Hico Will Receive 20% Credit on Insurance Rates After April 1st

Hico area residents will have a 20 percent credit on their fire insurance premiums, effective April 1, according to Mrs. Odis Petsick.

Local residents received a 15 percent credit last year, and low fire losses increased the credit which is deducted from total fire insurance premiums.

The credit is allowed on a three-year period of fire losses within the city, and is set by the State Insurance Commission.

City Council Rescinds Ordinance On Sales Tax

Ice and Snow Cause Hico Students to Enjoy Unscheduled Holiday

Hico school students received an unexpected holiday Friday of last week as snow and ice made driving conditions hazardous, particularly in the rural sections.

Snow began falling here early Thursday afternoon, and temperatures stayed at 29 degrees during the night. The snowfall was the greatest of the year, and completely blanketed the ground.

Local students are due another holiday, this one scheduled Friday, March 8, when local teachers will attend a district meeting at Waco.

Conflict With School, City Voting Given as Reason

In a turn-about, city officials Tuesday night declared the ordinance ordering a City Sales Tax election passed last week as null and void.

The action came after an opinion from the General Counsel, Texas Municipal League, that the election must be held on the same day as the regular general city election.

The city election, in which three aldermen and a mayor will be named, will be held on the first Saturday in April—instead of the first Tuesday as in the past—which is April 6th, same day as the school

trustee balloting.

The 60th Legislature, meeting in 1967, passed a resolution to the effect that all general law cities hold alderman and mayor elections on the first Saturday. No official information had been received here of the change until the fact was brought out by TML counsel.

The order further stated that any ordinance adopted pertaining to the City Sales Tax to be voted on within a 30-90 period, said period falling within date for a regular city election, that such sales tax election would be held on the same day as the regular city election.

Local officials felt that the three elections—city, school, and sales tax—having one common balloting place, would put an extreme amount of confusion upon voters, and election officials, since Hico Independent School District composes parts of three counties.

All council members were present at the Tuesday night meeting, and all were of the opinion that the sales tax vote would be brought before the people at a later date. No specific time was mentioned for a possible vote.

The officials stood firm on their contention that additional revenue would be needed before the year was out, and the sales tax appeared to be the best method by which to gain the funds.

City Election Changed to First Saturday in April

Hico City Election, which has been held on the first Tuesday in April in years past, has been set for the first Saturday, which falls on April 6th this year.

The change is the result of a bill passed in the 60th Legislature last year, whereby all cities falling under general law would hold their elections on the latter date.

The latest information came from General Counsel of Texas Municipal League. The new law does not effect Home Rule cities, which may

set election within a period specified in their general charter.

The ruling throws both the city balloting and trustee election for Hico Independent School District on the same day. Both will be held at City Hall.

Two Candidates Have Filed

Only two candidates had filed Wednesday for a place on the official city ballot. Jim Jamison and Tommie Pierce are both seeking re-election to a council seat. G. M. Bullard, the other incumbent alderman, had not filed for re-election, and neither had Mayor W. C. Howard.

Final filing date has been advanced from March 2 to March 6, in keeping with the 30-day time period allowed for candidates to file.

Trustee Candidates

At mid-morning Wednesday, only three names had been filed with Hamilton County Judge H. W. Standifer for school trustee in the

The McCoy boys mentioned in last week's news were sons of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. L. McCoy of Fairy.

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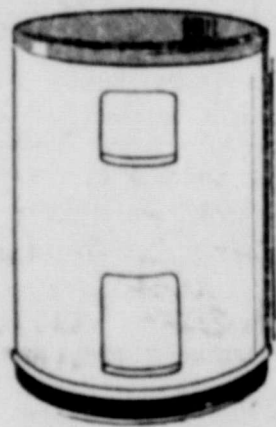

Third Grade Class Members Tour Local Post Office

Twenty-five third grade students and their teacher were special guests at the local post office a few days ago.

Mr. Robert Jackson, postmaster, directed the students to follow the path of a letter as it traveled through the post office. Removing a large number of letters from the letter box he ran them through the automatic canceling machine in a matter of a few seconds. From here the mail is sorted. Out of town mail is placed in separate boxes for that purpose. Mail for local residents is placed in their boxes.

Mail for the rural route is sorted by each rural carrier. This mail goes out on the routes once each day. Mr. Jackson told the students there were four routes in the Hico area. Each child had a chance to find his family name on the rural route boxes.

Cops' Life No Bed of Roses, But Has Rewarding Moments

Washington, D.C. — The Policeman's lot is not an easy one. With the great increase in the crime rate, you might find of interest "What Is A Cop," taken from "The Shield," the publication of the Abilene Police Association.

"Cops are human (believe it or not) just like the rest of us. They come in both sexes but mostly male. They also come in various sizes. This sometimes depends on whether you are looking for one or trying to hide something. However, they are mostly big.

"Cops are found everywhere—on land, on the sea, in the air, on horses, in cars, sometimes in your hair. In spite of the fact that 'you can't find one when you want one,' they are usually there when it counts most. The best way to get one is to pick up the phone.

"Cops deliver lectures, babies, and bad news. They are required to have the wisdom of Solomon, the disposition of a lamb and muscles of steel, and are often accused of having a heart to match. In fiction, he gets help from private eyes, reporters, and 'who-dun-it fans.' In real life, mostly all he gets from the public is 'I didn't see nuttin'."

"When he serves a summons, he's a monster. If he lets you go, he's a doll. To little kids, he's either a friend or a bogeyman, depending on how the parents feel about it. He works 'around the clock,' split shifts, Sundays and holidays.

and it always kills him when a joker says, 'Hey, tomorrow is Election Day, I'm off, let's go fishing' (that's the day he works 20 hours).

"A cop is like the little girl, who, when she was good, was very, very good, but, when she was bad, she was horrid. When a cop is good, he's getting paid for it. When he makes a mistake, he's a grafter, and that goes for the rest of them too. When he shoots a stick-up man he's a hero, except when the stick-up man is 'only a kid, anybody coulda seen that.'

"Lots of them have homes, some of them covered with ivy, but most of them covered with mortgages. If he drives a big car, he's a chiseler; a little car, 'who's he kidding?' His credit is good; this is very helpful, because his salary isn't. Cops raise lots of kids; most of them belong to other people.

"A cop sees more misery, bloodshed, trouble, and sunrise than the average person. Like the postman, cops must also be out in all kinds of weather. His uniform changes with the climate, but his outlook on life remains about the same: mostly a blank, but hoping for a better world.

"Cops like days off, vacations, and coffee. They don't like auto horns, family fights, and anonymous letter writers. They have unions, but they can't strike. They must be impartial, courteous and always remember the slogan, 'At your service.' This is sometimes hard, especially when a character reminds him, 'I'm a taxpayer, I pay your salary.'

"Cops get medals for saving lives, stopping runaway horses, and shooting out with bandits (once in a while his widow gets the medal.) But sometimes, the most rewarding moment comes when, after some small kindness to an older person, he feels the warm hand clasp, looks into grateful eyes and hears, 'Thank you and God bless you, son'."

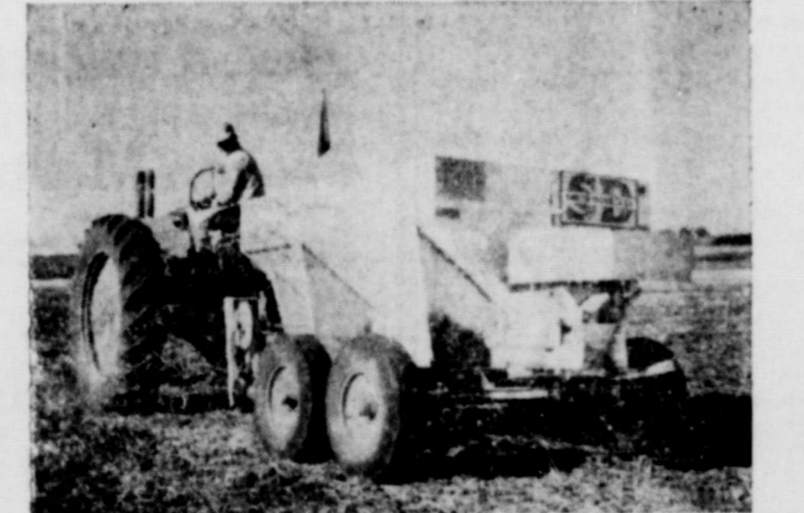

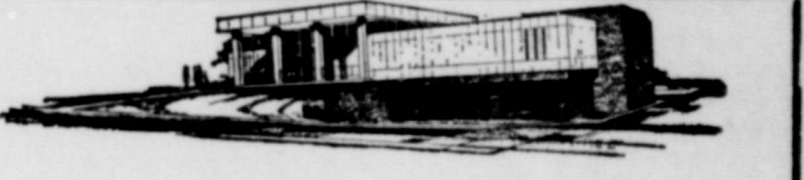
