Judge Roberts Speaks to P-TA **Group Monday Evening**

Americans to protect them from class gave the room program. The those who harm them," stated District Judge Truman E. Roberts Monday evening at the Hico P-TA meeting. Judge Roberts continued by informing the group that individual Americans have no right to choose which law they will obey and which law they will not obey. "At this point the protective fence called law and order is destroyed," reminded the speaker.

To encourage law and order in our town, state, and nation, Judge Roberts challenged his audience to erect a chair for the Four R's of Americanism. First, teach one's self and one's children how to reason as to what is right and what is wrong. Second, teach one's self and one's children respect for himself, neighbors, fellowmen and law enforcement personnel. Third, teach one's self and one's children responsibility. And fourth, teach one's self and one's children religionlet the motto on each coin minted in the USA be one's motto-"In God We Trust."

Judge Roberts concluded that America will have no trouble in regard to law and order as long as the Four R's of Americanism are regarded. However, he warned that if America loses her principles and regard for the Four R's she will have no other alternative but to take the broad path of destruction already taken by such countries as the Greeks, Roman Empire or the British Common-

This makes it evident that the isolated incident. It seems logical now that the screwworm may be rather widespread throughout the southern portion of the county, and possibly throughout the county.

Strong winds from Hurricana Beulah may have blown many fer tile native screwworm flies into South Texas from below the barrier zone in Mexico. The danger is that the buildup of native flies could occur in any part of Texas, and if unreported, could cause the screwworm situation to get out of control rapidly.
