Hico Residents Killed in Monday Auto Accident Near Lufkin

An accident Monday near Lufkin killed three local residents.

Mr. and Mrs. Hobart Proffitt and J. C. Massengale were in the car Sunday to attend the Lufkin family reunion. After spending the night in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Milligan they returned Monday. One mile west of Lufkin, a car side-swiped a truck, throwing Mrs. Massengale out of the car. She was killed with a head cut, and Mrs. Proffitt was injured. Prof. Massengale was killed with cuts and bruises. The car was a total loss, as was the truck, whose occupants were without injury.

Wednesday Rites Held for Longtime Resident, G. C. Wright

G. C. Wright, 88, passed away in the local hospital Sunday, June 29, after an extended illness.

Funeral services were held Wednesday in the First Baptist Church, Rev. R. E. Tatum, local pastor. Dr. A. J. Quinn of Morristown officiating. Entombment in the Greenwood Mausoleum in Morristown.

Wright and the late G. C. C. C. preceded her in death. She lived in Hamilton County for her married life. The first 10 years were spent in the Carlton community, where they reared eight children. In December 1944, they moved to Hico where they spent the remaining years.

Wright was very active in community life, particularly in the church. She taught a Sunday School in the Baptist Church at Carlton in Hico over fifty years. She had ten children born to Mr. and Mrs. Wright, three have preceded her in death. A son, Ennis, died in September, 1912 at the age of 10. An infant also died in 1912. A daughter, Winnie, passed away in 1966.

Survivors include three daughters, Viola Guthrie of Hico, Mrs. Stigler of Eldorado and Floyd Jones of Morris, Illinois. Her sons, Herman K. Wright of Mesa, Calif., W. Vernon Wright and G. C. Wright Jr. of Hico. She also has 14 grandchildren and great-grandchildren: a sister, Ethel Cozby of Bakersfield, and one brother, Jim Ogle of Hico, Calif.

Funeral services were held at the home of her father, Mr. Robert Jackson, Ray Keller, Hico, and H. Lackey.

Trucking-Bus Industry Will Participate in Holiday Patrol

Trained truck and bus industry safety men will take to the roads July 4th to participate in a unique Holiday Road Patrol.

The Texas program is being sponsored by the Texas Motor Transportation Association and its Council of Safety Supervisors, a statewide organization representing the motor carrier industry.

Jack C. Bryan, Director of Safety for the transportation association, said about 50 to 60 road patrol cars will be on the most heavily traveled highways of the state during the peak traffic hours during the holiday weekend. The cars will be manned by experienced members of the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors who will be particularly alert for motorists in trouble.

The Holiday Patrol vehicles will be equipped with tools, spare fuses, warning flags, first-aid equipment and gasoline safety containers. In addition many of the cars are radio equipped to allow the driver to summon repair equipment or additional help.

While these men will not have arrest powers, they will cooperate with the State Highway Patrol in every way possible.

Governor Preston Smith commended the Texas truck and bus group for its cooperation, and said, "We welcome the added assist from the safety men of the truck and bus industry. Their wide experience on the roads and their record of assistance to motorists will aid substantially during this period of high density traffic."

The industry spokesmen pointed out that truck traffic is expected to be light on the highways over the holidays since most firms restrict movements to only essential shipments. The Holiday Road Patrol will closely observe these drivers as they do during their normal year around road patrol operations to assure courteous and safe operation of the trucks.

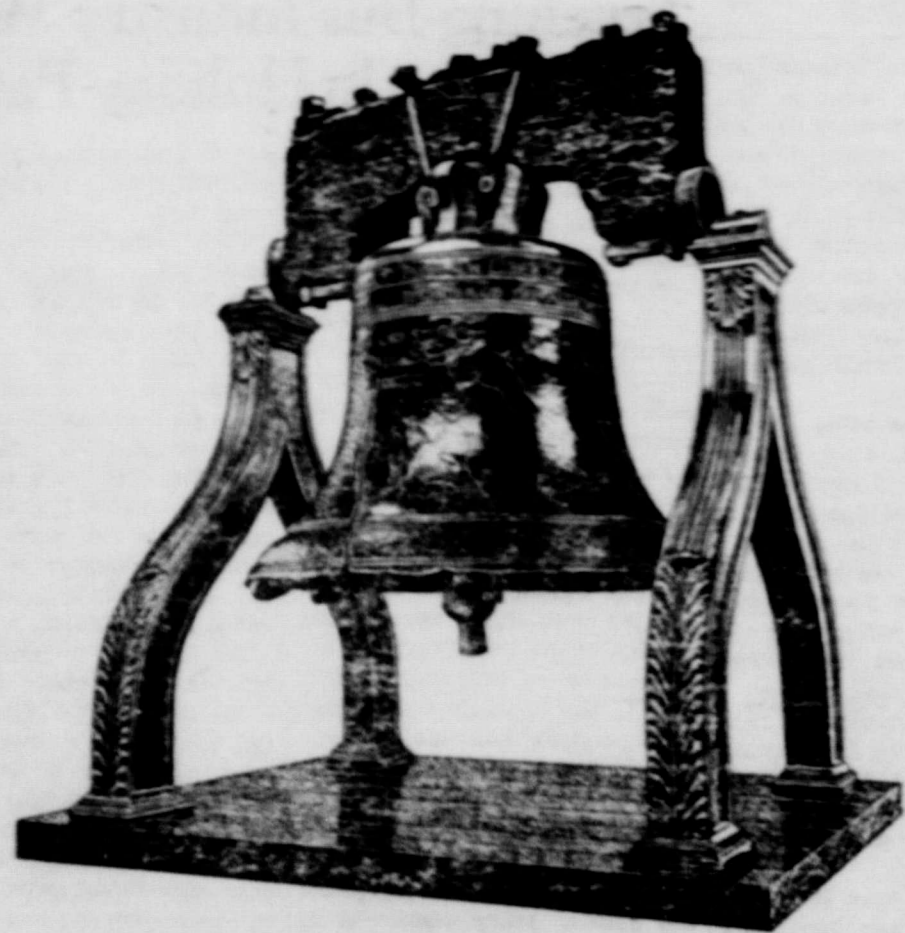

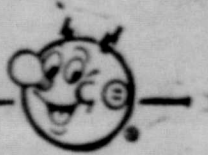

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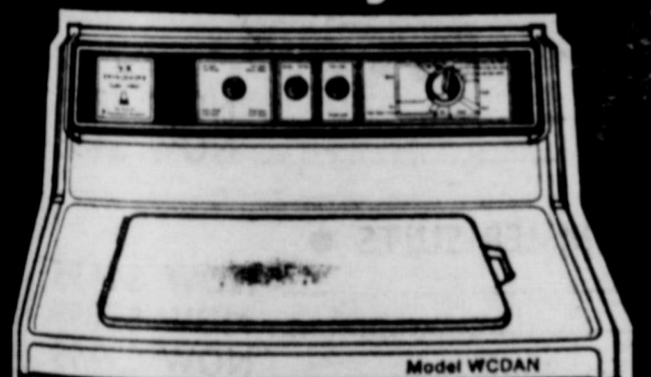

Soil Survey Being Conducted In Hamilton County by SCS

By Jim Wyrick, Soil Scientist

Next time while driving through the farming areas around Hamilton or Hico, look out at the landscape and notice the different colors of the soils. These colors, as well as texture, consistency, structure, depth of rock and other properties are used by Soil Scientists with the Soil Conservation Service to classify these soils.

Soil Scientists are presently classifying soils in the Hamilton County area in order to publish a progressive soil survey, which contains useful soils information for both rural and urban use.

Soils are grouped according to a classification system which is similar to the guides used to classify plants or animals. Soils which show the same characteristics are grouped together and given a common name.

A major area in Hamilton County in which the soils are being classified is called the Grand Prairies soil resource area. This area covers a large part of Ham-

ilton County. The soils in this area vary from heavy dark clay soils to yellow gravelly clay. They are as varied in crop yields, uses and limitations as they are in color. A few of the most common soils are Krum silty clay, Denton silty clay, Purves clay, San Saba clay, and Brackett gravelly clay. Krum is a deep reddish brown silty clay with good yielding potential; Denton is very much like Krum, except it is less than 40 inches deep, and yields are very nearly the same as Krum. Purves is also a reddish brown silty clay but it is less than 20 inches deep and is much more droughty than either Krum or Denton. San Saba is a moderately deep, heavy black clay which also has a good yielding potential. Brackett is a pale yellow, shallow, gravelly clay soil. This soil is droughty and is usually not recommended for crop production. So next time when plowing in the field or digging fishing worms, notice the soil and see if some of these soils are present on your place.
