City Health Officer Urges Residents to Take Flu Vaccine

City Health Officer Dr. Charles Dayton issued a statement last week urging all persons susceptible to the flu to receive flu vaccine at the earliest possible time.

The officer said that a new variant of the Asian flu, Hong Kong '68, was expected to reach the U.S. within the near future and the Public Health Department has issued warnings that the flu can reach epidemic proportions. The new type of the Asian Flu has hit approximately one-quarter million residents of Hong Kong, causing 25 fatalities.

Dr. Dayton said that flu cases ordinarily peak in December and January, but because of the number of servicemen traveling to and from the Far East it is believed the flu

will reach the States early this year.

Dr. Dayton said that at present time, there is no vaccine for the new type flu, but the Health Department has said the vaccine will be available later. The new type flu has been isolated and several pharmaceutical companies are in process of developing a vaccine.

In the meantime, Dr. Dayton said that those persons more susceptible to the flu, elderly people 45 and older, and any person who has a chronic illness history should be vaccinated with available flu shots, and then should receive a booster shot of the new vaccine when it becomes available. The local doctor said Hico Clinic personnel were recommending one flu shot now, and another in eight weeks.

Dr. Dayton said that none of the vaccine would be 100 percent effective, and that 20 to 40 percent of the people may take the flu even though they have received the shots.

Dates For Issuance of Antlerless Deer Permits Set By Wildlife Dept.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has announced the dates and locations for issuing antlerless deer permits in seven of the 10 regulatory responsibility districts.

Permits will be issued to qualified landowners or the appointed representatives between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on the date and location as indicated for each county. Permits must be drawn in the county where they are to be used.

Section 6 of Senate Bill 295, passed by the 60th Legislature, regular session, prohibits the Department from issuing permits later than 10 days prior to the opening of the deer season. If the landowner or appointed representative does not draw permits before the deadline, then permits cannot be issued for the 1968 hunting season.

Richland Springs Smothered By Tigers in First District Game

Hico traveled into unfamiliar territory last Friday night, and after a shaky start in the first period, came back strong with a stout defense and adequate offense to smother Richland Springs 30-8 in the first district contest of the season.

After allowing the hosts to play almost the entire first quarter in the Tigers' end of the field, Hico came on strong in the second period to post an 8-0 halftime lead, and were never headed. The Tigers padded the score with two touchdowns in the third period and another in the final stanza to compile the 30 points. Richland Springs got their only marker on the last play of the third quarter by returning a kickoff all the way to the end zone.

The game was well played against an opponent who, in many opinions, was the toughest foe that the Tigers had met. After the first quarter, the final outcome was never in doubt, as the Tiger offense began to roll, and the defense wasn't having part of any more goal-line stands.

The Hico defense, led by Jim Wolfe, Brad Braune, Rusty Cryer, Wayne Wells and Dennis Polk, was so well-knit that Richland Springs was allowed only 66 net yards rushing and limited to six first downs. Four of the first downs came in the first quarter.

On the other hand, Hico rolled to 21 first downs, 272 net yards rushing, and tacked on 73 yards more in the passing department to completely dominate the contest. Hico fans sensed that the score could have been larger had not Coaches Coan and Ramage elected to play some of the younger boys throughout the contest. Reserve quarterback Reggie Grover played a big part

of the game at running back, and came through with several key offensive and defensive plays. Three freshmen team members, Lee Ramage, Robert Scott and Ronnie Wells, also gave good defensive performances.

Richland Springs took the opening kickoff and marched to the Tiger eight yard line before the defense dug in, and the home team was unsuccessful on a field goal attempt. One other Richland Springs drive was halted at the Tiger 30 during the initial period.

Hico cranked up its offense late in the period, and marched to the Cayote five yard line before Wolfe was trapped for a 25-yard loss. The Tigers moved back to the ten before giving up possession.

Taking over at that point, two running plays lost six yards for Richland Springs, and on the next play, the Tiger defense smothered the hosts in the end zone for a 2-point safety.

Following the safety, Hico returned the free kick to the Cayote's 34, and with Eugene Lindsey, Wolfe and Polk alternating, the Tigers worked to the nine, from where Polk ran through a huge hole up the middle for the six points. The run was one of many during the night by Polk, and credit should be given to guards Cryer and Wells, and Center Jack Shipman for opening the gaping holes.

Hico's second TD came on the first series of downs in the second half. A fine 30-yard runback of the kickoff to the 40-yard line by Barry Christian started the move. Wolfe got the six-pointer on a 6-yard keeper, Polk was successful on the two-point conversion, and the Tigers owned a 16-0 lead.

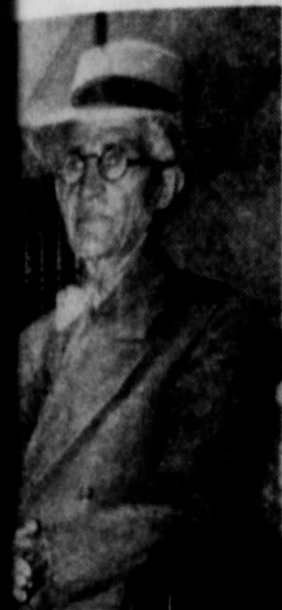
In his new position, Teague will work out of the McAllen office. He and his wife, Pam, have one son, Alan, 3. They will make their home in Edinburg.

Services for Lusk Randals, who passed away Thursday, Oct. 10, 1968, at Hico City Hospital, were held at 2 p.m. Friday, Oct. 11, at the First Methodist Church, Hico. The Rev. W. T. Reynolds and Rev. Garrett of Cleburne officiated. Burial was in Hico Cemetery.

Mr. Randals was a longtime resident and pioneer Hico businessman, having lived here 67 years. He was a partner with two brothers in the grocery business for 40 years, from 1910 to 1950, when the business was liquidated. The Randal Brothers, operating under the famous 3-R brand, had extensive cattle and farming interests in this area, and at one time owned more than 10 farms and ranches.

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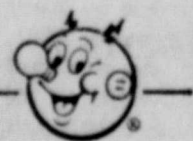

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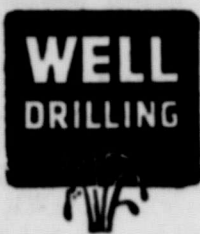

Don't graze your small grains too early. Small grains need more moisture to become sufficiently well rooted to prevent damage to stands. Also, grazing small grains before they have a chance to make needed growth can reduce their value as suppliers of fall forage.

Oats, barley, wheat and rye which have been planted this fall should be from six to eight inches in height before they are grazed.

Research has shown that small grains will produce considerably more fall grazing when allowed to reach the above height when compared with plants which had reached only a four-inch stand when grazing started.

When grazing is started at the lower height, the plants just don't get a chance to develop since most of the fall growth is made before cold weather begins.

The plants must have lots of leaves and warm weather for fast growth. When the leaves are grazed off early, the plants at best make only slow growth.

This severely limits the grazing during the winter months when the leaves are not growing.

It is a good idea to graze small grains for only a short period each day. By following this practice, the pastures will furnish forage of high quality and the plants will make good growth.

The pecan crop around Hamilton

promises to be the best in recent years. About the only thing that could change that picture now is the pecan weevil. This pesky insect ruined short crops the last two years and is showing up again as of the last two weeks.

I rather doubt that the weevil will cause too much damage now as he got a late start and many of the varieties are too far along to be damaged severely.

Be sure and save a quart of your good native and improved pecans for area pecan shows this year. Select a sample from each of your good varieties at harvest.

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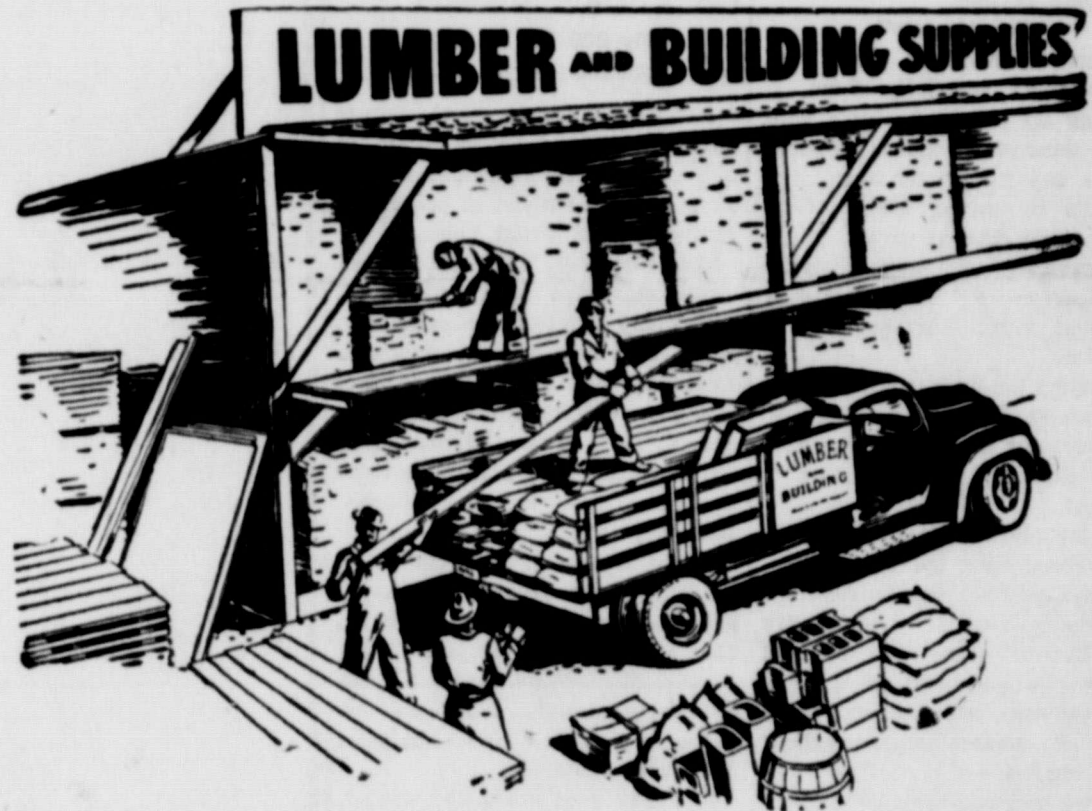

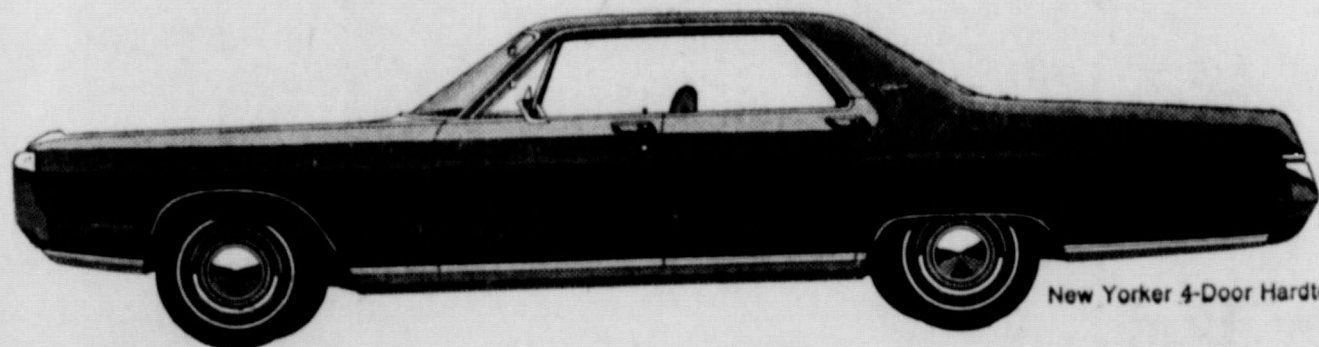

County Farmers Are Still Using Terraces For Erosion Control

Farmers have been terracing in Hamilton County for 40 years or more, a practice which came about as a means to assist in preventing erosion on cultivated fields.

Terraces have taken many patterns and have been constructed with many different methods. Most of the time they have accomplished what they were intended to do, help stop erosion. Very few farmers have actually liked to farm terraced land but they knew they had to have the protection that terraces afforded and they tolerated them.

Today this is a different story. No longer is it necessary to worry with odd shaped areas, point rows, and steep terrace slopes. Today parallel terraces can be built which are fairly straight with very few bends, and the odd areas and point rows are eliminated.

This may seem like a long wished-for dream actually coming to pass and in a sense this is true. These new terrace patterns actually make farming terraced land easier. The width between each terrace is the same, terraces are built more into the ground eliminating the steep ridges, and a farmer won't have to lose his temper plowing the point rows. Parallel terraces are spaced to fit the farmers equipment and the lay of the land.

You can contact your Soil Conservation Service Technicians to plan, design and stake out your parallel system. They may cost slightly more to build, due to cuts and fills in order to keep the grade of the terraces fairly uniform. But they are worth much more from the standpoint of making it easier to farm.
