## Old Settlers Reunion —

# Peak Crowds Expected Friday, Saturday Nights

Peak crowds are expected to be in Hico Friday and Saturday for the remaining two programs during the 82nd Annual Old Settlers Reunion.

The celebration was kicked off Wednesday afternoon at 7:00 o'clock with a large and beautiful street parade, officially opening the Reunion.

District Judge Truman E. Roberts of Hamilton, former Hico resident, made the opening day address shortly before start of the parade. Judge Roberts also had charge of presentation ceremonies when Clarence Christopher, long-time city nightwatchman, was honored for 43 faithful years of service to the community. Mayor O. L. Davis presented Mr. Christopher with an appropriately engraved plaque.

The parade this year featured several units from Karem Temple Shrine in Waco, which added considerably to the opening feature.

Due to circumstances beyond the publisher's control, the News Review was forced to print one day early—Wednesday afternoon—and parade prize winners and other details of opening activities will be carried in next week's paper.

### Tuesday Night Street Dance

The annual street dance, which unofficially opens the Reunion, was staged Tuesday night, and featured Leon Rausch and his band from Fort Worth. A crowd conservatively estimated at more than 2,000 people jammed every available space on Main Street for the dance. It was by far the largest such event ever held here.

### Friday Program

Entertainment Friday night will get underway around 8:30 when the traditional Miss Reunion Contest will be held. A full evening of entertainment is assured, with 36 hopefuls entered in the senior division, and thirteen in the Little Miss Contest.

Saturday night will feature Herb Dooley and his band from Wichita Falls, which will close out the four-day celebration.

### Reds Prevail Over Blues In Final

An enthusiastic crowd witnessed the play-off game between the two Hico baseball teams Monday night of this week. The Blue and Red teams had tied with one win each going into the final session.

The pitching of Danny Polk carried the Red team to a 10-4 win to capture the championship.

The Hico All-Star team was invited to the DeLeon tournament last week, and were shut out by an experienced team from Ranger. All the boys felt that the experience would be of help in the future.

Appreciation was expressed by the three sponsoring churches to those who made it possible to give the Hico area boys a month of baseball this year. Special thanks are due the Civic Club for furnishing the equipment; to the school for use of the playing field; to the coaching staff for their guidance, and to a very cooperative group of boys and parents.

Everyone is looking forward to another baseball program next year.

## Three County Students Will Attend Annual Farm Bureau Seminar

Three high school students from Hamilton County will attend the sixth annual Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar July 30 through August 3 on the campus at Baylor University in Waco, according to Wesley Garrett, president of Hamilton County Farm Bureau.

The students are Brad Braune of Hico, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Braune; Janet Braun, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. August Braun, and Damon Chumney, son of B. E. Chumney, both students at Hamilton High School.

The annual seminar for high school junior and senior students is an intensive course in citizenship, American heritage, and the proper role of government.

"It is designed to complement the formal education of these young folks and make their roles as citizens more meaningful," the farm leader said.

Hamilton County Farm Bureau sponsors the local students by paying their tuition, room and board and transportation to and from Waco. A total of 425 students from 156 counties are enrolled for this year's seminar.

Four nationally known lecturers will address the seminar. They are Dr. Clifford L. Ganus, President of Harding College, Searcy, Ark.; Dr. C. L. Day, President of Lubbock Christian College; John Noble, author of "I Was a Slave in Russia"; and W. Cleon Skousen, author, lawyer, and former FBI Agent.

Emphasis this year will be placed on the economic, moral and social aspects of American society. Instruction will consist of lectures, films and panel discussions.

## Annual County Farm Tour Scheduled Saturday, Aug. 3

The annual Hamilton County Farm Tour will be held Saturday, August 3.

Buses will depart from the west side of the square in Hamilton at 8:30 a.m. Those living in the Jonesboro area may board a bus there at the school at 8 a.m., and will meet the group leaving from Hamilton.

A scenic tour of farms and

ranches along the Leon River will be a part of this year's tour. Also the farming and dairy operation of Willie Perry, Texas' outstanding young farmer for 1968 will be featured.

Among crops to be featured include milo, soybeans, forages, cotton, sunflowers, coastal bermuda and other type grasses.

The purebred Charolais herd of Ira Schrank will also be viewed. Visitors will have a chance to see Charolais calves from imported French semen at the Schrank ranch.

A catered lunch will be served at noon at the Moody Courtney park on the Leon River. The tour group will arrive back at Hamilton about 2 p.m.

The tour is sponsored by the agricultural agencies of the county and the Young Farmers Chapter.

Last year's tour featured farms in the Hico area, and those in the Jonesboro area are featured this year.

Approximately 6,800 head of good quality cattle were sold during the special Stocker-Feeder Show & Sale held under the joint sponsorship of the Texas Hereford and Texas Angus Associations at Fort Worth Friday, July 26.

Stearman Ranch of Hico, owned by W. C. Stearman Jr., showed two champion pens of Herefords.

Stearman showed the champion pen of 10 heifers, which averaged

396 pounds and sold for \$28.90 per hundred. Stearman also showed the third place pen, which averaged 413 pounds and brought \$28.10.

In the steer division, Stearman had the champion pen of 10, averaging 430 pounds, and selling for \$31.90. The third place pen, also shown by Stearman, averaged 479 pounds and brought \$31.80.

## Resume of 14 Amendments to Constitution Being Published

Proposals will be shaping up on 14 more amendments to the Texas Constitution. All 14 of the proposed changes in the state's basic law will be voted on at the general election November 5. Some are amending, others routine.

Seven of the amendments published in this week's issue of News Review.

Short brief of all 14 amendments in the order in which they appear on the ballot, is:

Revising provisions for management and administration of the state employee's retirement system to permit investment in securities other than government bonds.

Raising the state's welfare ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million.

Permitting investment of the University Fund by UT in certain types of securities with the "prudent man rule."

Allowing Dallas County to issue bonds on vote of property owners.

Authorizing a raise in state teachers' salary from \$4,800 to \$5,000 a year and extending the expense allowance of legislators (\$12 a day) to 140 days of regular lawmaking session. Present limit is 120 days.

Allowing the legislature to ex-

empt from property taxes equipment installed by industrialists to control air or water pollution.

7. Phasing out the state property tax after Dec. 31, 1976, beginning next year, except that portion for higher education institutions.

8. Eliminating the requirement that the governor, secretary of state, and comptroller approve contracts for printing and paper.

9. Providing for contributions to the teacher retirement system on the basis of full salaries. Contributions now are limited to \$504 a year.

10. Allowing the legislature to provide for refund of state tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail in Texarkana.

11. Authorizing the legislature to permit consolidation of offices and governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties.

12. Giving the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes and permit private concerns to operate plants thus financed.

13. Exempting from property tax certain property temporarily stored in public warehouses.

14. Spelling out that legislators will not be eligible for other offices because their terms extend a few days into January.

The photograph here perhaps best describes the unusual growing conditions in the Hico area this year, and the plentiful supply of moisture up to this date. With an average rainfall of around 30 inches per year, the immediate Hico area has already received more than 33 inches to date, with an unofficial eight inches of rain falling in July.

This picture, taken at Lackey Feed Mill, shows a stalk of Johnson grass growing from a solid rock wall, with no visible soil, only mortar and rocks, and is about eight feet from the ground. The grass is thriving despite lack of soil.

COUNTY AGENT

One of the more common calls I have received from home owners the past couple of months has been in reference to "brown rot" on peaches.

The "brown rot" fungus was more damaging than usual this year due to the abundant moisture and humid weather. The sad thing about this crop loss is that it could have readily and inexpensively been prevented.

If you lost your peach crop this year why not profit from experience and get ready to control this next year.

It looks like this could be a good pecan year. Most trees have a good crop set and we have good moisture for this time of year.

We have a problem at present on certain trees that is causing quite a lot of concern. Certain pecan varieties, including the Burkett and certain natives, are being severely affected with powdery mildew.

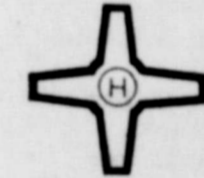
If this condition exists on your trees you might want to consider spraying with a good commercial fungicide or wettable sulphur.



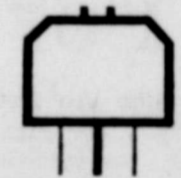

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49) BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50) BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows: "Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

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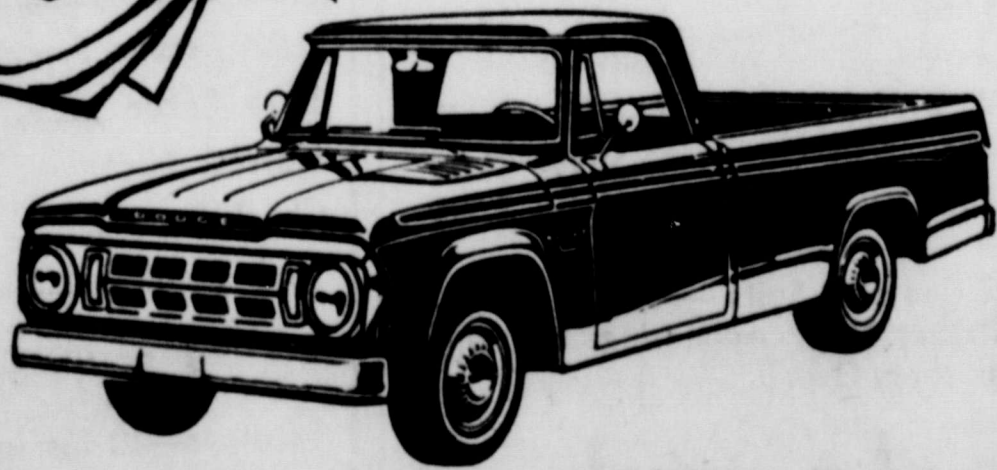
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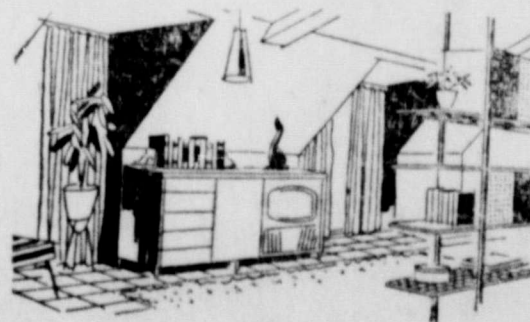

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### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e. '1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35c); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30c); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25c); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20c); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15c); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10c); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5c); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2c) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two percent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR1)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;

"(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children."

"The Legislature may define

the residence requirements, if any, for participation in these programs.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy

persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eye for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

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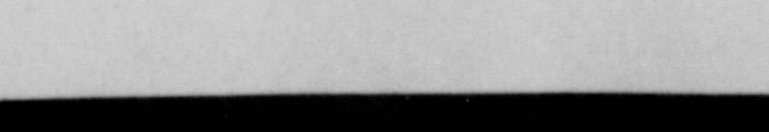
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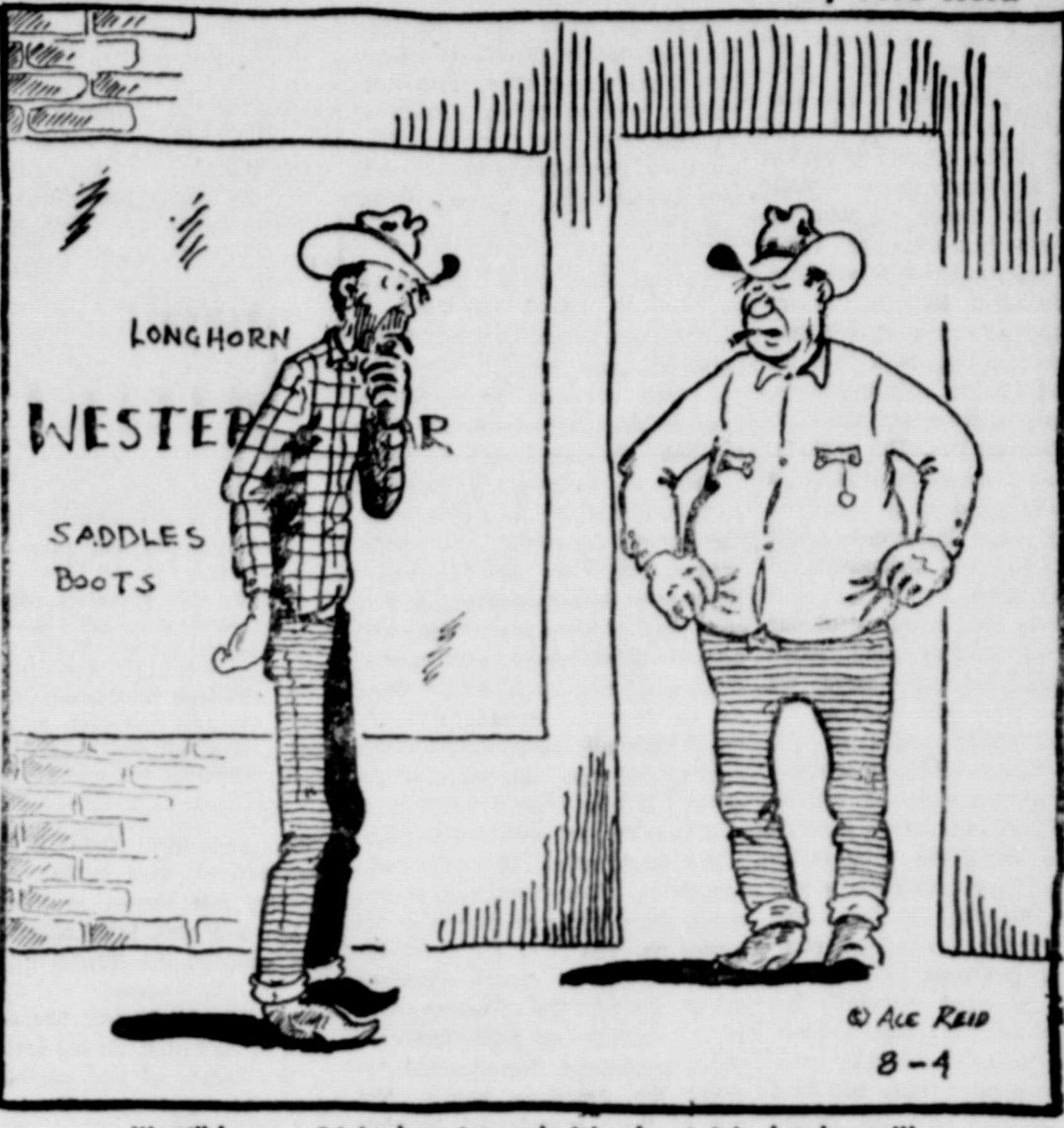

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not
