Stock Show Will Go On Despite Damp Conditions

Homemaking Division Will Be Held on Same Day

Stock Show officials were anxiously watching the weather, and hoping that the rain would quit, and the sunshine would come out for the 21st Annual Show slated Friday at City Park. Weather conditions the past two years have been ideal, and officials are hoping for more of the same for this show.

Considering advance entries, the show should again attract a large crowd to Hico, and with a new division added, the town should be full of visitors for the day.

Added this year is the Homemaking Division, which will be held at Community Public Service Co. building and Hico Theatre. Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, local homemaking teacher, is in charge.

4 p.m. at CPS building, with a style show of garments at 2 p.m. at Hico Theatre.

This division is open to high school age girls in FHA and 4-H Club work, with divisions broken down into Foods, Clothing, and Art and Handwork.

Contest judges are Mrs. Berniece Murray, County HD Agent from San Saba, and Miss Kay Behrens, Somervell County HD Agent, who will place clothing entries.

Food judges will be Mrs. R. L. Staggs of Hamilton, Mrs. C. H. King of South Hico HD Club, and Mrs. C. E. Barr and Mrs. R. B. McClure of Clairette HD Club.

Handwork judges are Mrs. H. V. Hedges and Mrs. Marvin Marshall.

Trophies in the Homemaking Department will be presented by Salmon-Ross Dept. Store, H&B Food Store, and Blair's Hardware. Howard Drug Co. will present the "Best of Show" award.

Weather permitting, Hico should be a beehive of activity for the two shows, and local people are urged to participate by viewing the various exhibits at both divisions of the show.

Stock Show

Two first-rate judges have been secured by Harold Walker and his FFA Chapter, sponsors of the show, to judge various divisions during the day.

W. M. Oliver of the Animal Science Department, Texas A&M University, will judge livestock. Joel Hillin, Assistant Professor of Dairy Science, Tarleton State College, will judge the dairy division. Both are familiar figures in Hico, having judged here in the past.

Judging schedule for the day is: Swine, 9:00 a.m.; Goats, 10 a.m.; Sheep, 11:00 a.m.; Dairy, 1:30 p.m.; Beef Cattle, 3 p.m.; and the dog show will be held at 3 p.m.

Trophies for Junior Exhibitors will be presented by Howard Drug, J. B. Woodard Produce, Community Public Service Co., Hico Automotive, and Erath Co. Electric. An additional trophy will be presented by Texas Pollettes to the junior exhibiting the best Polled Hereford heifer at the show.

Miss Loyd Will Receive State Degree at FHA Convention

Miss Charlotte Jean Loyd, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Loyd, has earned the State Degree of Achievement, highest award presented a Future Homemaker of America. Miss Loyd, a Hico High

School senior, filed her declaration of intention to work toward the degree last June, and has spent the present school year achieving her goal and writing the degree.

The State Degree is an autobiography including a life story and description of the student's home town, and activities that were accomplished as an FHA member that have influenced her family, her school, her church, and her community. Miss Loyd presented her degree work at the annual Area IV FHA meeting in Stephenville, along with 36 other FHA members from the area. The degrees were graded and evaluated by a committee of six from various schools throughout the area.

With achieving this coveted award Miss Loyd will be entitled to attend the State FHA Convention in Austin, along with two other delegates from the Hico Chapter. During the convention, she will be recognized and presented to the delegates attending as having received her degree.

Miss Loyd becomes the fifth Hico High School student to earn the state degree. Misses Denna Meador and Carthy Cryer received their state degrees in 1966, and Misses Vicki Keller and Mary Beth Martin earned their degrees in 1967.

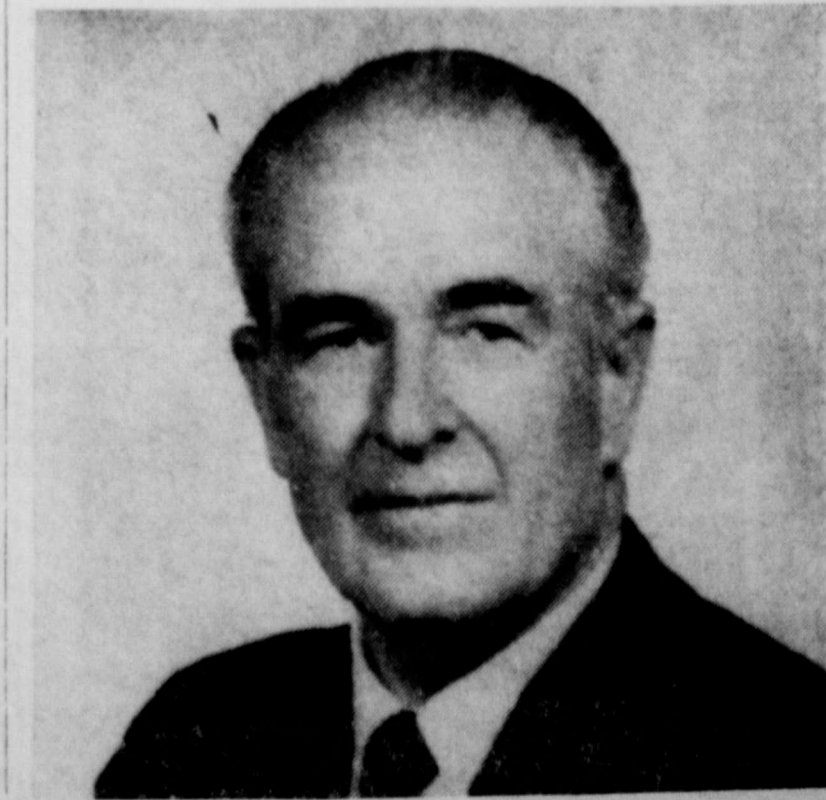

the 300-foot tower in the Cox-Weaver Addition. At the base of the tower will be located a modern masonry "Head End" building that will filter out all interference and deliver to the customers' home a trouble-free signal.

Mr. Spurlock said the system would initially carry FM reception, eight VHF television channels, and two UHF channels. With the system in the construction stages, Mr. Spurlock said that installation charge would be \$7.50, with a monthly charge of \$5.50.

However, as an introductory offer, all residents who make application during the construction period, the company will make the installation free of the \$7.50 charge.

Following the construction period, the installation charge will be required. The monthly \$5.50 fee will be for one connection, and additional connection will be made for fifty cents per month extra.

Advantages of the cable system, according to Mr. Spurlock, include a highly stable signal level on all channels offered, with virtual elimination of visual and audio interference. Mr. Spurlock said the results will be greatly improved quality and much clearer pictures for black and white televisions, and will provide particularly the quality reception required for excellent color television viewing. The new cable system will not interfere in any way with present house-top antenna reception.

Telco is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Gulf States-United Telephone Co.

The exact date for placing the new cable system in operation will be announced later.

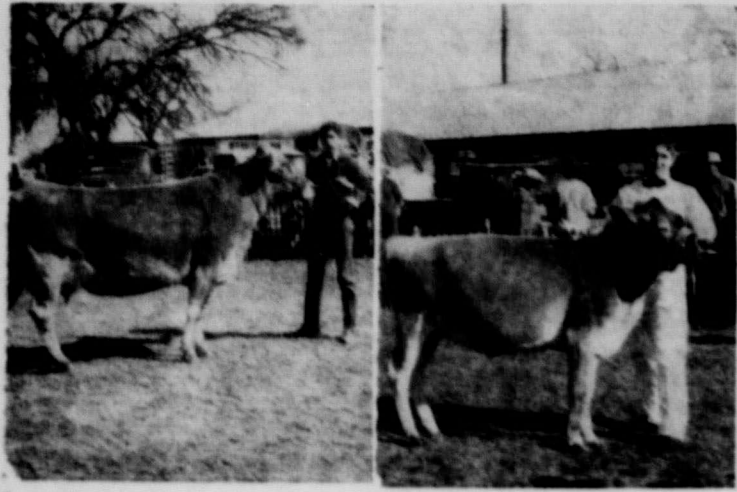

Before leaving Temple we drove by our cousin's, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Phillips and found their son, Foy Phillips of Wichita Falls there.

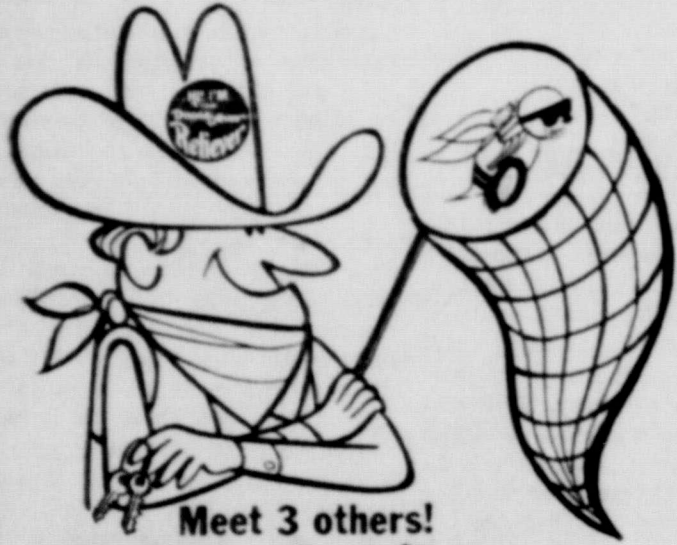

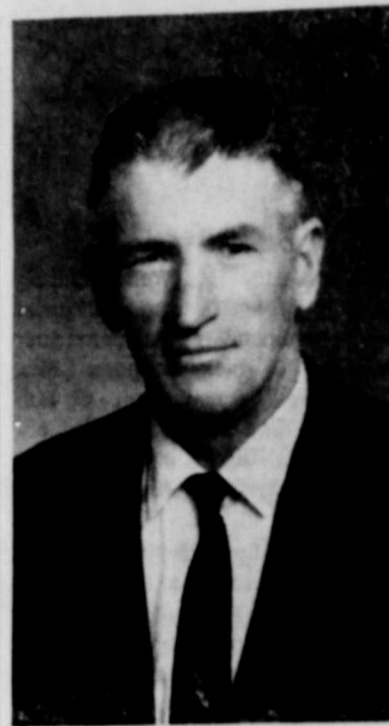
The district includes Jonsson, Somervell, Bosque, Hamilton and Mills counties. The incumbent representative is J. E. Ward of Glen Rose.

"To me," Stone continued, "it is an elemental necessity that it be passed. I'm not talking about reducing revenues from farm or ranch lands, businesses or sales taxes," he added. "My prime concern is over our senior citizens who live in a relatively small home on a limited budget."

"They are not growing rich in this day and age of our nation giving billions of dollars foreign nations. Instead, they are trying to enjoy the comforts of life left to them."

"I believe in, and will work toward the goal of, immediate and proper legislation action to exempt the first \$3,000 value of residence

homesteads of all persons 65 or older. They have worked long and hard through many difficult years, their efforts to retain their God-given dignity as self-supporting individuals must be respected. A tax break in their favor will certainly be of benefit to them, and it can't possibly hurt the overall economy of our state."

"I am confident that the great State of Texas does not need their ad valorem taxes on that first \$3,000 value of their home. If it does, then our state is in a dire financial position."

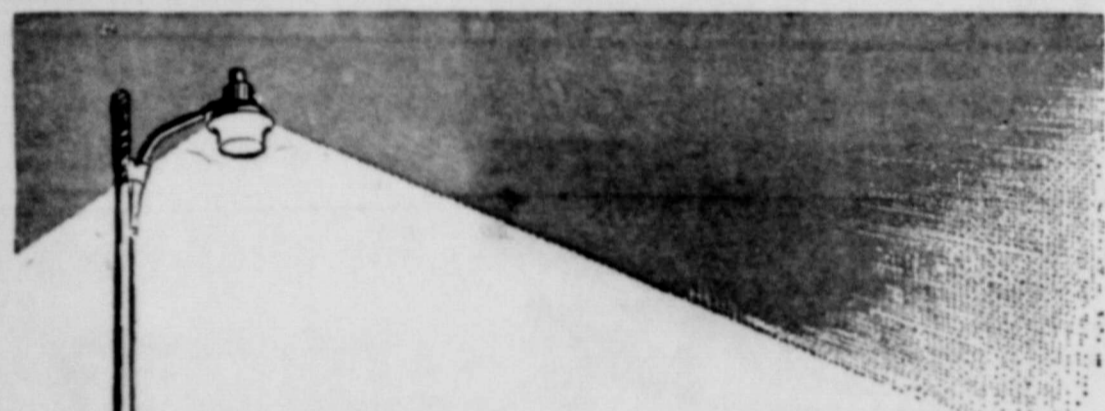

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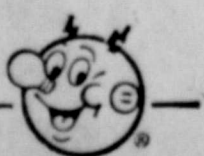

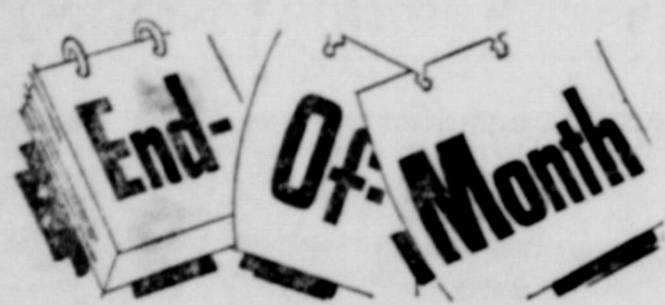
