Vehicle Safety Inspection Method Started Sept. 1

The 1969 vehicle inspection program began September 1, according to Col. Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

More than six million vehicles are expected to receive the compulsory inspection prior to the April 1969 deadline," Speir said.

The law requires inspection of brakes, lighting equipment, horns, warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorage was part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, steering (including power steering), and wheels and rims (not including removal of the wheel from the vehicle) on all motor vehicles registered in the state. Special inspection provisions apply to trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers, mobile homes having a loaded weight in excess of 4,000 lbs. The minimum fee is \$1.75, which does not include cost of repairs or adjustments necessary to enable the vehicle to pass inspection.

Inspectionists are urged to have the inspection performed as soon as possible to insure that the vehicles are mechanically safe.

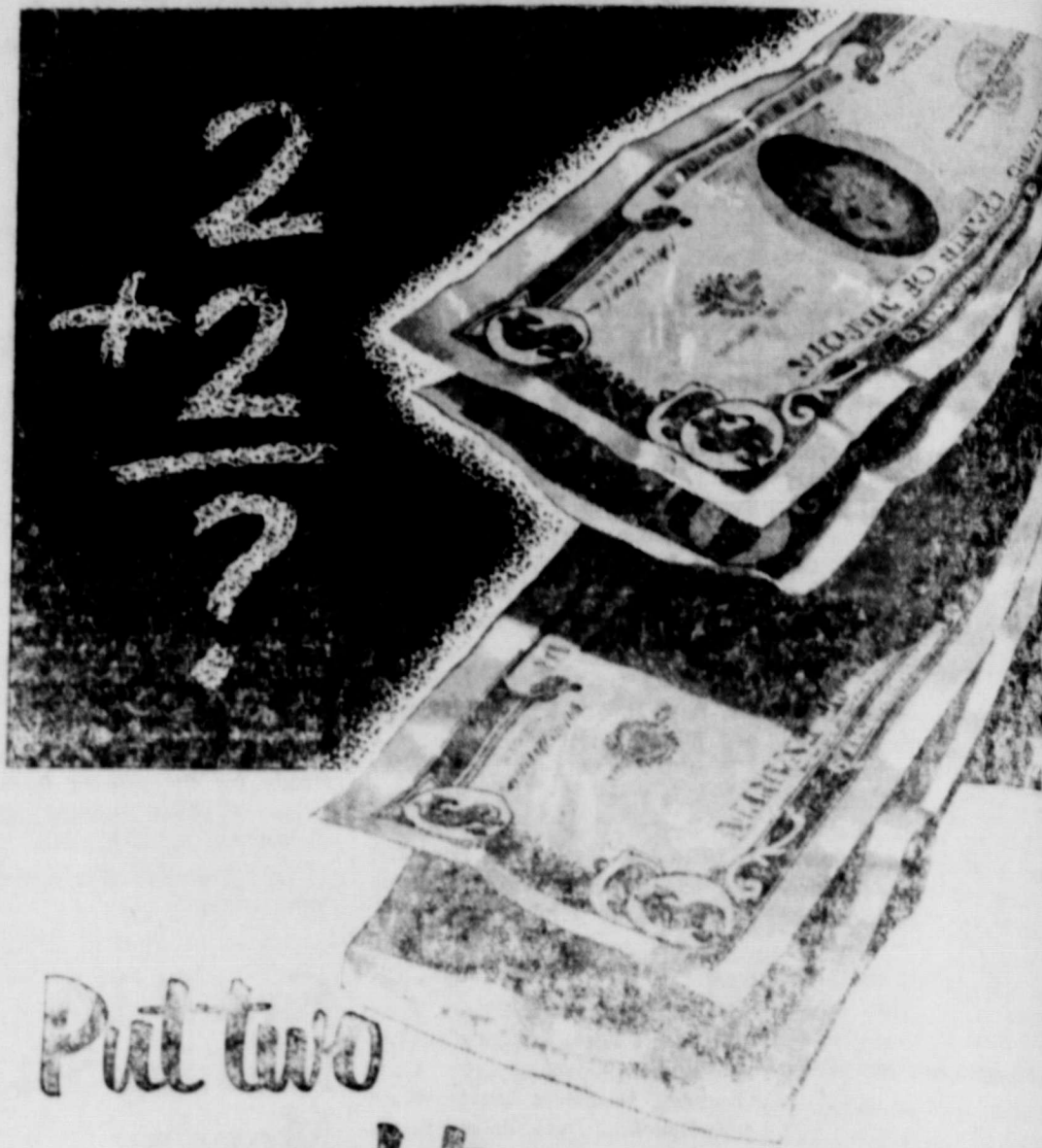

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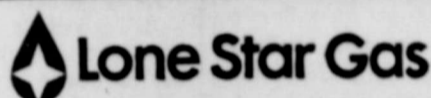
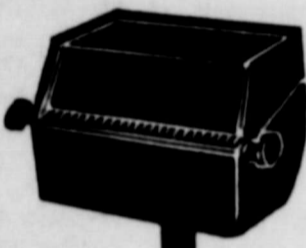

Those colorful Colonials from Connecticut, the fifers and drummers of the Deep River (Conn.) Drum Corps, will march again at this year's State Fair of Texas, coming up Oct. 5-20 in Dallas. The New England music makers, wearing white wigs and red and black uniforms carefully copied from those of Revolutionary times, will give several free performances daily Oct. 12 through 17. The two dozen parading Pied Pipers in three-cornered hats drew huge crowds in 1963 and 1965 at the nation's largest annual exposition. The Deep River citizens have been popular favorites since 1873; The State Fair of Texas has been the people's choice since 1886.

How can we escape the conclusion that some people in Chicago remembered that Mayor Daley told his cops to shoot looters and burners? I for one think some people in Chicago wanted to live.

That National Guard outfit had been in four other battles with the Viet Cong and if those fellows decided to "give 'em a good one" I say bully for them. After all, if some young thing gets his head busted open, he can not appeal that to the Supreme Court and get it reversed.

Since the Miami Chief of Police appeared on TV and reminded the boys in Miami that they could not appeal their case from a slab in the morgue, the crime rate in Miami has gone down 64 percent. No telling how many people are alive and their bodies unbroken and their property intact on account of that.

I see very little difference between what is happening now and what happened after the Civil War. There was then a crime wave when such men as the Jones Brothers, Younger Brothers, Dalton Brothers, Sam Bass and Billy the Kid would go to that trial only to be turned loose. COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

If you are considering planting peach trees this winter, whether a tree in the back yard or an orchard, it would be wise to use root knot nematode resistant rootstocks. These nematodes are becoming an increasingly great problem to local peach growers.

The root knot nematode cause large swelling on the roots, and the plants appear stunted. The trees will also have a chlorotic appearance and will usually defoliate prematurely.

In recent greenhouse and field trials in Texas, two peach rootstocks have proven resistant to most species of root knot found in the state. It is suggested that homeowners as well as commercial fruit growers in the state obtain trees that have been budded on either Nemaguard or Okinawa rootstock. Several commercial nurseries have indicated they will have most new varieties budded on these rootstocks by this planting season. Persons interesting in planting peaches this year should contact their nurseryman and make sure the desired varieties will be available at planting time.

Chinch bugs are now a major problem in home lawns in Hamilton County. Most chinch bug damage is caused by the young bugs, or nymphs. Yellowish spots appear in the infested lawn and these turn rapidly into brown, dead areas.

Unless you are familiar with this insect it will be hard to find them in the lawn even though they may be there in severe infestations. This insect is very small and he works down at the base of the plant at the soil level. The adult is one-sixth inch long, black and has white markings.

Two of the more common chemicals used for chinch bug control are Diazinon and Dieldrin.

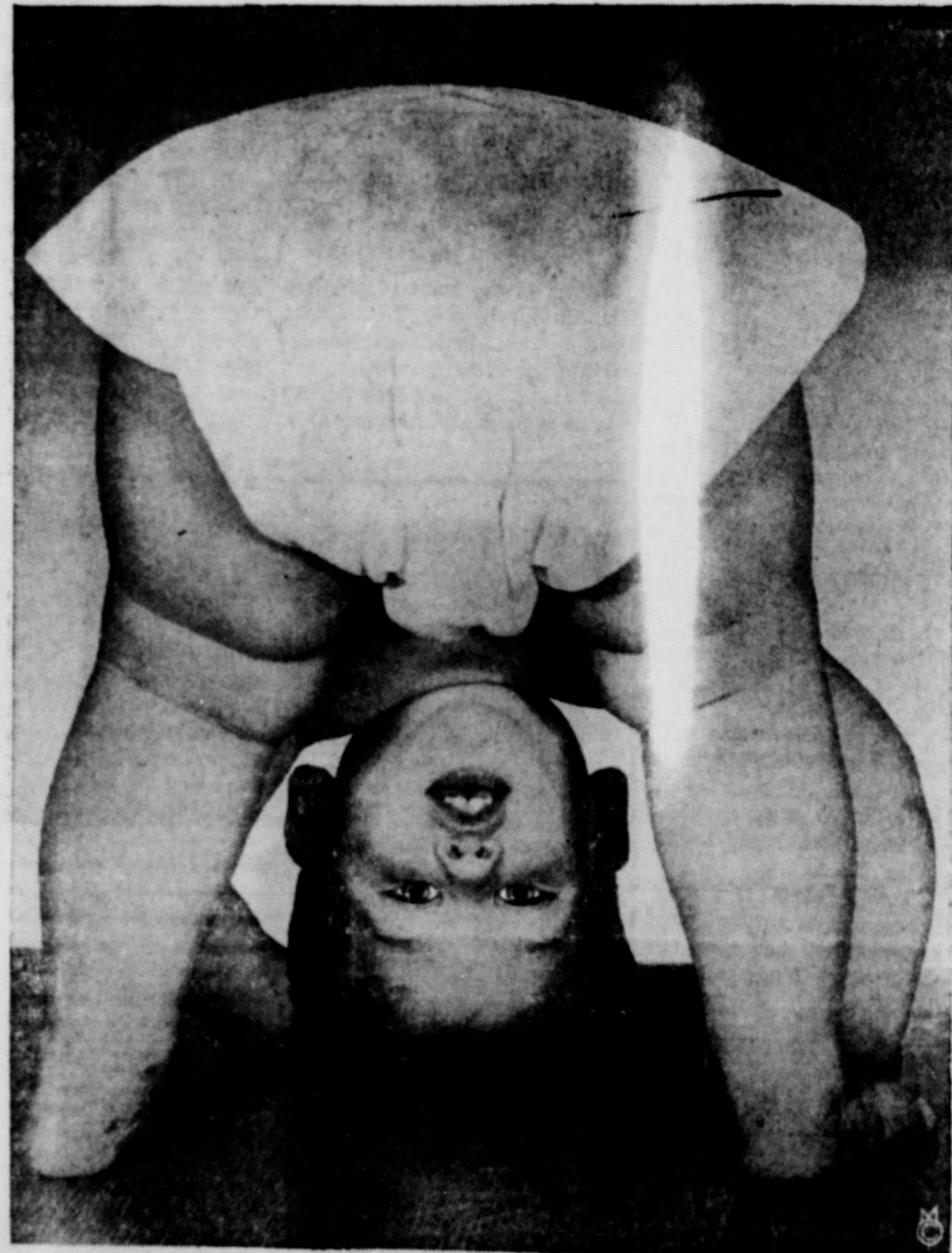

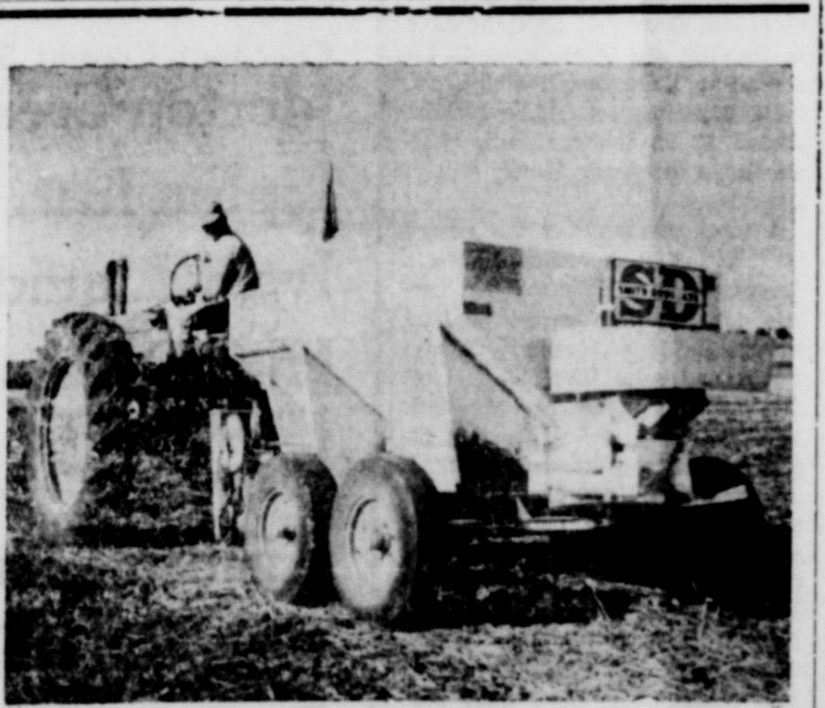

WASHINGTON "As it looks from here" OMAR BURLESON Congressman 17th District

Washington, D.C.—It seems our government, including all branches, believes that more money and more promises will cure the evils which we face.

The government has promised more, both to our own people and to the outside world, than it can deliver. A day of reckoning one way or the other is not far off.

Recently the Congress passed what is known as the "Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968" costing 5 1/2 billion in this fiscal

year. That, however, is not the whole story by any means.

The bill involves about 30 different subsidized programs and no one can give a satisfactory answer as to what it will finally cost in the years ahead. Estimates are fairly clear that eight of the major provisions will cost between \$45 and \$50 billion during the next ten years.

The bill includes a subsidy for rent payments, commonly known as rent supplement. It provides the difference between 20 percent of a home owner's income after deducting \$200 to reach minor child and monthly mortgage payments. Market interest rates can be subsidized down to a minimum of one percent regardless of the going rates at the time.

Another example is insurance provided by the Federal Government to rebuild property destroyed by riots. Urban renewal with Federal grants and loans is provided but with this type of insurance any ghetto can be burned out and the renewal can be made under the insurance provision.

In the debate on this measure the sponsors agreed that this is the answer to chaos occurring in many of our large cities but a few crumbs is provided for every nick and cranny of the entire country under some type of Federal program.

All this follows the law recently passed providing for a 10 percent surcharge tax increase, together with a \$6 billion reduction in the current budget, together with the cancellation of \$10 billion in commitments already made.

How all of this is to be accomplished, while committing the Government to these huge outlays of expenditures in the future, is wholly inconsistent.

Every public official, whether a mayor of a town or the President of the United States, knows from experience how difficult it is to curb the momentum of expanding Government activity and we know that this portends the continuation of the levels of taxation higher than any of us want to bear. When Federal monies are available, pressures for every program mount.

As the Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives said last October, "We want to pause in this headlong rush to ever bigger Government." In a statement Chairman Mills made at that time he said that "the real issue is whether or not the Congress will ever be able

to focus properly on controlling the growth of Federal claims on the Nation's productivity capabilities over the years ahead. It is one thing to attempt to cope with immediate challenges but it is another to look at the long range results of committed spending."

The interest on the public debt now exceeds \$15 billion and the debt will continue to expand unless there is established firm control over the course of future expenditures. What is needed and what is essential is a change in spending programs to bring responsibility to our fiscal affairs. We should focus sharply on what the Government is to do, as well as on how much it is to spend.

Any realistic appraisal of our Nation's financial condition should make it crystal clear that Federal expenditures will increase with Federal activity. Expansions of Government activity may not in itself be improper. As natural changes occur, so must actions to meet it but we definitely should be sure that

obligations to meet the demands of the future are what we want them to be and that it is the proper mission of the Federal Government.

Many of us are allergic to the appointments to do something we should be doing ourselves but it may take some outside group to bring reality to get it further away from political machination.
