The title of the essay was "Why I Am Proud to Be An American." Doty, along with four other junior girls, including Barbara Rebecca Martin, Judy Donley and Gail Reynolds, entered essays emphasizing the principles of good citizenship. The contest was open to all high school students of Hamilton, Coryell and Bosque counties.

The essays were submitted May 1 to Guy H. Wilson, president of Mid-Tex Association, and also contest chairman. Carolyn Doty is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Doty.

## "WHY I AM PROUD TO BE AN AMERICAN"

I am proud to be an American because of what America is: a land of opportunity, a democratic and constitutional government, a country founded upon a fundamental belief in God, a nation which cares for its people. America is respected among the nations for its power and for its greatness. America has one of the greatest economic systems, and is backed by abundant capital.

Under some governments the capital is controlled by the government. However, in the American economy, we save voluntarily, and have private ownership of means of production. Our capital is not left idle.

Our estimated wealth is put to use. Our machinery needed to equip the world's highest standard of living. The economic system, this is due also to American industry.

Ever since its founding, America has grown as a world manufacturer. In 1808 glassware was produced in a thatched-roof "factory." In 1858 more than 400 plants were making products of pressed, flat and blown glass. In New England in 1820 the shipbuilding industry was established. Iron was discovered in Massachusetts in 1854. In 1901 American manufacturers began to use mass production, while in 1910 European cars still used hand tools. Specialization has lent itself to the growth of American industry. One may summarize American industry by saying "You repair shoes, he pumps gasoline, I raise chickens. We sell to each other and to the man next door—a retired teacher on a pension." Because of this specialization and improved industry, abundant capital, and efficient economic system

our nation produces 42 percent of the world's wealth with only 3 percent of its population. This is credit enough for the respect of other countries given to America. Other countries look at America's abundant natural resources as one of the reasons for the greatness. America's present forestland totals almost 800 million acres. Each year this great nation consumes large numbers of minerals, metals, and fuels.

Foreign countries also recognize America as a country of opportunity. The opportunity offered by America is represented in the stories of two of her great men. Dwight David Eisenhower was born into a family of five brothers. He worked his and his brother's way through college by doing odd jobs. He graduated from West Point and eventually became Supreme Commander of Allied Forces in World War II. Later he was elected 34th President of the United States. Another great American, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, started as a small-time reporter. Now he writes books, a weekly column, radio programs, appears on several television series, prints sermons sent monthly to 200,000 persons in order to spread Christianity. Each Sunday more than 4,000 persons attend services conducted by Dr. Peale. Without the opportunity offered by America to these two men, they would probably have continued being small-job workers and a small-time reporter. Thus, America has become known among other nations as a nation of wealth, power, productivity, and opportunity.

However, with all its power and greatness, America never ceases to recognize the importance of its people and to care for them. America puts a value as great, or probably greater, than any other on human life. This great esteem is pointed out in an accident that took place in Southern California. A small girl fell into an abandoned dry well. The rescue operations were particularly difficult and it was two days before her body was recovered. The distraught parents did not know whether their daughter was dead or alive. Though her parents were not important, politically or otherwise, the incident of their young daughter was headline news throughout the country. During this time the happenings of the cold war in Europe were almost forgotten. The value of human life was far superior in Americans' eyes to the incidents of a huge war. Even the intensely rich and great business owners are interested in the welfare of common man. The importance of man is signified in each of the many programs started each year for unfortunate, underprivileged, or handicapped people. Medicare and Medicaid were established as programs for elderly people, and for those who are incapable of paying for the medical attention they need. America has established Social Security and old-age assistance for its citizens who have worked their share for her. Poverty programs have been established to provide for the underprivileged. VISTA and Head Start are two such programs.

America also provides for her people by making requirements and offering advancement in education. Each year large amounts of money are appropriated in order to operate free public schools. Government plans and individual loans are set aside to offer those who want it an opportunity to attend college. Education is stressed as of utmost importance. The 1,681 free public libraries scattered

over the United States help to supplement this educational program.

Spiritualism and moralism have always been important characteristics of America. One of the main motives for settlement in America was for spiritual reasons. Spiritualism continued as a characteristic throughout the development of America. Settlers of the western frontier were said to have carried an ax in one hand and a Bible in the other. The American government itself is founded upon a basic belief in God. The religious faith of our nation is exemplified by "under God" in the pledge of allegiance to our flag and "in God we trust" printed as a testimony on our currency and on some postage stamps. Today this religious faith continues. Each Sunday millions of people attend church and Sunday school. President Nixon, when preparing for his inaugural address began to look over former addresses and noted, "Each president as he was being inaugurated recognized, in his own way, the spiritual heritage of this nation, and asked for the blessing of God upon the country in its affairs at home and abroad." Moralism is also of importance in America. Freedom and moral values are thought to be mutual. Moral standards of people and classes are high only where they have long enjoyed freedom and are proportional to the amount of freedom they possessed.

America's democratic government is one of her prides and joys—"a government of the people, by the people, and for the people." America's government provides well for its people. The purposes of our government is represented in the preamble to the Constitution—"We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessing of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America." Our representative government provides for its people an opportunity to govern themselves in an indirect way. By electing representatives to Congress who see things in the same way they do, they put their vote in Congress. However, on a great many issues people are asked to vote directly. The government is made up of divided powers—the legislative department, the judicial department, and the executive department. This prevents any particular aspect of the government from becoming more powerful than any other. Great thought and hard fighting took place in order to put this government in effect.

The pre-thought of the foundation of this democracy was and continues to be of its citizens. Today the American government provides for its people:

1. Protection of the Constitution; 2. Ability to amend the constitution; 3. Checks and balances within the government; 4. Protection against foreign invasion and domestic violence; 5. Right to vote regardless of race or sex; 6. Right to hold office if qualified; 7. Freedom of religion, speech, press assembly, and petition; 8. Protection against being deprived of life, liberty and property; 9. Right of trial by jury when accused of crime and knowledge of why one is held.

Thus our government protects and provides for its citizens. I am proud to be an American because of all the things America is and stands for.

## Social Security is One of County's Largest Industries

Over \$1,500,000 in monthly security benefits was being paid to 1,197 residents of Hamilton County Central Texas by the Temple office, district manager, last week.

Hamilton County, 2,007 persons received \$134,000 in social security benefits on Jan. 1, 1969. This amounts to \$1,608,000 a year, Calvert said.

The 2,007 persons in Hamilton County receiving benefits, 274 were age 69, and 1,733 were 60 and older. By age group for the county, the breakdown was like this: 127 under age 18; 32 age 18-21; 115 age 22-59; and 1733 that were 60 years of age.

"There are five very important times when people need to contact their social security office or see their representative," Calvert added. "These are: first, when they need a social security card or to change their name on cards; second, when someone who has a social security card dies, regardless of age; third, when the worker becomes disabled at any time under age 65; fourth, two or three months before age 62; and fifth, and very important, two or three months before attaining age 65, Calvert concluded.

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### 'Little Kal' Segrist is Named SWC Coach of the Year

(Ed Note: The following story, by Associated Press, is about a former Hicoan, Kal Segrist, who was recently named Coach of the Year in the Southwest Conference. Young Segrist is the son of Kal Segrist of Hico, and has many friends and relatives here).

The year was 1950 and W. Branch Rickey, then president of the Brooklyn Dodgers, was watching a stocky, blond Texas player in batting practice at the NCAA College World Series.

The youngster's smooth, fluid swing sent pitch after pitch cracking off the bat. Rickey nudged his companion: "That's the best college ballplayer I've ever seen."

The player completed his cuts, laid down a bunt and started running toward first base. Rickey's expression changed. "Hey, what's the matter with the kid's legs?" he asked as the boy charged down the line giving the appearance of a slight limp.

That's the way it always was, says Kal Segrist, that same youngster who many say would have been a great major leaguer had he not had a gimped left knee, the result of a childhood fall.

"People never used to say 'Hi Kal, how are you,'" Segrist recalled. "It was always 'Hi Kal, how's the leg?'"

It all came back as Segrist reviewed his career in baseball and the quirks of fate that brought him his latest honor—the vote of his fellow coaches as the Southwest Conference Baseball Coach of the Year for his building program as Texas Tech head coach.

Following the 1950 College World Series, in which the Segrist-led

Texas Longhorns won their second consecutive championship, Segrist was signed by the New York Yankees and sent to the club's AAA affiliate in Kansas City.

Dubbed "the major league player with minor league legs," Segrist was involved in a mass player trade that sent him to Baltimore in 1955. The following year Segrist suffered a deep muscle strain in his right leg which hemorrhaged and formed a clot.

This further complicated his difficulty in running and Segrist retired in 1961. Despite several outstanding minor league years and several brief stints in the majors majors he never attained the greatness that had been predicted of him.

And still today they talk about the legs. "He'd have been a great one," a friend said recently, "if it hadn't been for those legs."

Segrist shrugs off the "ifs." "Sure good speed and sound legs would have helped me in the majors," he said. "But if it hadn't been the legs it might have been something else. I had a good career. I enjoyed it and I can't look back."

Segrist would rather look forward to his future as Red Raider head coach. In 1968, Tech's first under Segrist, the Raiders finished with a 2-15 last place record in their first year in the SWC title chase.

In 1969, Tech finished third with a 9-5 record and handed champion Texas, the top-ranked college team in the nation, one of only two SWC losses.
