I think history records the first trains in 1880, being the Texas Central Railroad, which in later years became a part of the M-K-T system. It was found there were some of the original cross ties of cypress and some of the original spikes still in use, which prove good material used in the old construction.

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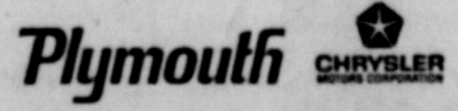

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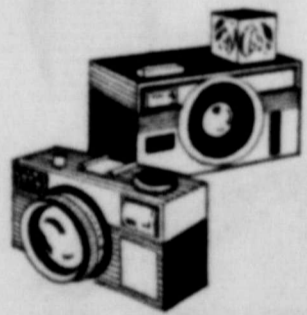

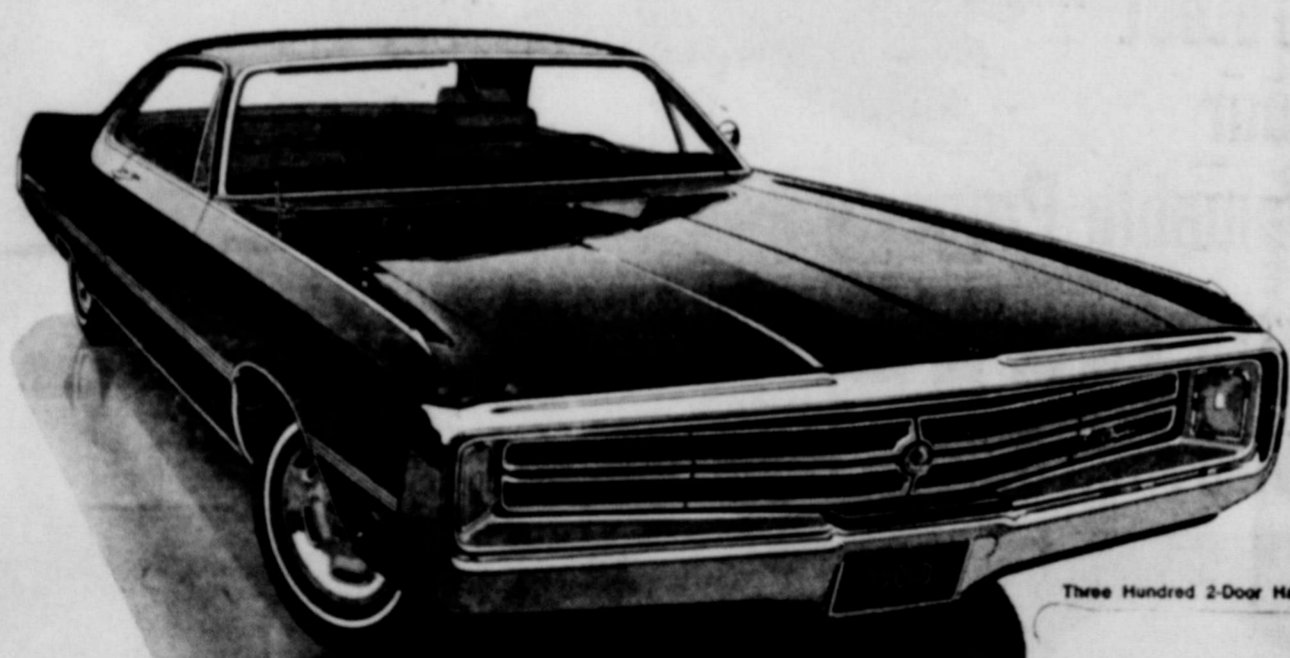
