School Bells Will Ring September 3

While area schools started fall classes last Friday and Monday, Hico prolonged the summer vacation one week, with classes scheduled to begin Tuesday morning, September 2.

A general assembly at 9 a.m., open to parents and patrons, will be first official act for school children. Following the assembly, a full-day schedule of classes will be held.

Buses will make their routes at the regular time the first day.

Lunches will be served the first day of school, and prices will be 30c for grades one through five, and 35c for grades six through 12, and 40c for adults. The same policy will be in effect concerning lunches as in past years. Students may eat in the lunch room, bring their lunch

or go to their homes. Students and adults will be charged five cents for each extra half-pint of milk they drink. Only one-half pint of milk will be furnished with the meal, and "seconds" on food will not be served.

Pre-Registration

Pre-registration for high school students will start Friday, August 30, at 8 a.m. Elementary students will register the first day of school, Tuesday, Sept. 3.

Birth Certificates

All first year students are required to have a birth certificate to present the first day of school as proof of their age.

School attendance is required of students through the age of 17 years.

Chaney's Sell Service Station; Retain Parts And Garage Business

Announcement is being made this week by Mr. and Mrs. Louis Chaney of the sale of their Gulf service station to Doyle O'Neal. The transaction is effective September 1st.

Mr. and Mrs. Chaney will retain their garage and parts business. They have served the Hico area continuously for the past 41 years.

Mr. Chaney first started handling Gulf products in the late 1920's, having operated the old station where Wilson Cleaners is now located. Later he moved up on the old Stephenville highway, where he continued in business until the highway was re-routed. He purchased property on the new route, and built a station and garage.

In 1951 the Chaney's erected the present modern structure.

Mr. O'Neal, who has lived here the past several years, is a native of DeLeon. His wife is the former Peggy Ellis.

He has had previous experience in the station business, and in an advertisement elsewhere in this issue, gives an invitation to area people to continue their business dealings with his firm. Mr. and Mrs. Chaney also have a message of thanks to their customers in this issue.

End of Era---Railroad Is Memory

Removal of the last tracks of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad ceased to be a part of the community this Wednesday, and ended an era spanning 88 years. For it was in 1880 that Texas Central brought their lines through the northern part of Hico County, and proposed that people who were then settling on the banks of Honey Creek at Old Hico to move their homes north four miles to the new town.

Hico continued to prosper and grow, and the Bosque Valley became known for its fertility and ideal conditions for growing bumper crops, making Hico one of the major railroad shipping points in the state. Texas Central prospered, as did the town. In 1907, more than 50,000 bales of cotton were shipped from Hico by rail. More cotton was bought from wagons on the streets than in any other town in the world, according to early day reports. However, cotton wasn't the only agriculture product produced in this area. In 1908, there was more grain bought and ship-

ped from Hico than from all other towns located in the Texas Central Railroad. Also supporting the railroad was a cotton oil mill, a cotton compress, three gins, and three cotton yards for buying the product. In later years, car after car of dressed turkeys were shipped from Hico during season. As the years went by, cotton ceased to be the Number 1 agricultural product, and revenue began to decline for the railway company. First the oil mill, and then the compress was closed, and then one by one, the gins were shut down, and in the late 1940's the last gin was closed.

Application Made to Abandon

On December 8, 1964, M-K-T asked Interstate Commerce Commission for permission to abandon the 220-mile line, running from Bellmead, in Waco, to a point near Stamford. Following protests from towns along the line, Katy delayed the action, and finally asked for a year's extension on their request.

In the meantime, most of the towns along the line continued their fight to keep the railroad, but in the end, the company was granted permission to abandon the line.

Changing times in the rural areas can be most blamed for the loss, and it was a change that so many other communities and areas over the U.S. have experienced since the close of World War II. It must be stated right here that the end hasn't come—that Hico hasn't "died in the bud" because of loss of a railroad, but rather, with a proper attitude on the part of the people, the community will continue to prosper.

Property Is Bought

City of Hico has made arrangements to purchase the right of way through town, and land owners along the line are, for the most part, acquiring the right of way joining their property. Also secured by the City was the two bridges within the city limits on the west and east edges of town, and the old depot building.

Labor Day Death Toll to Be 46, According to DPS

Austin (Spl.)—Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said this week that DPS estimates 46 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the Labor Day weekend.

"This is the last holiday weekend of the summer, and thousands of motorists traditionally take to the highways for an outing," Speir said. "It is indeed tragic that so many men, women, and children will become victims of motor vehicle accidents during an otherwise happy period," he said.

Speir said the Department of Public Safety will use all facilities and personnel at its disposal in an effort to reduce the predicted death toll. A special "Operation Motorcade" will be activated at 6 p.m. Friday, and continue through midnight Monday. During this period, all uniformed DPS officers and equipment will be used on the highways to enforce traffic laws.

"Many other groups such as local police and sheriff's department, the trucking industry, and the Jaycees will be cooperating in this effort to promote safe driving during the holiday," Speir noted.

COUNTY AGENT

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Because of excellent moisture conditions, the farming picture in Hamilton County is brighter this year than it has been in the last several years. Livestock prices have been good throughout the year and pastures have been excellent. Most livestock producers have a good supply of hay in the barn and pastures that will carry them a long way this winter.

The small grain crop was generally quite good over most of the county, and the grain sorghum harvest which got into full swing last week is providing another bright spot for local producers. I harvested plots on three farms last week and yields were quite good. Milton Stegemoller's top variety was YE-90 at 3,525 pounds per acre; Alfred Marwitz' top yield was RS 626 at 3,675 pounds per acre; and Willie Perry's top yield was from Pioneer 846 at 4,700 pounds per acre. Even with the low prices being received for grain sorghum, yields like these will keep you in business.

Cotton prospects are also better than usual at this stage of production. Yields are potentially good with little insect activity at present. The cotton marketing situation also looks a little encouraging this Fall.

The only thing wrong with this seemingly rosy picture is that while the farmer is producing more; his take home pay is increasingly less. Everything he must purchase goes

up every year. Our farmers are doing a better job of producing than they ever have and they are being adequately reimbursed for their efforts.

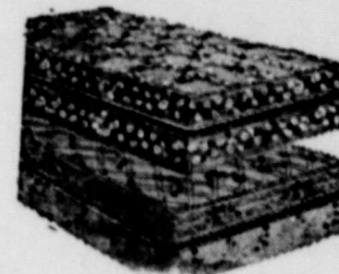

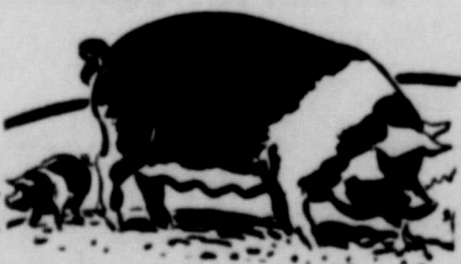

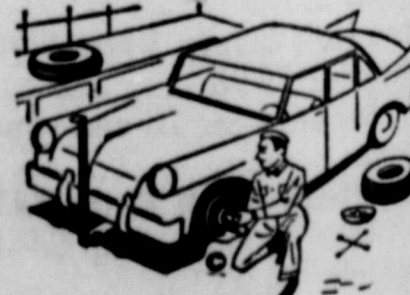
