Let's Look At the Record

A long-term analysis of the votes of Hubert Humphrey by the National Farmers Union lists him as voting a total of 256 times on measures of vital interest to farmers-with a 100 percent record favorable to Farmers Union. Following are quotations from recent speeches:

"This nation has a great debt to the American farmer, and it is not being adequately repaid. It will be repaid when America assures its farmers the same economic chance that others in our economy enjoy

"We need people with a specific agricultural background permanently located at critical points throughout the government .

"I shall recommend a sizeable increase in Farmers Home Administration lending authority "I shall fight for federal tax reform to remove artificial incentives for the movement of non-farmers into

"I want our basic farm program improved and made

"We need strategic reserves of major farm commo-

"We also need stronger farm cooperatives . . . "We need to build new export markets for our farm

"Every American must be provided enough to eat . . . "Our farmers must get a fair price for what is noth-

ing less than a major contribution to peace-here and "I am ready to work with you and for you on new

concepts in farm bargaining power . "What the world needs is more leaders who really care about people.'

Following are highlights of his voting career on farm

-In 1949, as a freshman Senator, Humphrey supported unsuccessful efforts to retain the high 90 percent of parity

price supports for basic commodities which had prevailed in the war years and the early postwar period. -In 1952. Humphrey voted against an unsuccessful amendment to reduce the Army Engineers' flood control

appropriation by \$12 million. -In 1953, Humphrey introduced a bill to provide

emergency food relief for Pakistan. -In 1953, he voted for an unsuccessful amendment to add \$30 million to the soil conservation appropriation. -In 1954, he introduced a bill to authorize the President to utilize the surplus food commodities of the U.S. to further the foreign relations of the nation and relieve famine in foreign lands-forerunner of Food for Peace.

-In 1954. Humphrey introduced a bill to provide sup plementary food benefits for public assistance recipients under the Social Security Act-Forerunner of the Food -In 1954. Humphrey voted against the Republican

Administration's flexible farm price supports. -In 1955 he sponsored two measures designed to mobilize agricultural resources for the relief of hunger in this country.

-In 1956, he introduced a measure providing for a threeyear extension of the school milk program and an increase in the annual authorization to \$75 million. The bill passed the Senate 89-0 and became P.L. 540.

-In 1956, the Democratic Congress and the Republican Administration became embroiled in a struggle over the farm program. The Administration sent to Congress a bill providing for an extension of flexible price supports and a voluntary soil bank program. The Senate Agriculture Committee (of which Humphrey was a member) reported out a bill restoring high rigid price supports at 90 percent of parity, and making compliance with acreage allotments a condition of receipt of soil bank payments. The 90 percent supports were deleted by amendment, which Humphrey voted against. Another amendment to delete special 90 percent supports for miliable wheat passed 46-45. Humphrev voted against it. After all the conflict, the House-Senate Conference reported a bill that provided for 90 percent supports on basic commodities. It passed 50-35, with Humphrev voting for it. President Elsenhower vetoed it. Efforts to bass it over his veto were unsuccessful, although Humphrey joined in the effort, and the Republican Administration finally got a bill that was essentially what it wanted.

-In 1959 and 1960, Humphrey introduced Area Redevelopment Acts, which were passed and vetoed by President Eisenhower. Humphrev again introduced it in 1961. and it became law.

Vice President Humphrey has championed many causes supported by the Farmers Union. These include:

-Protection of public power. -Additional credit for farmers

-Employment programs. _Dublic works programs

-Housing. -Ioh Corps.

-VISTA. -Water and air pollution control.

-Economic Opportunity Act.

George C. Wallace

Georye Wallace has no farm record in Washington, But Alabama farmers are among the poorest in the nation-with per farm income about half the national average, and half that of surrounding states with similar land and crops, The Wallace farm platform seems to be contradictory, proposing "to rely heavily upon a competitive market structure rather than upon prices administered or fixed by bureaucratic procedures." But it goes on to

pledge "protection and preservation" of the family farm. And then, redoubling the contradiction, the platform pledges to begin immediately to support prices at 90 percent of parity, and urging Congress to increase the support to 100 percent of parity.

A long-term analysis of the votes of Richard Nixon shows a record of almost 100 percent consistency against the Farmers Union position.

His career in the Congress was relatively shortserving from 1947 to 1950; then he became a Senator until he became Vice President in 1952.

In a major speech on agricultural policy delivered March 27, 1968 in Wassau, Wis., Nixon proposed a sevenpoint policy on farm problems: (1) replacement of Agriculture Secretary Orville Freemen; (2) "awareness" of the important role American agriculture played in "defending the dollar abroad"; (3) a national effort to attract industry to rural America; (4) stepped-up research to find new and more diverse uses for "our enormous volume of farm production"; (5) a "new look" at existing price-support programs; (6) new policies to "lower the cost of production" for American farmers; and (7) a program to send farmers overseas to "teach people how to feed themselves."

In his career as Congressman and Senator Nixon voted 16 times on key rural issues-13 of those votes were against Farmers Union position.

-In 1947 as a freshman Congressman, Nixon voted against a bill to extend price supports for wool at 90 percent of parity. The measure passed the House 151-65.

-In 1947, Nixon voted against a measure to appropriate \$250 million for the REA.

-In 1947, he voted for cutting soil conservation funds from \$295 to \$166 million.

-In 1947, he voted against a motion to agree to the Senate's addition of \$20 million for farm loans. -In 1948, he opposed inclusion of \$300 million for REA

loans in urgent deficiency bill, despite the fact that \$24 million in REA loan applications were coming in monthly and despite the inability of REA co-ops to place orders for needed equipment.

-In 1948, he voted against raising soil conservation funds from \$262.5 to \$300 million.

-In 1948, he voted for higher power and water rates by favoring shortening the repayment period for investments in dams under the law from 78 to 50 years.

-In 1948, he voted against TVA steam plants needed n a steady supply of low-cost power. He voted similarly again in 1952. -In 1948. Nixon voted to exempt railroads from anti-

trust suits for freight rate agreements among themselves approved by the ICC. President Truman vetoed the bill. but his veto was over-ridden. Nixon voted to over-ride the

-In 1949, Nixon voted against 100 percent parity support for six basic crops, and supported instead the Republican 60-90 percent "sliding scale" supports.

-In 1949, he opposed extension of farm supports to many perishables.

-In 1949. he opposed a new method of price subnorts for perishables that would have benefitted both farmers and consumers.

-In 1949, he approved an up-to-date method of computing parity and assuring stable farm income

-'n 1949. Nivon voted for the "basing point" bill that did away with protection in the Robinson-Patman Act against unfair price discrimination in favor of large buyers against small buyers.

-'n 1951, he voted for cutting soil conservation funds from \$280 to \$150 million.

-In 1951, he voted to save U.S. corporations \$55 million by delaying a tax increase for three months. U.S. Steel alone benefited by \$23 million. Small family taxpayers had to dig deeper to make up the difference.

-In 1951, he voted to shame the needy off public assistance rolls by publicizing their names. He had previously voted to deny coverage of 750,000 workers who had been included under a Supreme Court decision; and again to expand the system to cover 11 million more persons and increase payments.

-In 1951 he voted for a GOP proposal to keep funds for administering the crop insurance program the same in 1951 and in 1950, although the program included 50 percent more counties.

After he became Vice President in 1952, he again had opportunities to be influential on farm legislation when tie votes were before the Senate.

-In 1953, he refused to break a tie vote on an amendment that would increase ACP funds by \$30 million. -In 1956, Nixon did break a tie vote in favor of an

amendment deleting mandatory 90 percent supports for millable wheat.

In other votes during his career as a Congressman and Senator, Nixon took the following positions:

-Blocked low-rent housing.

-Opposed stum clearance.

-Increased GI home loan interest rates.

-Opposed effective inflation controls. -Supported "guaranteed profit" for retailers and

-Favored tax reductions for the rich. -Voted to exclude one million workers from mini-

mum wage protection. -Opposed aid to underdeveloped areas.
