Small Number Cast Ballots in Annual City, School Elections

Hico voters "stayed away" from the polls in droves last Saturday when two important elections were held at City Hall.

There was no opposition in either of the elections, but the disappointing number who voted indicated that interest was at an all-time low.

In city balloting, 35 votes were cast, with incumbents

Wayne Rutledge and Alvin Casey receiving all votes.

The school balloting fared a little better, with 41 votes being cast. As in the city election, incumbents Derel Fillingim and Dr. B. C. Dayton received all the votes.

J. R. Bobo served as election judge for the city, and Miss Louise Blair served in the same capacity in the school election.

Athletic Banquet On Tap Tuesday

Kenneth Scot, a native of Stephenville, and now an assistant football coach at Texas Christian University, will be principle speaker at the Annual Athletic Banquet scheduled Tuesday evening, April 15.

The affair, sponsored by Hico

Civic Club, honors all athletes of Hico High School, including both boys and girls.

The banquet is scheduled for 7 p.m. in the school cafeteria, and tickets are now on sale from Civic Club members.

Highlights of the banquet will be presentation of team members from the football, basketball and track squads, and presentation of the Micky Maguire Award, that goes to the most valuable football team member. Mr. Maguire, former Hicoan, now of Fort Worth, has said he would be present for the program.

He served as freshman football coach at TCU for three years, before being named assistant to the varsity this past year.

Two Schools Will Compete in District One-Act Play Contest

Mike Davis as the Bishop; Brad Braune as the convict; Louise Fail as the Bishop's sister; Carolyn Doty as a peasant girl serving as maid in the Bishop's household; and Frank Bonner as the local gendarme.

Meridian's play will follow Hico's beginning at approximately 8:45. At mid-week, Supt. O. C. Cook, contest chairman, had not received information as to the title of Meridian's play.

An admission fee of 50c and 25c will be charged to pay for a critic judge to evaluate the competing plays.

Rev. Morgan Garrett To Receive Honorary Degree at Southwestern

Rev. Morgan Garrett, an outstanding Methodist minister, will be awarded an honorary doctoral degree along with three other persons, by Southwestern University in Georgetown in Convocation Ceremonies May 2.

Southwestern President Durwood Fleming announced that degree recipients will be two renowned businessmen, Charles Prothro of Wichita Falls and Henry Rockwall of Houston, another minister, Rev. Charles Williams of Houston, and Rev. Garrett of Cleburne.

Rev. Garrett, Superintendent of the Cleburne District of United Methodist Church, will receive the Doctor of Divinity Degree. He is an electrical engineer turned Methodist preacher, and has been a member of the Central Texas Conference since 1946.

Rev. Garrett was pastor of Hico Methodist Church during 1955-56-57.
