted.

People are not likely to be happy in the big cities standing on one another's shoulders. The problems of crime, traffic, wretched housing, health and education are not likely to be solved under such conditions. Billions of Federal dollars are being spent on sort of a scotch-tape, band-aid and wire-string approach, but it is already proved the patch can not stick the strain.

Riding along a city street, looking at the teeming thousands living on their front steps, in the alleys and on sidewalks, one wonders why these people would not seek some wide open spaces, but it is what they know and the way they want to live.

There are others, however, who for economic reasons, are being driven from the farms and rural

areas to the larger centers of population, seeking opportunity to make a living.

Probably no incentive would be large enough to bring some of them back to the farms and the country, but there is a need for jobs in many of our small towns and those from farms who need to supplement the family income.

Legislation has been introduced to offer certain incentives for small town industries. The measure provides a tax incentive for plants to locate in rural small towns. It is proposed to increase to 14 percent the normal 7 percent investment credit on machinery, and give a 7 percent investment credit on the cost of constructing quarters for housing business. It provides for a stepped up depreciation of two-thirds of the normal life of machinery, equipment and buildings. It proposes to allow 125 percent deduction for wages paid to newly hired low income workers for a period of three years. It also permits what is known as a carry-back for three years and a carry over for ten years for all credits and deductions.

To guard against unfair treatment of communities in other parts of the country, the incentives are applied to a new operation so as not to induce a business already in operation to leave one community to go to another. The idea also proposes safeguards against coming into an area in competition with local business, but, rather to engage in an enterprise not competitive and one which would furnish jobs for people not employed. The proposal also carries a provision for training for new jobs.

These proposals are not viewed as simply benefiting a rural population. Rather, they should be viewed as a major effort to revitalize rural communities, with the residual benefit to our national economy. One of the most beneficial features of such an effort is the fact that only people with roots in a community will have a pride and a dedication toward making that community what it should be. The rural people, in their independence, have been one of the greatest factors in making our nation great. People's interest in their local institutions -- their churches, their schools, their concern for the welfare of their neighbor, recreation and cultural improvement -- is the foundation of good government and good living.

There is little encouragement to believe conditions will get better before they get worse. A more solid and long-range approach should hold the greatest prospect for solutions not now in sight.
