County tax base for real taxes has been raised by Hamilton County Commissioners 15 percent of actual value, with the 1969-70 budget according to an announcement by County Judge Herman Standifer said that most taxes have been below the market, some well below, by a few above this base. Commissioners served as an advisory board to remove inequities during two public meetings in July.

Governor's Committee Would Change Most School Programs

A blue-ribbon governor's committee has recommended a monumental year plan for improving Texas school education that will increase costs and require a \$300 to \$500 million tax bill next year. A 15-member panel said its report would lift schools out of "poverty" and "inefficiency." Highlights of the report include recommendations for more and better teachers, free kindergarten, expanded free education for all children, required consolidation of school districts, additional benefits for teachers and encouragement of educational innovations and experimentation. Altogether the proposals of this committee on Public School Education would increase local, state and federal school costs in Texas from \$1.2 billion to \$2.1 billion at the end of 10 years. Under the plan, 40 percent of the state's revenue would go to schools. Some \$1 billion more would be required from state sources, for example, by increasing the state's income tax. Recommendations of the committee include: Increasing basic allotments from \$100 per pupil, plus additions for transportation, materials and instructional teachers. Providing "basic foundation program" to replace 20-year-old mini-foundation program.

Hico-Stephenville B Open Season Saturday

Hico's rebuilding Tigers will take the field Saturday night against Stephenville B team in a game to be played at the local stadium opening at 8 p.m. It will be the season-opener for both teams. The Tigers have dominated the series with the Bees over the past several years, and should win this opener. Coaches Charles Coan and Jimmie

Ramage will have five seniors in the starting line-up Saturday. Backs Jim Wolfe and Dennis Polk, center Jack Shipman, tackle Brad Braune, and guard Wayne Wells are the upperclassmen. They will team with juniors Barry Christian, Rusty Cryer and Mike Ferguson, and sophomores Eugene Lindsey, David Ashby and Rickey Jaggars to round out the starting offensive team. The Tigers certainly won't lack for size in the opener, with the starting line averaging 173 pounds, and the backfield taking the field at an average of 162 pounds per man. Smallest starter is Barry Christian, who will handle the quarterbacking chores this year. He tips the scales at 135. A pair of light-weight ends draws the line average down, as Mike Ferguson weighs in at 147 and Jaggars at 156. Most of the weight in the line comes from tackles Braune, 195, and Ashby, 187. The guards, Cryer and Wells, hit the scales at 195 and 151, respectively. Shipman, the center, weighs 180. Other backs in the starting line-

up are Polk, 182, Lindsey 182, and Wolfe 150. The Tigers face an extremely tough schedule this year, with an enlarged district including eight teams. Rising Star has been tabbed a heavy favorite to cop the district title, with Gorman and Meridian expected to offer the strongest opposition. The Hico coaching staff is optimistic about the Tigers' chances of a winning season, and promise a lot of action when the team takes the field. The Tigers will have an open date next week, before striking out on a continuous nine-game stretch that ends Nov. 22.

Funeral services for William Clarence Spaulding were held Saturday afternoon, Sept. 7, at 3:00 o'clock in the Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel, with Rev. Bill Reynolds officiating. Burial was in Hico Cemetery. Mr. Spaulding was born December 7, 1879 in Louisville, Kentucky, son of Arthur C. and Irene Bolds Spaulding. He passed away in the Hico City Hospital September 6, 1968, after an extended illness. He was 88 years old and a member of the Methodist Church. He came to Texas from Kentucky 35 years ago and had lived in Hico for 64 years. Mr. Spaulding was a retired carpenter.

Mill Owner Receives Crushed Hand in Saturday Accident

A. H. (Red) Lackey was reported to be resting as well as could be expected in Harris Hospital in Fort Worth following surgery there last Saturday on his right hand, which was severely injured that morning in a milling accident. Mr. Lackey's hand was caught in a crimping machine at his feed mill about 8:30 a.m. Saturday, and remained entangled in the mill for about 15 minutes before a truck driver heard his cry for help and came to his aid. He was discovered by L. N. Harrison of DeLeon, who released Lackey and carried him to Hico Hospital for emergency treatment. Lackey was then rushed to the Fort Worth hospital by ambulance, where he underwent surgery that lasted five hours in an effort to repair the badly mangled hand. According to his son, Jim, the local businessman became entangled in the crimper when he attempted to remove a rock from the machine. A finger was caught, pulling his hand into the mill to the wrist.

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

On the Home Range

Sweet, juicy pears ripening in home orchards add flavor and appetite appeal as well as cold contrast to family meals. And winter meals will be more interesting if you make pear preserves or pear honey with the summer fruit now in season.

Pear Preserves

To make pear preserves, select pears that hold their shape and have a good flavor. Allow the fruit to reach the firm ripe stage. Wash, pare and cut fruit into uniform pieces, such as quarters or eighths, depending on size of the fruit; then core. Use the proportion of one pound prepared fruit to ¾ to one pound of sugar. Combine the fruit and sugar in alternate layers and let stand overnight before cooking, or cook at once adding fourth cup water per pound of fruit.

Cook until the syrup is the desired thickness, stirring occasionally. Fill hot, dry sterilized jars three-fourths full with preserved fruit. If paraffin is used, add enough

syrup to fill the jar to one-fourth inch of the top; otherwise, fill to top. Seal, label and store in a cool place.

Pear Honey

To make pear honey, cut or grind ripe late pears into small pieces. To four pounds of pears use three pounds of sugar. Mix and cook until it is the consistency of honey. Pour into hot sterilized jars. Leave no head space. Seal. For variety, add half cup lemon juice or one cup crushed pineapple five minutes before packing.

I hope you'll enjoy trying these recipes.

For a dessert centerpiece vary the idea by spearing small squares of fruitcake, dried dates and figs, candied cherries, seedless green grapes, strawberries, and nuts. Stick them into the head of raw cabbage and eat them for dessert right off the picks. Serve the head of cabbage later, either raw or cooked.



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
