As It Looks From Here

Washington, D.C. - Newspaper people call it "scooped," and th's column was last week. There was nothing unfair about the release of news by the Administration that an Anti-Missile Defense System was to be built. In fact, it was the hope that this column would provide the "scoop" but Defense Secretary McNamara made his announcement a few days earlier than

Any way, here is more on the subject.

A hero out of Greek Mythology might have a name like SABMIS. but in this case it stands for Sea-Based Anti-Missile Intercept System. If developed it will mark the start of a new naval defense role. Its concept is to force potential enemies to spread their nuclear pattern, providing us with a greater in-depth defense.

The SABMIS plan is to place ships directly off the coast of Russia and China, equipped with intercepting Anti-Ballistic missiles. If enemy missiles can be intercepted relatively close to their launching, the
