## County Superintendent Gives Information on Trustee Filing

Election of school trustees will be held in all districts on Saturday, April 5, according to County School Superintendent W. B. McPherson Jr.

Time for filing application as a candidate for trustee is as follows: In all elections for the office of county school trustee, or trustee of any school district, the application for a place on the ballot shall be filed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the election. Applications for candidates for county or trustee of an independent school district having fewer than five hundred (500) scholastics shall be filed with the County Judge. For these elections five or more resident qualified voters may request that certain names be printed.

Application for candidates for trustee in a district with more than 500 scholastics shall be filed with

the secretary of the board of trustees.

Regardless of the method used in filing, each candidate is required to file a loyalty oath before his name can be printed on the ballot. Any of these forms may be secured in the office of the county superintendent.

## Council Places Restrictions On City Dump

Beginning March 1st, Hico City Dump grounds will no longer be open to the public with the exception of two days each week, Mondays and Fridays.

After a lengthy discussion of the matter, members of the City Council voted to erect a gate at the entrance, and have the grounds open on the two days mentioned.

Main reason for the action has been constant abuse of the grounds, and maintenance costs have forced the decision.

On the two designated days, an attendant will be on duty at the

gate for inspection of all refuse, and supervise admittance to the grounds.

The property has long been a source of abuse, with people from other communities using the facilities. In the program outlined by council members, the City will be able to regulate traffic to the grounds in a more efficient manner, and at a savings to taxpayers.

Also recommended in the action taken Monday night was that no dead animals—of any type—be allowed to be disposed of at the dump. This is in compliance with standards set forth by State Department of Public Health officials.

The facilities will be available to the two local haulers on a 7-day a week basis, but other residents must comply with the action.

Cooperation of all citizens who use the facilities will be greatly appreciated by the Council.

## TSC Professor Presents Program on Poverty at P-TA

Highlight of the Hico Parent-Teacher Association meeting Monday night was a talk on poverty given by Mrs. Mary Sue Staig, Economics Professor from Tarleton State College.

Mrs. Staig was introduced by Dr. Lamar Johnson, also a teacher at TSC.

Mrs. Staig defined poverty as being an acute unhappiness resulting from the lack of having what people around you have. This condition, according to the speaker, usually occurs because of "laziness," but she went on to point out that the poverty stricken have reason to be lazy due to lack of energy because of little or no food, poor medical attention, and disease. Neither the poverty stricken of the "hillbilly" area nor the poverty stricken of the ghetto area live in work-oriented society. Children from families on welfare grow up without knowing the responsibility of working. As a result poverty is self-perpetuating. And she added that many times we find public welfare has only aided in perpetuating poverty. She closed her talk with a challenging remark by stating that the solution to the problem of poverty is the job of the individual community and the concern of the individual citizens. She said, in part, that is long as we care more about the status symbol than the poor, people will continue to starve.

extensive research into the lives of these great men.



Moody Courtney of Jonesboro, a cooperater with the Hamilton-Correll Soil and Water Conservation District, has been selected as the Outstanding Farmer and Rancher of the district by the five supervisors and the Hamilton County Young Farmers organization.

Courtney was selected because he is an outstanding farmer, and is interested in making his community a better place to live.

He was born on a farm near Jonesboro, and has lived in that community all his life.

After graduating from Jonesboro High School, Courtney attended

Texas A&M University, and graduated as an agricultural engineer. In 1952 he married Miss Patty Whitely of Turnersville, and at the present time they have two children, Mary 14, and David, 10.

Courtney and his wife started their farming operation soon after he graduated from college, and it has grown to be a large enterprise. They have approximately 1,677 acres of land at the present time. He has 318 acres of cropland, 210 acres of pastureland, 1101 acres of rangeland, and 18 acres of hayland, located on or near the Leon River in Hamilton County.

During the past 13 years that he

has been a district cooperater, terraces, grassed waterways, contour farming, crop residue use and a crop rotation system have been carried out on his cropland. On rangeland he does brush control, range proper use, constructs ponds and practices a range deferred grazing program.



Accusations, charges, and counter-charges are hurled with no regard of conscience throughout our society. Our cloak of indignate self-righteousness has blinded our focus from the proper perspective. We have not only deceived ourselves, but we have permitted a wild upsurge of crime and violence. This deplorable situation can only be remedied by recognizing our own soiled garments, and hastily correcting those areas where we are lacking. Self examination, and open admittance of our own weaknesses shall not only help us to get on the right track, but can strengthen others, who in turn can benefit. House cleaning begins at home. How can we help our brother remove the mote from his eye when we cannot see for the beam in our own?

Millions of words are spoken and written each year depicting the conditions of our society, but until such time we each recognize our need for proper self-alignment, we cannot expect any substantial differential. The President's slogan, "Forward Together" can mean little as long as we continue the wide gap of misunderstanding. We need to listen! We need to hear! We need to understand! Our attitude, "You are right, if you agree with me," must be changed to "You may disagree, but I shall ever defend that this is your right."

Prejudice is the lamest excuse that can be employed, and any problem can be dealt with in complete satisfaction by an open mind, and an understanding of equal rights. May we resolve our differences, and truly go "Forward Together." World conditions of unrest, upheaval, and chaos demand we do no less. The United States of America stands as the last anchor of hope, and if we are unable to garnish our own how can we expect the multiplied millions of a disgruntled, deceived society to accept refuge in an anchor that does not hold even for those who try to extend this thin chain around the world? May we give this serious consideration.

## On the Home Range

What's the secret of making smooth gravy? Blend the flour thoroughly with fat or with cold liquid before combining it with hot liquid. For moderately thick gravy, use two tablespoons of flour and one to two tablespoons of fat to each cup of meat juices or other liquid. For thin gravy, use only 1 tablespoon each of flour and fat.

To remove onion odor from your hands, rub them with salt, lemon or vinegar—then wash with soap and water.

Adaptable cabbage is a good buy this time of year. When buying cabbage, choose a solid head that is fairly heavy for its size. Closely cropped heads with only three or four wrapper leaves are the least wasteful.

Cabbage is a popular source of

Vitamin C served raw or cooked. If you object to the well-known cabbage odor—the odor is released only when the cabbage is cooked too long. For best flavor and to save vitamins, cook it only to crisp tender.

Ten to 15 minutes will cook shredded wedges. Less time is needed for shredded cabbage. To prevent shredding, remove the outer wrapper leaves, quarter or eighth. Cook in a very small amount of salted, boiling water.







### COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

This week starts another Fat Stock Show for some Hamilton County youths. The San Antonio Show begins Feb. 4 and runs thru Feb. 16. Four Hamilton County 4-H'ers will be exhibiting in this show.

Arleen Streger will exhibit her Angus heifer; Susan Geeslin will exhibit 2 Hereford steers; Wendell Geeslin will exhibit an Angus steer and a Hereford heifer; and Bill

Adams has two Angora goats entered in the show.

This is the first major show for all the livestock. All of the exhibitors are veterans of the San Antonio Show except Arleen. This will be her first major show.

With the unseasonably warm weather we have been having we are in danger of losing a fruit crop. The sap is rising and the fruit buds are swelling. There is virtually nothing that can be done to retard blooming, but you can avoid aggravating the situation.

If you haven't pruned your fruit trees, wait a while. Pruning forces early growth and early pruning could cause the loss of your fruit crop.

It is best to delay pruning until just before growth starts in the spring.

Cotton root rot is one of our most troublesome cotton diseases, but can be controlled to a large extent.

A combination approach of crop rotation, and deep plowing is one of the most effective means of control. Rotating cotton with grain sorghum and small grains is effective, since fibrous rooted plants are resistant to root rot. Also their residue has an adverse effect on the root rot organism when turned under.

Crop rotation is a sound management practice. Consider this when planting your crops.

Senator Word was also named as a member of the Committees of Agriculture and Livestock; Contingent Expenses; County, District and Urban Affairs; Education; Finance; Insurance; Labor and Management Relations; Public Health; State Affairs; Water and Conservation; and Youth Affairs.

"I know that Senator Word will do an outstanding job as Nominations Committee chairman," Barnes said in announcing the appointment. "His past service to his state makes him extremely well qualified for the job, which will be of high importance as we perform the tasks of the 61st Legislature."

Committees handle a large volume of the actual work load performed by the Senate. All bills introduced in the Senate are referred to an appropriate committee, which holds hearings and discussions on the proposal before making recommendations for action to the Senate as a whole.

Senator Word, an attorney, is a former Bosque County Judge who was elected to the Senate in 1963.

In past legislative sessions, he served on 16 Senate committees and as chairman of the Committee on Legislative, Congressional and Judicial Districts.

Among significant legislation he has proposed was the act creating the Padre Island National Seashore, and statutes relating to School Land Board oil leases, women's rights and protective custody of mental patients.

A native of Meridian, Senator Word is a graduate of Tarleton State College and Baylor University Law School. He is first vice president of the Central Texas Industrial Development Council, a member of the Lions Club; VFW, American Legion, Meridian Volunteer Fire Department and the Chamber of Commerce.

Sen. Word and his wife Bobbye, have three children, Charles B. (Rusty) 13, J. P. (Jimbo) 10, and Amy Alice 5.


