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




#### Notaries Public Must Get Re-Appointment, Pay Fee by May 15th

Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. has announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring reappointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1969 and ends June 1, 1971, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1 and May 15, inclusive. Mr. Dies emphasized that No-

taries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

Mr. Dies further stated that any person not now a Notary who desire appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1969. should apply to his County Clerk before May 16. The applicant must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States and Texas, and a resident of the coun ty for which appointed. The required application forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

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

Information on controlling insects in the home garden and a list of the insecticides which are widely used and generally available are included in L-642, "Control of Insects in the Home Garden.' Copies are available at the County Extension office.

Gardens should be checked frequently for insect infestation, and if found, control measures should be applied before the situation gets out of hand

Frankfurt is an old city that offers a large variety of interesting and historical sights, and friendly people. It is best observed from the Henninger Tuem, a 400-foot tower topped with a revolving restaurant where you can dine on the most elegant German food while observing the city.

A short motor trip away puts you on the site of one of the first Roman forts, reported to have been built in the second century. Another interesting trip is a tour down the Rhine River, although bustling with traffic of shipping and sightseeing ships. Its banks are lined with small peaceful little villages and the ancient castles still stand as sentinels. A tour through the oldest castle on the Rhine is a memorable experience, and since bridges are scarce on the Rhine, a ferry trip across the river just about makes your day complete.

A 331-mile trip to the north puts you through some historical country. About 125 miles of this is through Russian-held territory and brings you to West Berlin.
