City Sales Tax Issue Still Undecided

Hico City Council still had not set a definite date for an election to authorize collection of a one percent City Sales Tax, but Mayor W. C. Howard said that the matter was still being considered, and that the election would be called just as soon as all details were in order.

Attempts will be made to get the issue before the people sometime in March.

The announcement last week on the proposed tax brought about varied comment, but overall, those commenting on the pros and cons of such a tax have been about equally split for the measure and against such a tax.

Most comments for the issue have been in agreement with the council's reason for calling the vote—that the city needs more revenue, and a sales tax

is the most fair proposition that could be presented.

Those against the issue are merely opposed to further taxation, and feel that some other means could be found to secure additional revenue. However, no solutions on where to get the revenue have been offered.

In making announcement of the proposal last week, the mayor and council members cited the need for water and sewer improvements, and a huge street improvement program this summer, brought about by the severe and extremely wet winter season which damaged streets to a great extent. They further pointed out that the additional funds had to come from some source, and that even if a bond issue should be voted for the necessary improvements

an additional source of revenue would be required to repay the bonded indebtedness.

The sales tax, if adopted by Hico citizens, will be collected by the state in the same manner as the present state tax is collected. It will apply to all taxable items that presently fall under the state law. In simpler words, an item that now costs an additional two cents on the dollar will cost three cents if the city tax is voted.

Should the tax be voted on and adopted in March, earliest date for start of collection would be June 1, or the beginning of the third quarter of a taxable year.

A more definite announcement should be forthcoming next week.

County Superintendent Gives Trustee Filing Information

County School Superintendent W. B. McPherson Jr. has released information concerning the forthcoming school trustee elections.

Election of trustees will be held in all districts on Saturday, April 6th.

Time for filing applications as a candidate for trustee is as follows:

In all elections for the office of county school trustee or trustee of any school district the application for candidate for a place on the ballot shall be filed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the day of the election. Applications for candidates for trustee of an independent school district having fewer than 500 scholastics shall be filed

with the County Judge. For these elections five or more resident qualified voters may request that certain names be printed.

Application for candidates for trustee in a district with more than 500 scholastics shall be filed with the secretary of the school board of trustees.

Regardless of method used in filing each candidate is required to file a loyalty oath before his name can be printed on the ballot.

Republican Joins Race For Legislature

In a surprise announcement this week, the Republican Party will have a candidate in a race for an office that directly affects Hico people.

Chas. M. Isenhower of Clifton has filed for a place on the Republican ballot seeking the State Representative's post from the 54th District, which includes Hamilton, Bosque, Somervell, Johnson and Mills counties.

He will oppose the Democratic nominee in the November general election. Democratic candidates are incumbent J. E. Ward of Glen Rose and Herman L. Stone of Cleburne.

J. V. New of Hico, who is Republican chairman for this precinct, said Wednesday that a Republican Primary would be held in Hico and Hamilton County, the second such

primary in history. First Republican primary was held in 1964.

Hamilton County had voted Republican in the general election for the 12 years preceding 1964, which the Democrats won by a large margin.

Mr. Isenhower is a Clifton civic leader, businessman, rancher, and former mayor. He served as mayor of Clifton for eight years, and was active on legislative committees of the Texas Municipal League which represents some 660 cities in the state.

Mr. Isenhower served two years as president of the Texas Egg Council, and director of the National Egg Council, and was active in farm legislative work in those organizations.

He is 51 years old, a member of the Methodist Church, and a Mason, and received his formal education at Abilene Christian College and the University of Texas. He has resided in Bosque County 24 years.

FORMER HICO RESIDENT—

Not Even Paralysis Can Stop Miss White

(Ed Note: The following story concerns the daughter of former Hico residents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. White, and appeared in a Houston paper recently. The story was written by Jim Bosarge).

"There is no excuse for anyone not being able to work even if they are handicapped, unless their handicap is mental."

This statement comes not from a public relations man of an organization for the handicapped, but from 25-year-old Miss DeValca White, who has been totally handicapped since age 3.

Miss White has been working as a receptionist-clerk for the Easter Seals Society since the summer of 1962.

Dr. Jacqueline Gleckler, executive director of the society, said many people are surprised when they find that Miss White is totally handicapped, but because of her attitude, she represents the society in the highest manner.

"Many people in her shape would not consider employment. It's her attitude that makes it possible for her to function," said Dr. Gleckler.

Although she was born in Pecos, Texas, Miss White's family moved to Richmond, Calif., where she was stricken with polio. Miss White moved back to Texas with her family in 1951.

"What some people would consider a handicap has not hampered me in getting around or working," said Miss White.

She proved this by attending and graduating from San Jacinto High School in 1961, and by taking six hours of courses per semester at South Texas Junior College for two years.

Much of her spare time is spent in activities with the Indoor Sports Club, an organization for the handicapped, where she is treasurer, social chairman and telephone chairman.

When she is not working for the club Miss White makes pins out of cardboard and string and the popular box purses.

Miss White lives with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. White Jr., and brother at 5023 Grape, and it is to her parents that she gives credit for her attitude.

"They made me feel like a part of the family rather than stick me in a corner somewhere, and it was never a matter of they couldn't do something because I am handicapped," said Miss White.

She said her family would never let her just sit around, and when they did anything they would take her along.

Miss White knows how to swim, and has just recently received a motorized wheelchair that allows her to go shopping or to the movies when she wants.

"DeValca functions normally and has a real active social life with

other handicapped persons," said Dr. Gleckler, "and she never asks for any privileges as a handicapped person."

All is not roses, however, and Miss White is the first to admit that she at times becomes depressed about her condition, but when that happens she makes an effort to put her thoughts on something besides her problems.

"I can't stand people being depressed about being handicapped, and when I meet someone like that the only thing I can tell them is that they must have to accept the situation as it is," she said.

In Miss White's case the formula for avoiding depression seems to be productive activity, and she is very adamant about the availability of jobs for persons like herself.

"There's a job for everybody," she said. "It may not be the greatest in the world, but at least it is a job."

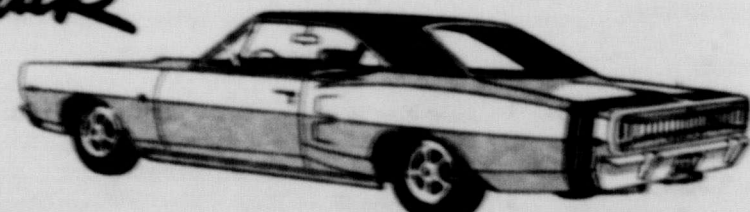

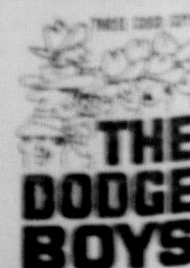
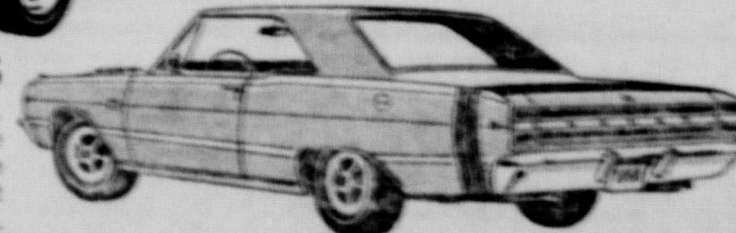

On the Home Range

Whether Washington chopped down his father's tree or not, he did his share in making the cherry famous. So much in fact, that most Washington's Birthday celebrations feature a cherry pie. But winter months always make an especially fine time to enjoy tempting desserts. So, what could be better than a slice of cherry pie. I would like to share one of my favorite cherry cream recipes with you and hope you will take time to prepare it during the month of February.

CHERRY O CREAM CHEESE PIE

One 8 oz. package cream cheese, one and one-half cups sweetened condensed milk, one-third cup lemon juice, one teaspoon vanilla extract, and one (1 lb. 3 oz.) can prepared Cherry Pie Filling. Let cheese stand at room temperature till soft, beat till fluffy. Gradually add sweetened condensed milk, stirring till well mixed. Add lemon juice, vanilla extract; stir until well mixed; turn into prepared crust. Chill 2 to 3 hours (do not freeze) before garnishing top with Cherry Pie Filling. You can use a Graham Cracker Crust or Core Flake Crumb Crust. Press into 9-inch pie plate. Chill.

Do not use lemon extract. If you use frozen lemon juice, make juice of regular strength.

Potatoes—a lot of potatoes. You'll find potatoes of all kinds in the store. There are potatoes for baking, potatoes for boiling, potatoes for mashing, for frying, for chips and even plenty of potatoes for making starch.

We're eating more potatoes than we used to. In 1947, each American averaged 177.4 pounds, including canned and frozen potatoes, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. That's almost 38 percent more than each person consumed in 1927-28.
