## With July Billing—

# City Water Bills Will Be Higher

In a move to secure additional revenue for the City of Hico, members of the city council authorized a blanket increase in water and sewer rates. The action was taken at the June meeting of the governing body.

In explaining the need for the rate increases, Mayor O. L. Davis said that the city had expended between \$6,000-\$7,000 since the first of this year in repairing pumps and equipment at the water works. Pumps were repaired and parts replaced in order to get full capacity from the wells during peak usage periods this summer. The work be-

came necessary after a water shortage developed last summer, and people were placed on a voluntary ration basis.

New rates will become effective with the July billing.

Most of the increase will be in the minimum rate structure, that is water used up to 2,000 gallons per month. The old rate was sixty cents per 1,000 gallons, or \$1.20 for the first 2,000 gallons. The above rates are for household users within the city limits. New minimum rate on this amount is \$2.00.

People residing outside the city limits, but who are on city water

mainly will be charged at the rate of \$3.00 for the first 2,000 gallons, or \$1.50 per 1,000.

Commercial water rates went up accordingly, with the minimum for businesses and other commercial users set at \$3.00. Commercial users outside the city limits will be charged \$3.50 for the same amount of water.

A break-down on new water rates was released as follows:

### Residential (Within City Limits.)

First 2,000 gallons, \$1.00 per thousand; next 2,000 gallons, 75c per thousand; next 4,000 gallons, 60c per thousand; next 4,000 gallons, 50c per thousand; excess, 30c per thousand.

Meter deposit, \$10.00; transfers \$2.00; reconnects (for non-payment) \$2.00.

Residential sewer charge will be \$1.00 per month. Sewer connection is \$35.00 for a new customer, and transfers or connections, \$1.00.

### Commercial (Within City Limits)

First 2,000 gallons, \$1.50 per thousand; next 2,000 gallons, 75c per thousand; next 6,000 gallons, 60c per thousand; next 5,000 gallons, 40c per thousand; excess, 30c per thousand.

Meter deposit, \$10.00 (more if necessary); transfers \$2.00; reconnects (for non-payment) \$2.00.

Commercial sewer charge is \$1.50; sewer connection (new customer) \$40.00; transfers or connect \$1.00.

### Residential (Outside City Limits)

First 2,000 gallons, \$1.50 per thousand; next 2,000, 75c per thousand; next 4,000, 60c per thousand; next 4,000, 50c per thousand; excess, 30c per thousand.

Meter deposit, \$10.00; transfer or moves, \$2.00; reconnects (for non-payment) \$2.00.

Sewer, \$1.50 per month; sewer connection, \$50.00; transfer or connects \$2.00.

### Commercial (Outside City Limits)

First 2,000 gallons, \$1.75 per thousand; next 4,000, 75c per thousand; next 6,000, 60c per thousand; next 5,000, 50c per thousand.

Meter Deposit, \$15.00 (more if necessary). Transfers or connects, \$2.00.

Sewer charge, \$1.75 per month; sewer connection (new customer) \$50.00; transfer or connects \$2.00.

## Sen. Word Has His Doubts About Governor's Tax Bill

Many legislators are indicating their reservations on the Governor's tax proposals and both Houses are working on revised versions of the bill. Connally's program calls for:

1. Expansion of the state sales tax to include various services, such as telephone and tobacco products, increasing the rate from 2 to 3 percent.
2. Repealing the local option city sales tax and rebating part of the state increase to all incorporated cities on a per capita basis.
3. Increase the motor vehicle sales tax from 2 to 3 percent.
4. A tax of 10 cents per bottle on "mini-bottles" of alcoholic beverages.
5. A one-time transfer of \$7.5 million from the operators and chauffeurs license fund of the Department of Public Safety.

These proposals would total \$129 million in additional state revenue for the fiscal year beginning Sept. 1st.

### SISTER OF L. J. WOOD DIES IN OKLAHOMA; BURIAL AT BRADY

Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Wood received word Sunday night that Mr. Wood's sister, Mrs. A. C. Baze, 93, of Chickasha, Okla. had died at 11 p.m. Sunday following a short illness.

Burial was planned to be held in Liveoak Cemetery at Brady, with details to be arranged.

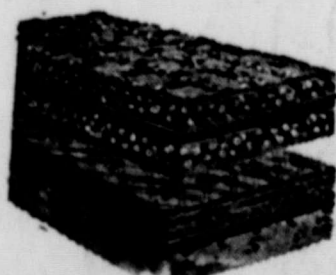

## On the Home Range

Used egg whites and wondering what to do with the yolks? Beat with a fork and add 1 teaspoon cold water for every two yolks. Cover and store in the refrigerator. The yolks won't dry out and a film will not form.

To reduce strong flavors of vegetables such as cauliflower or cabbage cook in a small amount of water in an uncovered pan. For best retention of vitamins and minerals, cook only to the crisp done stage.

Tips on meat cookery: Meat cooked at low to moderate temperature is generally more tender, juicy and flavorful than that cooked at higher temperatures. In addition, there is less loss through evaporation, shrinkage and drippings.

Do not allow foods to dry on the broiler pan. Cool slightly and wipe grease from the broiler rack and the pan. Sprinkle with detergent, pour boiling water in the tray, and lay wet paper towels over the rack. Allow to "soften" while eating meal.

It is possible to mis-use meat tenderizers. Adding too much tenderizer is not advisable because it is likely to result in meat that has a mushy, crumbly texture similar to that of tender liver. Meat is

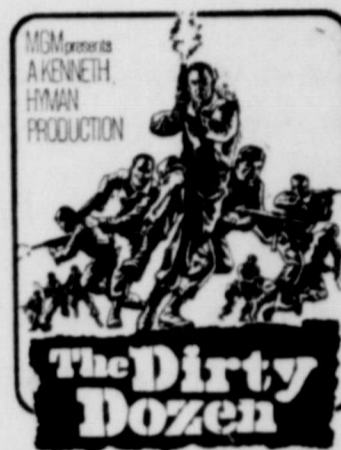

usually less juicy and harder to swallow.

A good test for "doneness" of pork is to make small cuts next to the bone and into the thicker part of the meat. If the juice is still pink, it isn't done. For thick cuts, a meat thermometer helps eliminate guesswork.

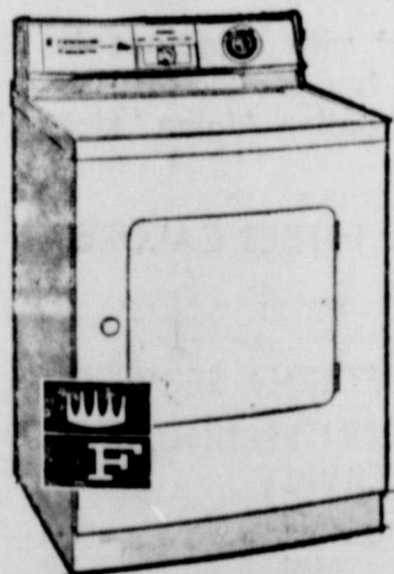

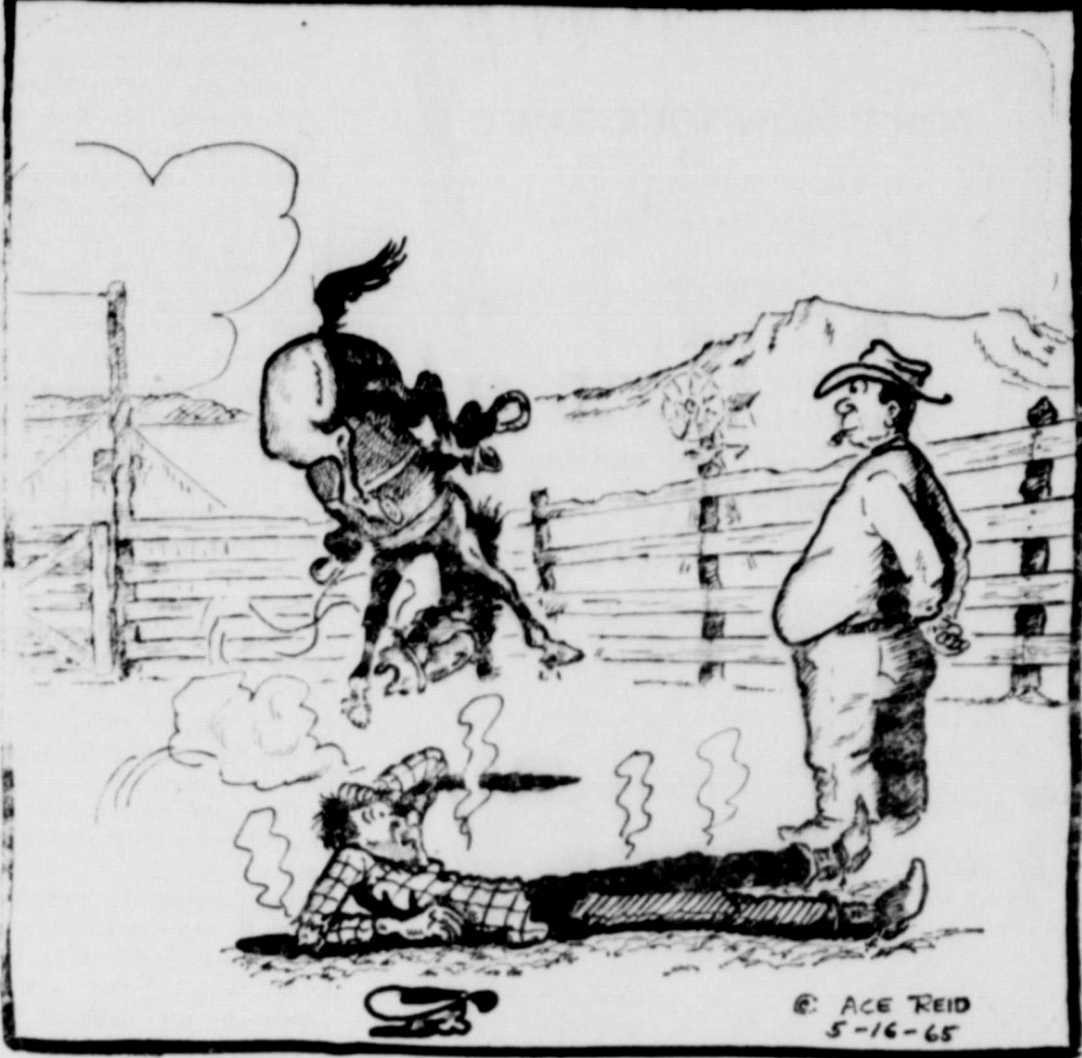

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D. C.—Growing up on a farm we had bees. Having been told about the duties of the queen, the workers and the drones, they were interesting to watch. (If in that day there had been television, probably the bees would not have been noticed.) But it was fascinating to learn that when the queen had expired and her usefulness served, the new queen left the hive, followed by the workers who surrounded her on the Mesquite limb where she chose to light.

At this point, the drones, too, had served their purpose and either died or were killed by the workers. When the new queen was installed on her throne in a new hive, the workers began immediately to gather the materials for new comb and to dress up the new palace with all needed fixtures.

We learned that the workers would sting and were willing to give their lives afterwards to protect their queen and her castle. The drones could be caught with the hand without injury. They carried no stinger and did not leave the hive except for a stroll outside for fresh air.

Our society is something like this. It has one criterion, namely, that the individual have a willingness to work. Our economic system is not designed for the "drones", for the shiftless and for the fellow who wants to lie abed in the morning while others are out on the job.

The great marvel of our free enterprise system in America is that it virtually guarantees a reasonable annual income to about everyone, provided he or she is willing to work. There are, of course, exceptions. In the past we have not done all which should have been done to give opportunity for training more people for better jobs. There are those who, for some misfortune or other, are unable to obtain and hold a decent job but no country

in history has been so successful in creating job opportunities as has this country.

Yet there are some people who want to redesign our system so that it gives the "drones" full equality with the "workers."

In February of 1967, the National Commission on Technology, Automation and Economic Progress, produced a 210-page report endorsing a guaranteed annual wage for every American. Should the Commission's report ever be enacted into law, the citizen who chose not to work would get a cash allowance from the Government. The advocates of the guaranteed annual income theory contend that it is everyone's Constitutional right, regardless of the circumstances.

It is not surprising that the old-line Socialists endorse such a plan because they have always been for a redistribution of the wealth. It is surprising, however, to find some prominent businessmen along with many of the intellectuals advocating such a proposal.

Generally, it is doubtful that the Socialists give any heed or consideration to the cost as a factor in their reasoning. You would think the businessmen, and successful ones at that, would consider the cost and where the money must come from. Estimates of the cost have ranged from \$2 billion to \$20 billion a year. This is the difference between 2 cents and 20 cents—quite a spread in estimates.

It is being proved over and over again that there are those who,

knowing they are able to extract money from the taxpayers, choose this method as their livelihood. In the big cities, welfare officials say they spend as much time in trying to get able bodied men on welfare to go to work as they do in trying to help those who are really entitled to help. Imagine that if every chisler realized he never had to work again but only to apply for the guaranteed annual wage, how great the ranks of the "drones" would swell. Imagine, also, the reaction of working men and women who must supply the money to support the "drones." We can well imagine the feelings of people who have to get up early to go to work and others who work all night and who have to find their rest in the daytime.

Certainly there are many who hold unpleasant jobs simply because they know that working is the only way to support themselves and their families. Unless these working people felt it morally wrong not to work and felt it an insult not to do their part in society by holding down jobs, they could with considerable justification say, "Why should I work to support the loafers?"

To support the "drones" would be to steal the rightful earnings of those citizens who use their energies each day to support themselves, their families, their communities, and their country.

With incentive to work destroyed, such a scheme would eventually create a class of totally dependent citizens, vulnerable to the unscrupulous and reckless politician who would promise them more and more.

Like the fellow said, "I am working . . . for a guaranteed annual income and I will sit here until I get it."

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**

Sorghum midge were found in several counties to the East this past week. Midge was reported at Milam, Bell, Falls, McLennan, Ellis, Hill, Collin and Hunt counties with infestations varying from field to field.

The critical period for potential midge damage begins about June 25th in Hamilton County. Reduction in grain sorghum yields in late-blooming fields has ranged from 20 to 100 percent. With nearly all of the grain sorghum late in Hamilton County we stand a good chance of receiving heavy damage from the sorghum midge.

Producers are urged to look at a grain field before they apply an application of insecticide. Examine 50 heads of grain sorghum, and if the infestation averages one per head apply an insecticide. The inspection should be made early in the morning (before 10 a.m.) or very late in the afternoon. The midge are not very active during the heat of the day. Fields should be examined at least once each day and preferably twice a day. The close inspection is required because of the short life of the adult.

Sorghum midge are orange-colored, fragile looking gnats or flies about one-twelfth inch long. Adults mate and begin laying eggs soon after emergence. Each female is capable of laying from 50 to 250 tiny white eggs during the 24 to 45 hours which she lives as an adult. The male lives only a few hours to one day. Eleven to 21 days are required for the midge to develop from egg to adult.

Sorghum midge lay eggs in blooming grain. Once the head has pollinated and the flower has turned red it is too late to try and control sorghum midge.

Sorghum midge is a preventative; rather than a cure. You must prevent the midge from laying eggs to prevent damage. Once the egg is inside the developing grain, there is no control measure for it. When midge are found in damaging infestations, they must be treated that day.

Several insecticides are effective in controlling sorghum midge: Sevin, Trithion, Diazinon, Endrin, Ethion, Methyl Parathion, Parathion and Toxaphene. For dosages and restrictions you might call or stop by my office.
