

During the past 15 years, about the only commodities being sent to Hico and this area by rail were lumber, feed, and a few farm implements. A large gypsum plant near Stamford perhaps kept the railroad "live" more than any other industry. Car after car of the building material was sent through Hico, until about three years ago when the board was re-routed through Wichita Falls as the Katy property continued to deteriorate. The peanut industry in the Gorman-DeLeon area also contributed to the longivity of the line.

Application Made to Abandon.

On December 8, 1964, M-K-T asked Interstate Commerce Commission for permission to abandon the 220-mile line, running from Bellmead, in Waco, to a point near Stamford. Following protests from towns along the line, Katy delayed the action, and finally asked for a year's extension on their request.

In the meantime, most of the towns along the line continued their fight to keep the railroad, but in the end, the company was granted permission to abandon the line.

Changing times in the rural areas can be most blamed for the loss, and it was a change that so many other communities and areas over the U.S. have experienced since the close of World War II. It must be stated right here that the end hasn't come-that Hico hasn't "died in the bud" because of loss of a railroad, but rather, with a proper attitude on the part of the people, the community will continue to prosper.

Property Is Bought

City of Hico has made arrangements to purchase the right of way through town, and land owners along the line are, for the most part, acquiring the right of way joining their property. Also secured by the City was the two bridges within the city limits on the west and east edges of town, and the old depot building.
