Sales Tax Higher as Of Wednesday

Hico residents, along with those in other towns across Texas started paying 3 percent sales tax instead of the two percent Wednesday of this week. But local people can consider

themselves more fortunate than some others who have passed the local sales tax. They are now paying four percent on each \$1.00 spent.

Presently the state sales tax is effective on articles costing 25 cents or more. On Wednesday the rate was applied to articles costing 17 cents or more.

Following is a breakdown on the new tax rate to be applied: .01 to .16 No tax

the state cooperate. Ticks should be placed in a vial of commercial alcohol and mailed to the State-Federal Laboratory, 3rd Floor, Western Republic Life Building. Austin, Texas 78701. A label or memorandum should accompany the sample listing the name of the owner, the mailing address, location of the farm or ranch, and type of animal from which the tick or ticks
