I have received calls from many homeowners who have been concerned about the black spotty looking material on their lawns. This is a fungi known as slime mold and covers grass with a dusty, bluish-gray, black or yellow mass. Slime molds are not parasitic on grass, but they are unsightly. They feed on dead organic material. The most damage they do to grass is to shade and discolor the blades. Slime molds occur during wet weather, and disappear rapidly as it becomes dry. The large masses can be broken up with a broom or by spraying with a strong stream of water. During prolonged damp weather, slime molds can be especially annoying and it may be desirable to apply any good garden or turf fungicide to affected areas.

Everything about this bird is cock-eyed, confused, and misled. It is hard for us to understand, but the time is here when action must be taken or the symbol of American freedom (the Eagle) is doomed.
