We were saddened when news came that Alvin Priest had passed away last Thursday afternoon. Funeral services were held Saturday morning in Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel, with Rev. W. T. Reynolds, pastor of Hico Methodist Church officiating.

Alvin had spent most of his life in the Fairy community, being a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Tom Priest. He was married in early childhood, but lost his wife and an infant son in death a year or so after marriage, and he never seemed to forget the loss. He was a quiet and unassuming man, honest with his fellowmen and law-abiding. He had many friends. His last illness was so brief, although friends and relatives think the throat tumor

which caused his death had been bothering him for several years. He kept working along as he was able but finally told his employer he just didn't feel able to make a hand. He got to where he couldn't eat solid food and drink juices, and when he went to the hospital he couldn't even swallow water.

He was born May 10, 1899, being 69 years old. He is survived by a brother, Gene Priest of near Fairy; many cousins and other relatives who mourn his death. Burial was in Fairy Cemetery. 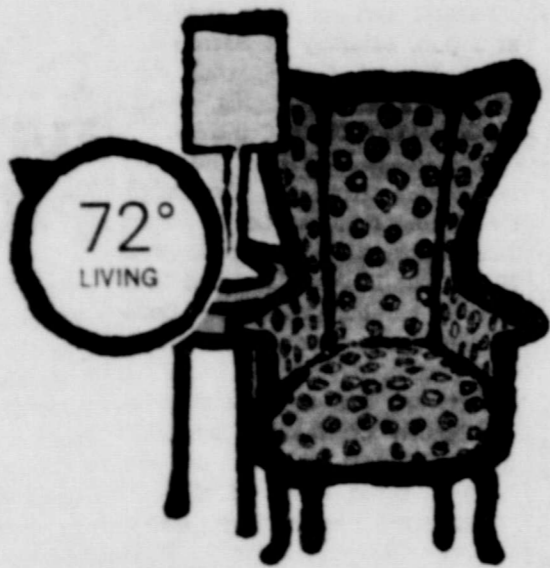
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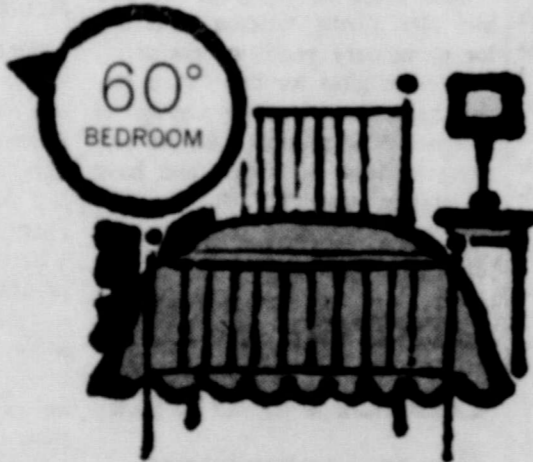
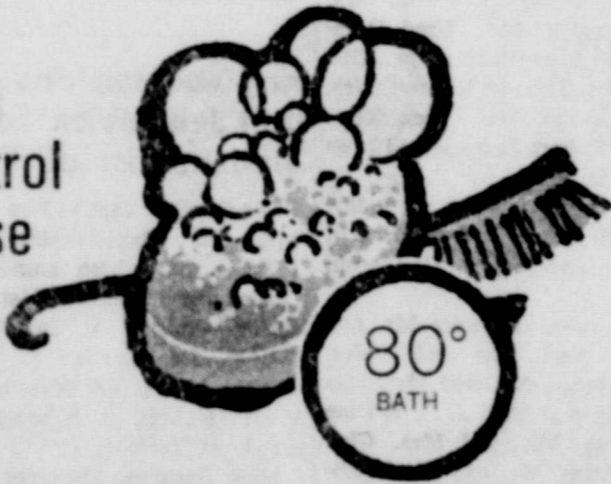

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

The program consisted of a presentation of each animal by the feeder, a grooming demonstration by the County Agent, and showing and showmanship by Gail Christian, Hamilton FFA Advisor.

The beef cattle exhibit was excellent, as it was quite evident that each youngster had put in a lot of time each day for several months getting their calves in top condi-

tion. What was dis-heartening was the number of people who took time to stop by and look at these projects.

These were all top-notch youngsters who are too busy becoming good citizens to create problems. It seems ironic that but the only way youth can get any attention is by wearing long hair and demonstrating.

Three 4-H'ers will be competing in the Heart O' Texas Fair this week at Waco. Exhibitors include Damon Chumney, West Point; Mike Harris, Hamilton; and Lucy Stearnman, Hico. Seven 4-H calves are entered in this show.

Fever ticks have been found outside the South Texas Quarantine Zone. Dr. James B. Henderson, Executive Director, Texas Animal Health Commission, made this announcement and has asked stockmen to send a sample of ticks found on either cattle or horses to a regulatory laboratory for identification. The importance of the samples cannot be over-emphasized, and it is urgent that stockmen throughout the state cooperate.

Ticks should be placed in a vial of commercial alcohol and mailed to the State-Federal Laboratory, 3rd Floor, Western Republic Life Building, Austin, Texas 78701. A label or memorandum should accompany the sample listing the name of the owner, the mailing address, location of the farm or ranch, and type of animal from which the tick or ticks were removed.

As an aid, the vials used for submitting screwworm samples for identification could be utilized. They are available at my office for the asking.

Because of the importance and urgency of this sampling program, all cattle and horse owners in the county are asked to closely observe

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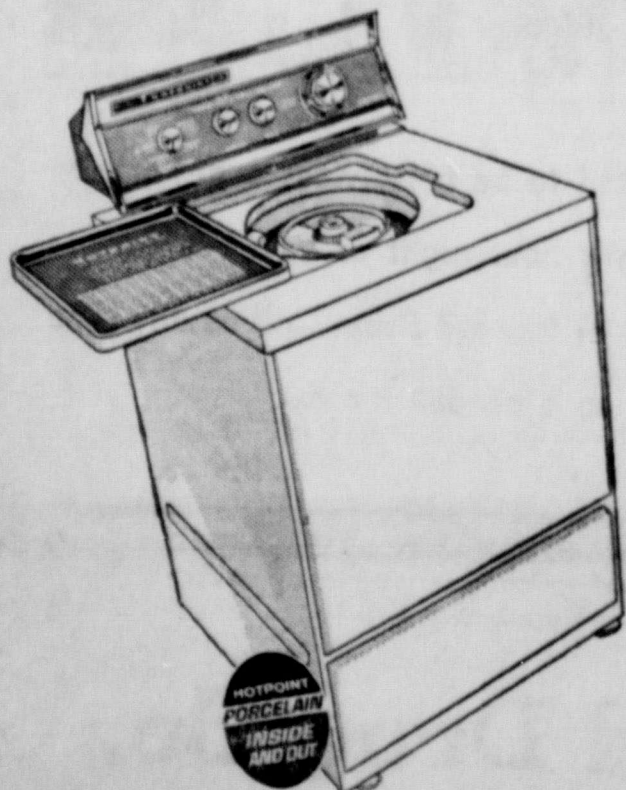

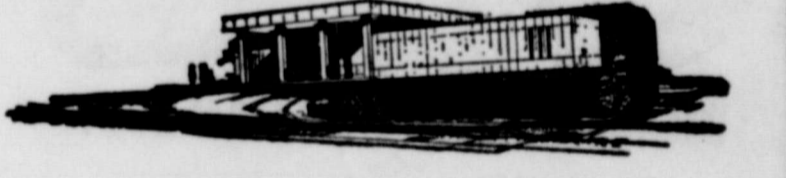
