Visitation began Monday evening after P-TA, when the Elementary and High School Buildings were open. High school students exhibited science projects from biology and chemistry classes. The young scientists, with their eagerness to explain their projects, challenged the thinking of many P-TA visitors.

The math room contained exhibits made by the geometry class. The projects, made of colored string, drawings, and even toothpicks, were examples of the math studies. The English Department showed results of many of the creative talents of high school students in poetry, essay, and theme.

The Elementary School showed signs of Spring with colorful displays of art work in the lower grades. Many students showed their work at their desk. Units of Texas History and geography were displayed and observed by the visitors. The seventh and eighth grade students created original projects for

their guests. Go-carts, windmills, paintings and handwork were displayed. One student spent her time in the kitchen constructing a house made of cookies and held together with sugar frosting.

Hico Civic Club, and Hico and Clairette Masonic Lodge members visited school Wednesday, and had lunch in the cafeteria. Concluding their business meeting the group visited various exhibits.

Highlight of Thursday afternoon was a concert given by Ranger Junior College. A "Best of Show" trophy will be presented to the outstanding participant. Salmon-Ross Dept. C. Dittmar of Pottsville.

Fashion show judges will be composed of members of the Fashion Merchandising Division of Bauder Fashion College.

The Hico Homemaking students will sell their food entries to show visitors. Each Hico student donates the proceeds of their food sales to the Homemaking Division to help defray show expenses.

Science, Biology Winners are Named Following Judging

Biology and Chemistry students at Hico High School exhibited their projects last week. The projects, a special attraction to visitors during Public School Week, were judged Wednesday by Tarleton State College faculty members Dr. Robert Fain and Dr. Lamar Johanson. Mrs. Lucille Brummett, chemistry teacher, and Charles Coan, biology teacher, advised the students in constructing their projects.

Winners in both classes earned the right to exhibit their projects at the Regional Science Fair in Waco March 27 and 28. The annual Science Fair is held on the campus of Baylor University. Outstanding exhibits at the Waco fair are eligible for scholarships, awards and special recognition. In the past few years, several Hico High School students have been recipients of these awards.

First place chemistry project was exhibited by Frank Bonner, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Bonner. Bonner, a junior, built a functional Seismograph to record earth vibrations. The seismograph, built from ordinary materials, records vibrations from people walking in a room, sonic booms, trucks on the highway and even earthquakes.

Second place chemistry project, Hydroponics, Space Age Gardening, was exhibited by Brad Braune. His project deals with growing of plants without the use of soil. Braune, a senior, noted that his project was a means of gardening that is compact and very successful.

Tieing for third place were Miss Elizabeth Black and Billy Stearman, both senior chemistry students. Stearman's project, Aerodynamics of a Flying Saucer, tested the lift of flying saucers. He concluded that flying saucers do not operate on the principle of lift, but the principle of anti-gravity. Miss Black built a Reaction Board and timed classmate's reactions to colored lights and sounds.

Fourth place chemistry awards were presented to Miss Rebecca Sue Martin and H. L. Hill. Miss Martin's project, "Passive Computer" was to learn, understand and explain to others the principle of

computers. Hill's project, "Observation of the Perch and Polywog" involved the hibernation, freezing and shocking with electricity of the fish.

Biology Winners. First and second place winners in the biology class competition were Miss Susan Knudson and Miss Cindy Braune, first, and Miss Stephanie Walker, second.

Misses Knudson and Braune built a solar still. Energy from sunlight is used to operate the still whose purpose was to purify water unfit for drinking.

"Plants Grown in Different Gases" was Miss Walker's project. She placed plants in jars and piped smoke, carbon monoxide and oxygen into the jars containing the plant. She noted that the plants grown in carbon monoxide and smoke died.

Geometry Exhibits. Geometry students displayed their class projects during the special week. Mrs. Lucille Brummett, math teacher, announced the results of the student's entries.

Rita Robinson received first place with curved stitched stars with a different number of points from five to 24.

Jim Ferguson placed second with "Charlie Brown" drawn on graph paper.

Judi Putty received third place with her geometrical figures made with straight edge and compass. She also used a spiograph to make several different figures.

Fourth place winner, Alan Ross, made a clown using curve stitching. Also tieing for fourth place was Marilyn Behrens. She curve-stitched a map of the United States in different colors.

every year. It should be planted as soon as the soil is warm (mini- mum 55 degrees) and weather per- mits. Optimum planting dates in this area are March 10 to April 10. Last year it was too wet to get the crop in early and in 1967 it was too dry. This year maybe we can get the crop planted on schedule.

It has been shown time and time again that early planting in- creases yields. This is due to more favorable temperatures, moisture conditions and less insect damage.

We can always expect a dry July and August and we can also ex- pect heavy midge damage on late milo.

If you haven't put fertilizer down consider doing so. This is the best investment you can make. If you don't have a soil test consider 40-30-0 on upland soils and 60-40-0 on bottomland soils for grain sorghum.

Providing that the extremely cold weather we have been having in March doesn't kill the fruit crop.

The first spraying should be at petal fall, and the second at shuck split, and after this spray at about two-week intervals until harvest.

Early season insect control can be obtained with Dieldrin, Para- thion or Guthion. Sevin should be used when approaching harvest as it is a safer chemical. Wettable sulfur is an excellent, inexpensive

fungicide and should be applied with every insecticide application.

For further information pick up L-245, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruits and Nuts, in the County Agent's office.

Washington, D.C.—The VIPs (very important persons) are common around Government facilities—like military bases and other installations—VIP lounges, parking spaces and other accommodations. Big business also recognizes status VIP.

The term applies to the position the person holds rather than to the person. It is a matter of convenience.

In cities and probably a great many other places, the term should probably be better applied to the fellow who can fix a doorknob or unstop a sink. He is an important person, if he does it right and at the time specified. The trouble is that a great many of those VIPs let the opportunity slip.

A man the other day was talking about being in a fairly new and modern hotel. When the bellboy placed his bag on the bed, the headboard fell off. The dresser had a split that extended across two drawers. The bath room fixtures had not even been anchored to the wall. A little while later, the marble foyer was blocked while workmen tried to stop a leak in the ceiling. All this for \$40 a day.

An automobile dealer was describing his dilemma and said he spent most of his time trying to repair new cars he had just sold. He had to keep knobs from falling off, tighten loose chrome strips and repair sloppy painting.

The question is being raised: Is this a fallout of full employment? In spite of joblessness among the hard-core unemployed, apparently almost anyone who is willing to work and not walk off before quitting time can draw a living wage. Those who are fired can usually walk down the street to another job and be re-employed.

Looking at the over-all picture, the whole operation that produces anything may be at fault—the paneled executive office, engineers, chemists, accountants, college professor—whoever may share some of the blame. Experience indicates that when skills are in short supply, the prima donnas, job jumpers and the like, increase.

Maybe we are all cheating on one another. The careless man on the automobile assembly line is robbed when his sly TV repairman replaces perfectly good tubes. The TV man curses when his new shoes split the third time he wears them or the button falls off his new shirt.

The lazy foreman in the factory is outraged when the walls of his new apartment seem to be made out of cardboard. Probably a very few of us would do the best possible job about any thing unless we are concerned of the consequences of doing a bad job. It is not because we are bad—it is because we are people. The fear of the consequence of "bugging out" must at least equal the courage to stand firm.

There have been times when there was probably too much job discipline. In the depression days there were ten hungry guys and their families standing behind everyone with a job and the man doing the job knew it had to be done properly.

Today the economy is so heated the value of the dollar is in danger. Prices and wages have been leaping ahead of improvement in quality and productivity. The new Administration's policy is to "cool it."

In reason and logic, this seems to be the time to earn a reputation as being an "Honest John" and a "Willing Willie". When customers get choosy and when "Help Wanted" signs come down, reputations will likely become important again. The doorknob fixer, who is now the VIP, can maintain his status if he really fixes it on the day and time he says he will be there and not three days and three trips later.
