Sheriffs Race to Be Decided In June 1st Primary Balloting

A hot Sheriff's and Commissionarea resident, died in Hico Nursing er's race brought out Hico voters Home Wednesday, May 1, after a 470 strong last Saturday in the large turn-out at the polls, were initial Democratic balloting, with

the Sheriff's race being continued through the June 1 second primary. The total vote in Hico was the exact number cast in the 1966 Democratic primary.

Three candidates, including incumbent Woody Young, L. H. (Boots) Young, and John Newt Harvey were on the ballot, with Woody Young leading county-wide by a small 93-vote margin. The incumbent received 1,098 votes, Boots the ballot was properly marked, Young was close behind with 1005. the election judge could not count and Harvey trailed with 515 votes. the vote. The tallies are unofficial.

In the Precinct 3 Commissioner's race, incumbent Fred Rainwater won another term over Leslie Patterson by a 398-308 margin.
