# 2 For Mayor's Post; 6 In Council Race

City politics picked up considerably late Wednesday with the filing of two candidates for mayor, and a sixth in the alderman's race.

Latest to file were P. W. Hamilton and O. L. Davis, both for mayor, and present mayor W. C. Howard filed for a place on the council. Previously, five candidates had filed for a place on the ballot, seeking three council seats, and no candidates had filed for mayor.

The list of candidates looked like this at 5 p.m. Wednesday:

For Alderman (three to be elected):

Jim Jameson and Tommie Pierce, both seeking re-election, Jess Bobo, Sherman Roberson, Ray Keller, and W. C. Howard.

For Mayor: P. W. Hamilton and O. L. Davis.

Prior to 3 p.m. Wednesday only the original five candidates had filed, all seeking the alderman's places. No candidates had filed for mayor. Hamilton was the first to file for mayor, and Howard added his name to the alderman slate.

Later Wednesday afternoon, Davis added his name to the ticket for the post of mayor.

Mayor Howard had maintained all along that he would not seek another term as head of the city, but upon insistence of friends, he placed his name among the candidates for alderman.

The Mayor Candidates

Both candidates for mayor are well known here. Hamilton is the former Katy Railroad agent who retired late last year when the railroad was abandoned. He is a former peace justice of Precinct 3.

Davis, local manager for Community Public Service Co., served several years on the city council in the mid-1950's.

City election is slated to be held Saturday, April 6, same day as the school trustee balloting.

School Election

Through Wednesday noon, only three names had been filed for Trustee of Hico Independent School District. Names of Guy Bulman, Tommy Johnson, and D. L. McCoy were filed last month, and according to County Judge Herman Standifer, no other prospects had placed their name on the list.

The school election will also be held Saturday, April 6th, and like the city race, candidates have until 30 days prior to the election to place their names on the ballots.

At neighboring Carlton, three names have been filed for two places on the trustee ballot. R. H. Mercer and Thad Tatum are seeking re-election, and W. A. Hail is the third candidate for election to the board.

### CPS Manager Says 'Go Fly A Kite,' But Remember Safety Rules

Did you make a note of what the groundling had to say about when you can expect Spring this year? Or, if there is one in your neighborhood, have you checked a message tree to see if it has started budding? Failing these, scan the windy sky. If it is dotted with swaying, diving kites you can be sure that Spring is not far behind.

Kite-flying is a traditional sport that never seems to lose its charm to young and old alike, and, whether young or old, smart kite fliers will observe the basic rules of safety, according to G. L. Davis, Community Public Service Company commercial manager.

"One of the most important rules," emphasizes Mr. Davis, "is never to fly a kite when there is a possibility of its getting entangled in electric wires."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite-flying include using metal string or wire, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve a kite if it becomes tangled in electric wires. As reminder, CPS has distributed kite safety posters for school bulletin boards.
