## Ready or Not---Tuesday Is Day of Decision

### People Must Select State And National Leaders

"Ready or not—here I come with both eyes open." Remember the fun game "hide-and-seek" played when you were a kid?

The phrase could pretty well sum up Tuesday's election, when people of Texas and the U.S. must make a decision on who they want to lead them for the next four years—the next two on a state level. And most people will go to the polls with their eyes wide open.

Voters appear to be definitely undecided at this point, but locally they appear to be leaning toward the Democrats on the state level, while favoring the Republicans otherwise.

This is strictly an opinion, however, formed through daily conversation with the people on the street.

Two months ago, the third party candidate, George Wallace, appeared to have more strength locally than either the Democrats or Republicans, but another editor's opinion is that he has lost considerable ground in a very short time.

Hico—and Hamilton County—voters did a turn-about four years ago, reverting to a Democratic Presidential choice. In the previous three presidential elections, both Hico and the county had voted strongly for the Republicans, so it is anyone's guess as to which of the three parties they will support when ballots are cast.

Any way you look at it, there are three choices on the ballot for President, and regardless of whether you vote right or wrong, it will perhaps take a full four-year term before evidence will be available as to who would have been the best choice.

#### State Politics.

While most of the attention has

been focused on the national political scene, there are still many decisions that voters must make in state races.

Nearly all of the offices have Democratic and Republican candidates, with the race nearest to home being that for State Representative.

Charles Isenhower of Clifton has challenged incumbent Democrat J. E. Ward of Glen Rose for his House seat, and reports from some corners of the district show more than casual support for the Republican candidate.

In the Governor's race, Democrat Preston Smith appears to be far ahead of Republican Paul Eggers, but this, too, could be a reversal when the votes are tabulated. This opinion is that Smith is too well-known over the state, and will win the governor's seat by a large margin over his not-so-well-known opponent.

#### Constitutional Amendments.

Not to be forgotten are 14 Amendments to the State Constitution which appear on the blanket-size ballot.

A brief description of each amendment follows:

1. Revising provisions for management and administration of the state employee's retirement system and permitting investment in securities other than government bonds.
2. Raising the state's welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million.
3. Permitting investment of the Permanent University Fund by UT regents in certain types of securities, with the "prudent man rule."
4. Allowing Dallas County to is-

sue road bonds on vote of property taxpayers.

5. Authorizing a raise in state legislators' salary from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year and extending the per diem expense allowance of legislators (\$12 a day) to 140 days of a regular lawmaking session. Present limit is 120 days.

6. Allowing the legislature to exempt from property taxes equipment installed by industrialists to control air or water pollution.

7. Phasing out the state property tax after Dec. 31, 1976, beginning next year, except that portion for higher education institutions.

8. Eliminating the requirement that the governor, secretary of state, and comptroller approve contracts for printing and paper.

9. Providing for contributions to the teacher retirement system on the basis of full salaries. Contributions now are limited to \$504 a year.

10. Allowing the legislature to provide for refund of state tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail in Texarkana.

11. Authorizing the legislature to permit consolidation of offices and government functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties.

12. Giving the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes and permit private concerns to operate plants thus financed.

13. Exempting from property tax certain property temporarily stored in public warehouses.

14. Spelling out that legislators will not be eligible for other offices because their terms extend a few days into January.

### Lometa Slips by Tigers 23-12

Lometa and Lometa, each with victory of a district championship, ended last Friday night in a knock-out duel, and after 48 minutes of leather-popping, the Hornets were on top 23-12. The win the Hornets one of two district titles undefeated going into the week. The other team is Rising Star, pre-season favorite to win the title, which ran its record to 2-1 with a 28-8 win over Richland County. The loss by Hico left the Hornets with a 1-1-1 district slate.

Putting the ball in play at Hico's 39, the Hornets drove the distance in five plays, with Douglas Brister getting last three steps. This was the first of three TD's scored by Brister. The point try was good, and the Hornets led 7-0 with 3:06 left in the first quarter.

The Tigers countered with a drive of their own with 5:23 left in the half. The drive covered 51 yards, with Dennis Polk going from seven yards out for the point. Point attempt was no good, and the Tigers trailed 7-6.

Lometa fumbled the ensuing kickoff and the Tigers took possession of the ball. David Ashby recovered the loose ball. Hico used plays to drive the distance, with Polk again getting the mark from four yards out, putting Hico in the lead 12-7.

Following the kickoff, the Tiger offense dug in and forced Lometa punt, which produced the most exciting play of the game. Jim White gathered in the kick at his own 20, and literally ran all over

the field to the Hornet five yard line. The run-back covered 65 yards. However, Hico was caught without a time out left, and were able to run only one play before the half ended.

Midway of the third quarter, Lometa punted dead at the Hico one yard line, and on the next play Barry Christian was tackled behind the goal for a two-point safety for the Hornets, making the score 12-9.

She was an active member of the Baptist Church and the Order of the Eastern Star until her health failed.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. Marie Alexander of Huntington Beach, Calif., one sister, Mrs. Ethel McNeil of Oklahoma; one brother, Mort Saylor of Bossier City, La.; seven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

### TSTA Rep Will Speak At P-TA

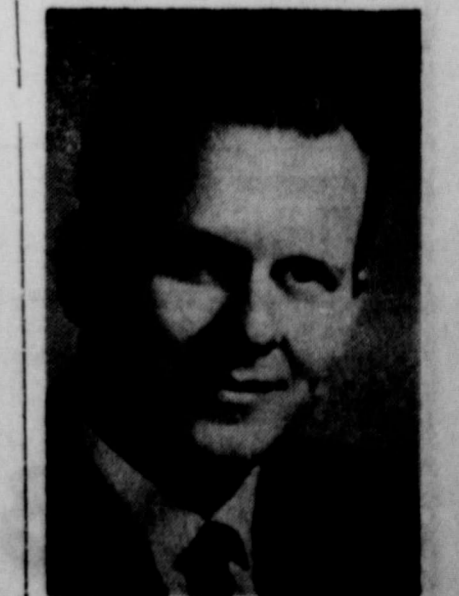
Hico Parent-Teacher Association will meet Monday evening in the school auditorium at 7:30. The executive meeting will precede the regular session at 7:00 p.m.

## Let's Look At the Record

A long-term analysis of the votes of Hubert Humphrey by the National Farmers Union lists him as voting a total of 256 times on measures of vital interest to farmers—with a 100 percent record favorable to Farmers Union.

Following are quotations from recent speeches:  
"This nation has a great debt to the American farmer, and it is not being adequately repaid. It will be repaid when America assures its farmers the same economic chance that others in our economy enjoy . . ."

"We need people with a specific agricultural background permanently located at critical points throughout the government . . ."

"I shall recommend a sizeable increase in Farmers Home Administration lending authority . . ."

"I shall fight for federal tax reform to remove artificial incentives for the movement of non-farmers into agriculture . . ."

"I want our basic farm program improved and made permanent . . ."

"We need strategic reserves of major farm commodities . . ."

"We also need stronger farm cooperatives . . ."

"We need to build new export markets for our farm commodities . . ."

"Every American must be provided enough to eat . . ."

"Our farmers must get a fair price for what is nothing less than a major contribution to peace—here and in the world . . ."

"I am ready to work with you and for you on new concepts in farm bargaining power . . ."

"What the world needs is more leaders who really care about people."

Following are highlights of his voting career on farm issues:

—In 1949, as a freshman Senator, Humphrey supported unsuccessful efforts to retain the high 90 percent of parity price supports for basic commodities which had prevailed in the war years and the early postwar period.

—In 1952, Humphrey voted against an unsuccessful amendment to reduce the Army Engineers' flood control appropriation by \$12 million.

—In 1953, Humphrey introduced a bill to provide emergency food relief for Pakistan.

—In 1953, he voted for an unsuccessful amendment to add \$30 million to the soil conservation appropriation.

—In 1954, he introduced a bill to authorize the President to utilize the surplus food commodities of the U.S. to further the foreign relations of the nation and relieve famine in foreign lands—Forerunner of Food for Peace.

—In 1954, Humphrey introduced a bill to provide supplementary food benefits for public assistance recipients under the Social Security Act—Forerunner of the Food Stamp program.

—In 1954, Humphrey voted against the Republican Administration's flexible farm price supports.

—In 1955 he sponsored two measures designed to mobilize agricultural resources for the relief of hunger in this country.

—In 1956, he introduced a measure providing for a three-year extension of the school milk program and an increase in the annual authorization to \$75 million. The bill passed the Senate 89-0 and became P.L. 540.

—In 1956, the Democratic Congress and the Republican Administration became embroiled in a struggle over the farm program. The Administration sent to Congress a bill providing for an extension of flexible price supports and a voluntary soil bank program. The Senate Agriculture Committee (of which Humphrey was a member) reported out a bill restoring high rigid price supports at 90 percent of parity, and making compliance with acreage allotments a condition of receipt of soil bank payments. The 90 percent supports were deleted by amendment, which Humphrey voted against. Another amendment to delete special 90 percent supports for millable wheat passed 46-45. Humphrey voted against it. After all the conflict, the House-Senate Conference reported a bill that provided for 90 percent supports on basic commodities. It passed 50-35, with Humphrey voting for it. President Eisenhower vetoed it. Efforts to pass it over his veto were unsuccessful, although Humphrey joined in the effort, and the Republican Administration finally got a bill that was essentially what it wanted.

—In 1959 and 1960, Humphrey introduced Area Re-development Acts, which were passed and vetoed by President Eisenhower. Humphrey again introduced it in 1961, and it became law.

Vice President Humphrey has championed many causes supported by the Farmers Union.

These include:

- Protection of public power.
- Additional credit for farmers
- Employment programs.
- Public works programs
- Housing.
- Job Corps.
- VISTA.
- Water and air pollution control.
- Economic Opportunity Act.

—In 1959, he voted for cutting soil conservation funds from \$280 to \$150 million.

—In 1951, he voted to save U.S. corporations \$55 million by delaying a tax increase for three months. U.S. Steel alone benefited by \$23 million. Small family taxpayers had to dig deeper to make up the difference.

—In 1951, he voted to shame the needy of public assistance rolls by publicizing their names. He had previously voted to deny coverage of 750,000 workers who had been included under a Supreme Court decision; and again to expand the system to cover 11 million more persons and increase payments.

—In 1951 he voted for a GOP proposal to keep funds for administering the crop insurance program the same in 1951 and in 1950, although the program included 50 percent more counties.

After he became Vice President in 1952, he again had opportunities to be influential on farm legislation when tie votes were before the Senate.

—In 1953, he refused to break a tie vote on an amendment that would increase ACP funds by \$30 million.

—In 1956, Nixon did break a tie vote in favor of an amendment deleting mandatory 90 percent supports for millable wheat.

In other votes during his career as a Congressman and Senator, Nixon took the following positions:

- Blocked low-rent housing.
- Opposed slum clearance.
- Increased GI home loan interest rates.
- Opposed effective inflation controls.
- Supported "guaranteed profit" for retailers and wholesalers.
- Favored tax reductions for the rich.
- Voted to exclude one million workers from minimum wage protection.
- Opposed aid to underdeveloped areas.

## VOTE FOR 9

TEACHER RETIREMENT AMENDMENT

Nov. 5. Paid Political Ad by Texas State Teachers Association

A vote FOR Amendment 9 will permit career teachers to improve and strengthen their retirement programs.

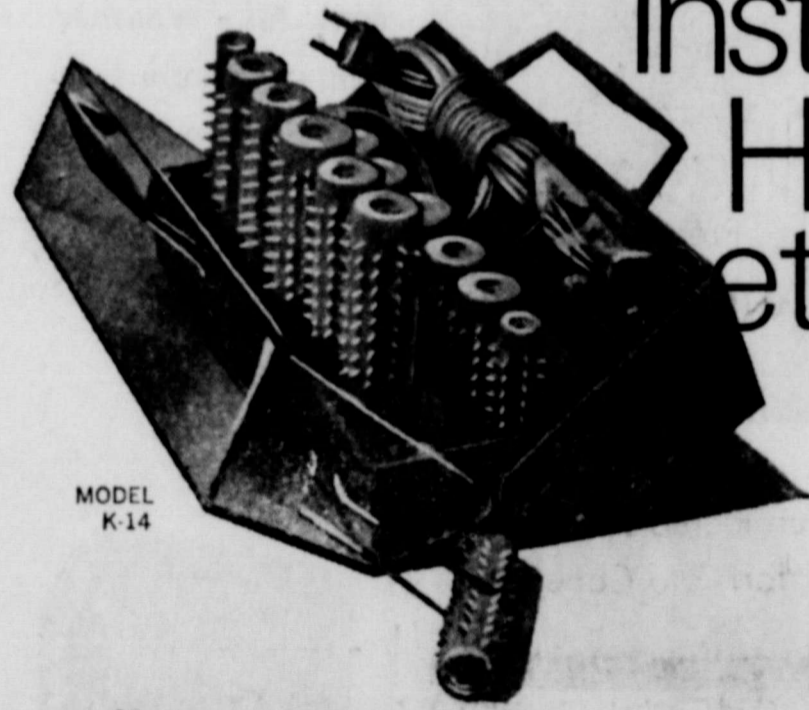

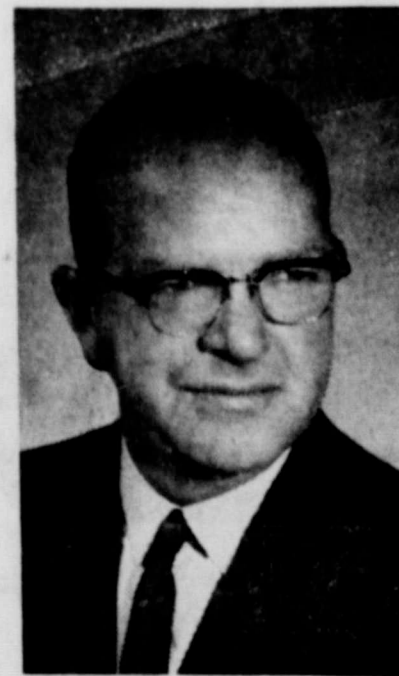
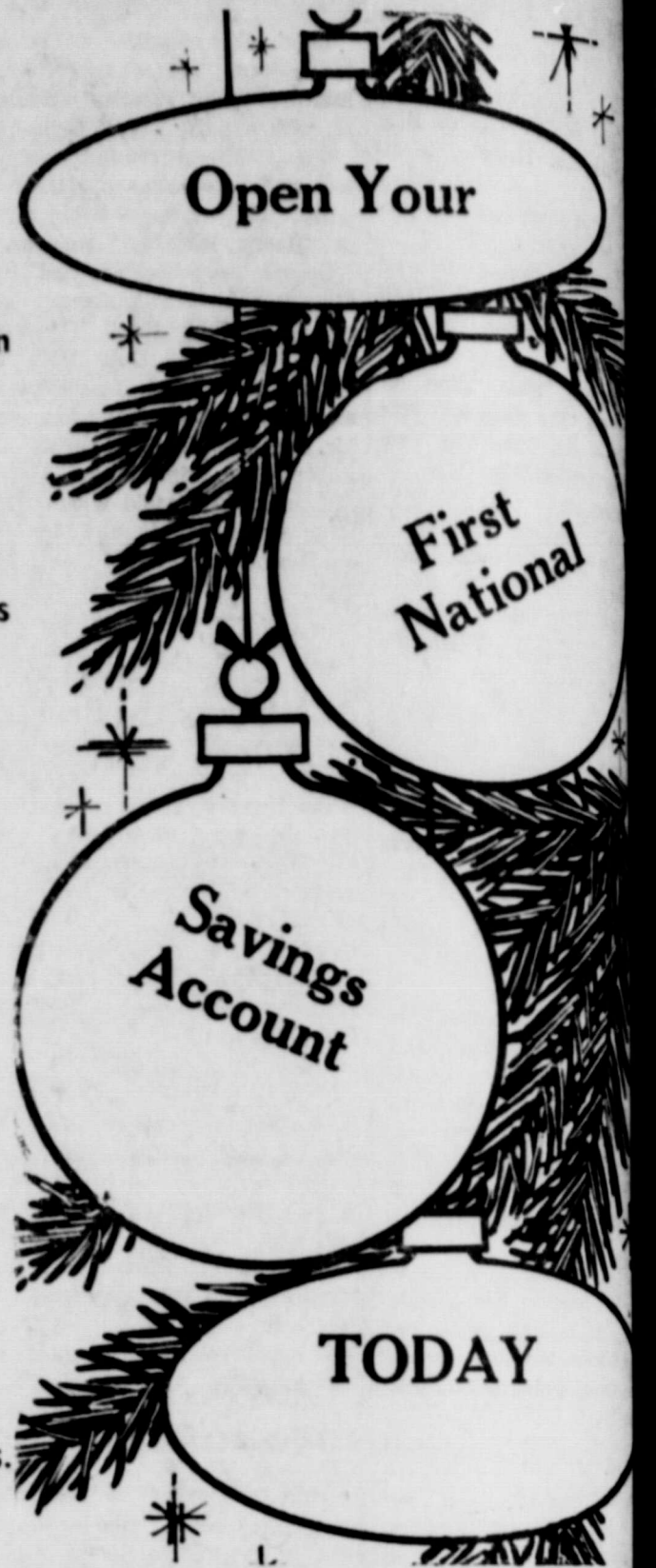
