





## COUNTY **AGENT REPORTS**

By BILL MCCUTCHEON

First of all, let me say that the sorghum midge I was referring to in last week's column are onetwelfth of an inch long and not an inch and a half. I have received just a little kidding about that mistake. I am sure that this error was due to my bad typing and no fault of the newspaper.

Remember that these insects are very destructive when heavy populations infest late grain sorghum, so beginning about June 25th check your grain sorghum daily for this insect. If spraying is necessary you will want to spray when 90 percent of the heads are out of the boot.




