



TO USE STRIPE FOR AIR MAIL

U. S. Approves Red, White and Blue Design on Envelopes.

WASHINGTON .- A three-quarterinch red, white and blue stripe, horizontally across the middle of the face of an envelope was approved today by the post office department as a distinctive sign for exclusive use of air mail. In approving the design the department announced such envelopes for mail not intended to be carried by airplane would not be permitted. The government will not furnish these envelopes but users of the air mail may have their envelopes printed with the stripe. Use of the design is expected to facilitate the prompt handling of air mail.






