City, School Voting Is This Saturday

Hico voters have their first opportunity to exercise their registration privileges this Saturday, when both the city and school elections will be held.

Both elections will be held at City Hall, and Louise Blair will preside over both as judge. To keep confusion at a minimum, ballots for the two elections were printed on two different colors of paper. The city ballot is pink, while the school ballot is the traditional white.

Voters will have a choice in the City Council election, with six names gracing the ballot for the three places to be filled. Not so in the school election, however as only three candidates are seeking the three places to be filled.

Only one candidate is running for Mayor.

City candidates are as follows, in the order that they appear on the ballot:

O. L. DAVIS, local manager for Community Public Service Co., seeking his first term as mayor. Davis has previously served on the local council. He is unopposed.

TOMMIE PIERCE, local accountant, bookkeeper, and theatre operator, seeking re-election to his second term on the Council.

SHERMAN ROBERSON, retired butcher and painter, seeking his first term on the Council.

J. R. BOBO, local electrician, asking for his first term on the Council.

W. C. HOWARD, Hico druggist, former councilman and retiring mayor, seeking a Council seat.

JIM JAMESON, Mobil Oil Consignee, asking re-election to the Council.

RAY KELLER, former butane route salesman, and now associated with Hico Real Estate, seeking his first term on the Council.

G. M. Bullard declined to place his name for re-election to a council seat.

School Election

For the first time in 12 years there is no opposition in the Hico School Trustee election. Names appearing on the ballot are those of Guy Bulman, Tommy Johnson, and D. L. McCoy.

Also on the school ballot are names of V. H. Jenkins, seeking re-election as County Trustee, Precinct 3, and Lagree West, County Trustee at Large.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Who Can Vote.

Only those citizens residing within the corporate city limits of Hico may cast ballots in the municipal election. School eligibility covers any person residing within Hico Independent School District.

Tarleton Senior Ag Student Is Practice Teaching Here

Mr. Dwight Nanny, Senior Agricultural Education student from Tarleton State College, began his assignment as student teacher in the Vocational Agriculture Department of the local school last Monday, March 25. Mr. Nanny will complete 33 school days of work with the local system.

Tarleton State College is in its first year as a Teacher Training Center for agriculture teachers, and one of the requirements for graduates in Ag Education is that they do student teaching in the field under the supervision of staff members and teachers from the selected schools which participate in the training program. Mr. Nanny will complete requirements for his B.S. degree in May.

Mr. Nanny is 24 years of age. He attended Tolar Public Schools, and is married to the former Terrye Williams of Mozelle. They are presently living at Aledo where Mr. Nanny also manages a ranch. He was on the Tolar FFA Poultry team that won first place in State competition, and participated in the national contests. At Tarleton he participated on the Collegiate team in Livestock Judging which won many honors, including first place in the Houston Livestock Show contest.

Mr. Nanny will be teaching and assisting Harold Walker, local VA teacher.

Olin Ridenhower, A Rebel At Best, Led Colorful Life

Samuel Olin Ridenhower was born January 22, 1886 at the family ranch which was named for him, and he died in Houston February 27, 1968 at the age of 82.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 29, in Hico First Methodist Church, with interment in the family plot at Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Ridenhower is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Carl Lawrence Brazell of Marion, Ohio, Mrs. Jerry V. Walker of Houston, and Miss Elizabeth Miller Ridenhower of San Antonio; and five grandchildren.

Pallbearers were M. C. Blackburn, J. O. Guest, Dr. J. L. Morris, T. A. Tunnell, Raymond G. Pipkin, William H. Berry Jr., and John Berry.

Last of Pioneer Family
Mr. Ridenhower was the last of a pioneer Texas family. His parents, Orpha Jane Blackman and E. K. Ridenhower, met at Carbondale University. Both graduated in 1875. They were married on Sept. 20, 1875 in Stone Fort, Ill., and left there to go to Dallas for their honeymoon. Both taught school in and near Dallas for a year or so. Their first born son, Harris Calvin Ridenhower, was born at Cedar Hill. He only lived three months, and his grave was never found, but a marker is placed on the family plot in Hico.

The Ridenhowers moved to this general area where they taught school in Hamilton and Bosque counties. In 1879 their second son, Ray Ridenhower was born. It was about this time that the ranch at Olin was purchased (though not named Olin at that time). In 1883 a daughter, Adah Lee, was born, and in 1886 Samuel Olin Ridenhower was born.

He attended Hico schools, and Southwestern University at Georgetown.

In the early days the three children walked to schools in and around Olin. They later got a cart and drove to school at Dry Fork or near there.

The family moved to Hico in 1893 for the children to attend school. His parents were most interested in education. His mother kept boarders, and his father stayed at the ranch and herded the sheep. There were no fences at that time. Olin could remember herding sheep with his sister until he was seven, and then herding them alone. He also recalled that in 1898 or '99 the first 10-cent cotton was sold. Wool brought 10 to 20 cents. At that time the sheep

business was so bad that a carload of fat sheep wouldn't pay their own freight. When his father was advised of this he wrote the commission company, saying that he didn't have any money and he would send more sheep.

In 1899 the family bought a lot about one block from the Hico schools and 80 acres adjoining it.

In 1910 this land was sold, and the family built a house on the ranch. He helped build the house and the present dwelling sits on and same foundation. In 1901 or 1902, his father drifted three

ty small grain producers. Damage is not wide-spread as yet, but heavy infestations have been noted in some fields.

I would advise keeping a close check on the small grain crops for the next several weeks, as this is the time of year we may expect heavy greenbug infestation. Tell-tale yellow spots in the field are good indicators of heavy infestation.

Planting grain sorghum and corn this late in the season may present problems to many Hamilton County producers who have been hampered by the wet, cool weather.

Although many producers have had little chance to prepare their land for planting, there is still time to do the job correctly without disturbing the soil too much.

Care should be taken not to over-work the soil and possibly lose necessary moisture which may lead to problems in getting a good stand. A minimum of tillage should be the rule in readying the land.

A regular medium-late maturing variety should be planted at a rate of six to eight pounds of seed per acre. With warm weather and warm nights, seed planted now should produce a good stand in five to seven days.

If you haven't already fertilized, and can't fertilize as you plant it may be added later. From the time the plants emerge until they reach 10-14 days old a complete fertilizer can be chisled into the soil about 10 inches from the young plants. If it is not possible to get into the field for three or four weeks after emergence, then nitrogen should be side-dressed rather than a complete

fertilizer. The nitrogen should be chisled about 20 inches from the plants and about four to six inches deep.

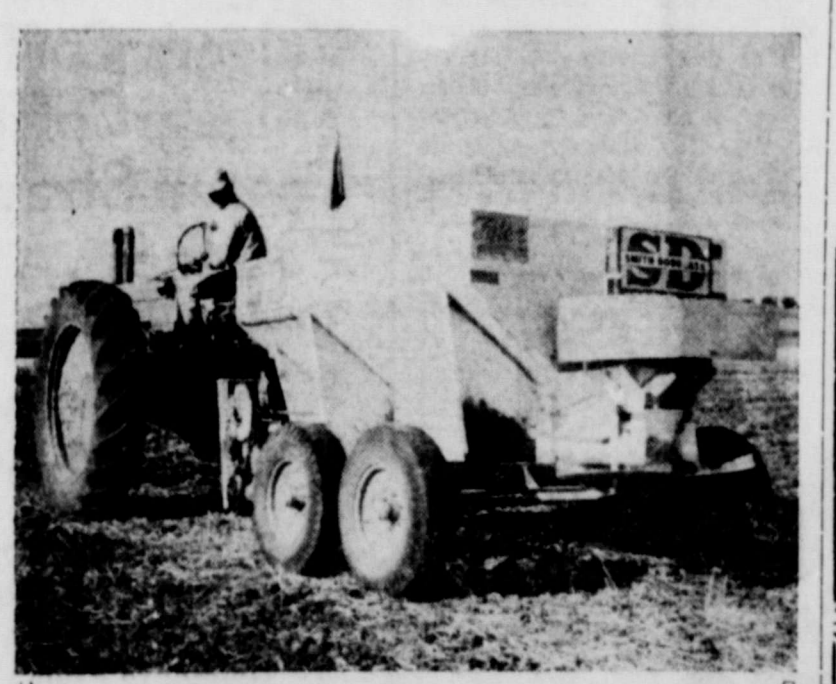

bunches of sheep to Crockett County in flocks of 1,500 each, and would sell them in order to get money to fence his ranch at Olin.
Ranch in Operation 95 Years
At some time his family sold

off part of the Hamilton County ranch and bought 10 sections of land near Silverton in Briscoe Co. When the price rose to where he could make \$10 an acre profit, he sold it. The Olin ranch has been in continuous operation for 95 years.

In 1900 the family took two covered wagons and an extra saddle horse and went to Lubbock. An oil man from Corsicana had offered \$10,000 for the Olin place, and his father and mother agreed to take it if they could find something they wanted. Ironically they could have bought 10 sections of land where Texas Tech now stands but his mother wouldn't agree to it because there were no schools there at the time and she felt her children must have an education. The Galveston flood occurred as they were returning from Lubbock and they spent several days in a school house near Cisco as the rains were so bad.

The brothers, Olin and Ray, and their father ranched together until 1923 when their father died. In 1925 he and his brother bought a ranch in Kimble and Edwards counties, near Junction, which was composed of about 10 sections. He loved this ranch and the ranching business, and probably the happiest days of his life were spent there. He was 40 year old when they bought the Junction ranch, and he often said that no one should give up at 40. He said he made what money he had after that time. In 1963 he sold the Junction ranch because of the labor problem, saying he was too old to run it properly and he was unable to

get enough help. In the early days at the ranch he could get help from Del Rio or across the Border, often as many as 30 Mexican families worked on the ranch. It was quite an operation, and he was never happier than riding his horse all over the beautiful hill country.

His children were brought up on the ranch with a private teacher because there was no money in the school district to allow for a public school, with the exception of a few years when he and a neighbor hired a teacher. The nearest school was 25 miles—at Junction—and there was no bus service.

It was necessary to buy food and all ranch supplies for the family in such large quantities that they had to have a commissary. Everything was bought by the case, and pinto beans in 100-lb. sacks, several at a time.

Not Meant to be Minister.

Olin was a rebel at its best. He did not graduate from Hico High School because he had a personality conflict with the principal. But Southwestern University gave him entrance exams which he passed. He disliked the school as he wanted to go to Texas A&M, but his mother wanted him to be a minister (the most unlikely candidate of her children). So he would come and go to college at will. The school allowed him to get by with it because of his athletic ability.

After two years of this his family made him quit school and go to work on the ranch at Olin, and hired a man to work with him. He got up at 4 a.m. every morning, but many times he would go to parties and not get home until almost time to get up. He was born

to ranch—not to get an education. The Ridenhower family gave the land for the community of Olin, and also for the Baptist Church and Olin School.

He was a colorful figure, and his gifts to Hico First Methodist Church, Hico Center, and other projects were many.

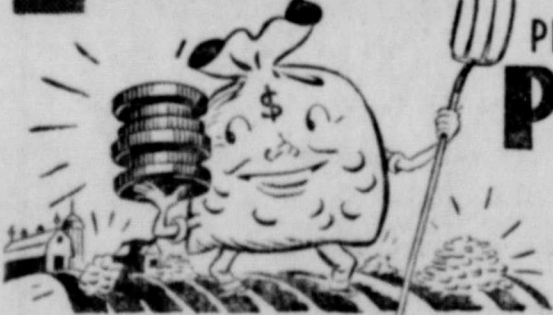
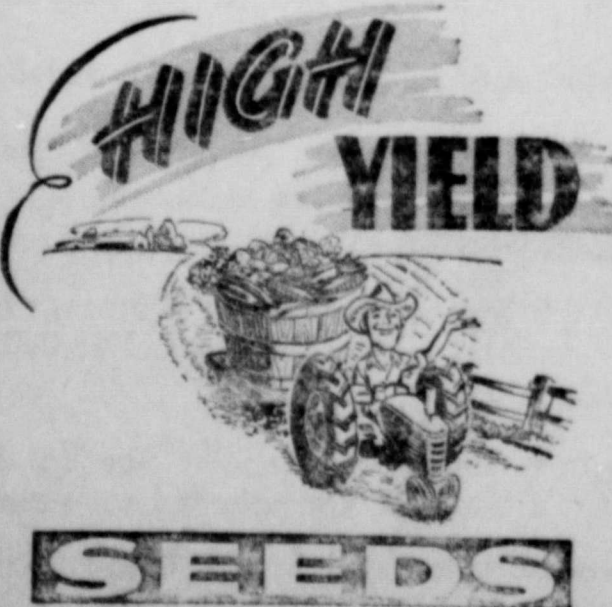
