

Lubbock Fair Boosters Will Not Stage Visits

G. E. Benson, President of the Panhandle South Plains Fair and J. R. Germany, president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Lubbock, have expressed regret that weather conditions made it impossible for the Lubbock boosters to make their annual good will tours advertising the Panhandle South Plains Fair. Heavy rains falling every few days have kept the roads in a heavy condition since the trips were first planned and at last with the fair only a few days off, the fair association and Junior Chamber of Commerce engaged an airplane to make the trip distributing the advertising.

Benson and Germany both have stated that this method was the best they could do under the circumstances, but that they would have much preferred the staging of the annual good will tours in order to meet with our people and to cement the friendships that exist over the South Plains.

"The People of this and other South Plains towns have made the fair what it is today, G. E. Benson stated last week, "and we believe that our annual automobile trips have helped develop the spirit of cooperation that exists over the entire section."

"We are going to have one of the best fairs this year that we have ever held and are expecting a large representation from each town on the South Plains."

"Among our free attractions is three airplanes flights, one at even when battle formation flying will be seen, one at two when wing walking and other death courting stunts will be offered to spectators and a drop in a parachute from a plane at five o'clock. A double parachute drop from a balloon will be seen daily. Fire works at night will be extensive and will thrill the spectators.

Fine agricultural products and livestock will be seen at the fair.

Why Not Plant a Home Orchard

Why not begin now to make plans for a small home orchard this winter? It will repay you many times for the money and labor you may put into it. Most people are convinced that fruit is a necessary part of the diet, because supply on the market is often limited it is frequently a difficult matter to have enough of this very attractive food. The average person, if asked why he does not raise his own fruit he will say it is cheaper to buy it. Perhaps so, because when one is forced to buy his fruit he does not have as much as he would like to have or should have. On the other hand, the man who has his orchard has all the fruit he needs at his own home, and frequently can sell enough to his neighbors to cover all expense of the trees. Fruits such as peaches, pears, plums and grapes can be grown in sufficient quantities so that an ample supply for the year round use may be canned and preserved. The farmer who practices diversification and lives from his farm must consider his fruit trees a very necessary part of his living.

You may see that Texas is not an orcharding state. It is true that other crops of much more value than the fruit crop, but there are sections of the State where the orchards are the equal of any in the country. We find citrus fruits, peaches, plums, figs, apples and pecans, grown on a commercial scale, in different parts of the State. While all of these fruits will do well in any one section, it is safe to say that there is no section in Texas, except where water is lacking where a home orchard of several different fruits will not succeed.

One of the most important things in starting an orchard anywhere is the selection of the proper varieties.

Especially true in the home orchard, because not only do we want varieties that are adapted to the section, but we want several varieties that will give fruit of the same kind over as long a season as possible. The best idea in choosing varieties is to consult nearby nurserymen who will be interested in selling you trees which will grow and bear fruit in your own section. Perhaps you may not be able to grow the best varieties of pears, apples, or peaches in your locality, but even Kieffer pears are better than none at all.

Bailey County Has Exhibit At Lubbock

The list of exhibits for the South Plains Fair was completed by Taylor White and shipped to Lubbock.

Weather conditions have prevented Bailey County crops from attaining their usual high average and considerable difficulty was encountered in procuring the accustomed fine specimens. In spite of these adverse conditions a specimen practically everything raised in the county will be on display, but the people of this section, who are used to seeing Bailey County carry off a lion's share of the honors, should not expect too much this year, says Mr. White.

Bailey County will have on exhibit all the grain sorghums, wheat, alfalfa, cow peas, annual forage crops, fruit (eight or ten different kinds), cotton, corn, sudan grass, peanuts, and the following vegetables: Yellow yams, onions, turnips, beets, carrots, radishes, tomatoes, eggplant, squash, cushaw, pumpkin, watermelon, peppers, okra and rhubarb.

State Convention of Commissioners Held in Amarillo

The State Convention of the County Judges and County Commissioners Association was held in Amarillo, Monday and Tuesday of this week. This convention of the men who hold these two offices in each county of the state is not held for the purpose of having a good time, but for the purpose of discussing sanely, the problems that confront the Commissioners courts, which are many, and we might say parenthetically, that some of these problems are notty.

Two of the really big problems that they must deal with are that of taxation and highways. Naturally these problems were given the major portion of time at the convention. Tax reduction was what everyone wanted, but no one seem to be wise enough to suggest a panacea for this rising inflection of taxation. Come to think about it the Commissioners' Court by right ought to obey the will and demands of the majority of its people. The people are demanding better roads and highways, better schools, and better public buildings. The only way or ways that the Commissioners Courts have to pay the bills for these better things, is by a system of taxation. If you expect to have these things you should prepare yourselves to pay for them, via a system of taxation. Any Commissioners court in any Texas county, if they should be arbitrary, by stopping all development of every character, could reduce taxation materially. But should the people desire, and by vote declare themselves willing to be lifted out of the mud and chug holes in the highways by voting a sum of money to build a system of good roads, it becomes the duty of such commissioners court to build such a system of highways, even tho every member of the court is against it.

Attention was called to the danger of Federal control of our highways as an incroachment upon State Rights. We should not become unduly alarmed and be afraid to do something because the Federal Government might take it over.

SOWS ON PASTURE NEED SOME GRAIN

After the sows have weaned their pigs and have been re-bred for fall litters, they can be easily and cheaply handled on pastures. While upon pasture they will consume about one pound of grain to each 100 pounds of live weight. Brood sows will manage to live upon pasture without grain, but it is a mistake to graze young pregnant sows on pasture without grain. Both the sow and their pigs will be stunted. How much grain and when to feed it requires good feeder judgment. Young sows and sows thin in flesh need more grain while on pasture than do mature sows and sows that are strong and in good flesh.

The kind of grain is not so important if the sows are in good pasture like alfalfa, clover or rape. Many successful hog men feed one-quarter to one-half pound of tankage daily to each brood sow before farrowing in addition to the grain and pasture. The addition of tankage is more necessary if the sows are upon a pasture like bluegrass, bromegrass, rye, etc., which are not legumes.

About ten days to two weeks before the sows are due to farrow, they are removed from the pasture to the place where they will finally farrow. This places them under closer observation of the feeder and he can feed them especially prepared rations which are both nutritious and laxative. Such management makes for more vigorous pigs and it puts the sows in better condition for farrowing and for the care of their litter.

Bovine Tuberculosis Is Fast Being Eradicated

With 89 counties on the modified-accredited list of the United States Department of Agriculture July 1, eradication of bovine tuberculosis from the country is showing unusual progress. A place on the modified-accredited list means that the county has completed a test of all the cattle within its borders, that infection was less than one-half of 1 per cent, and that all reactors were promptly removed and slaughtered.

The 89 counties show a noteworthy increase over 53, the figure on the first of the year. Besides the county-wide testing, an increase of approximately 12,000 in the number of accredited herds occurred during the same time. Coupled with this progress is the removal and slaughter each month of from 10,000 to 20,000 cattle found through systematic testing to be tuberculous. The removal of these diseased animals greatly reduces the menace to healthy stock and also to people. According to a summary of the work up to July 1, just issued by the bureau of animal industry, United States Department of Agriculture, a total of 1,120,536 herds of cattle were under supervision for the eradication of tuberculosis at the end of June.

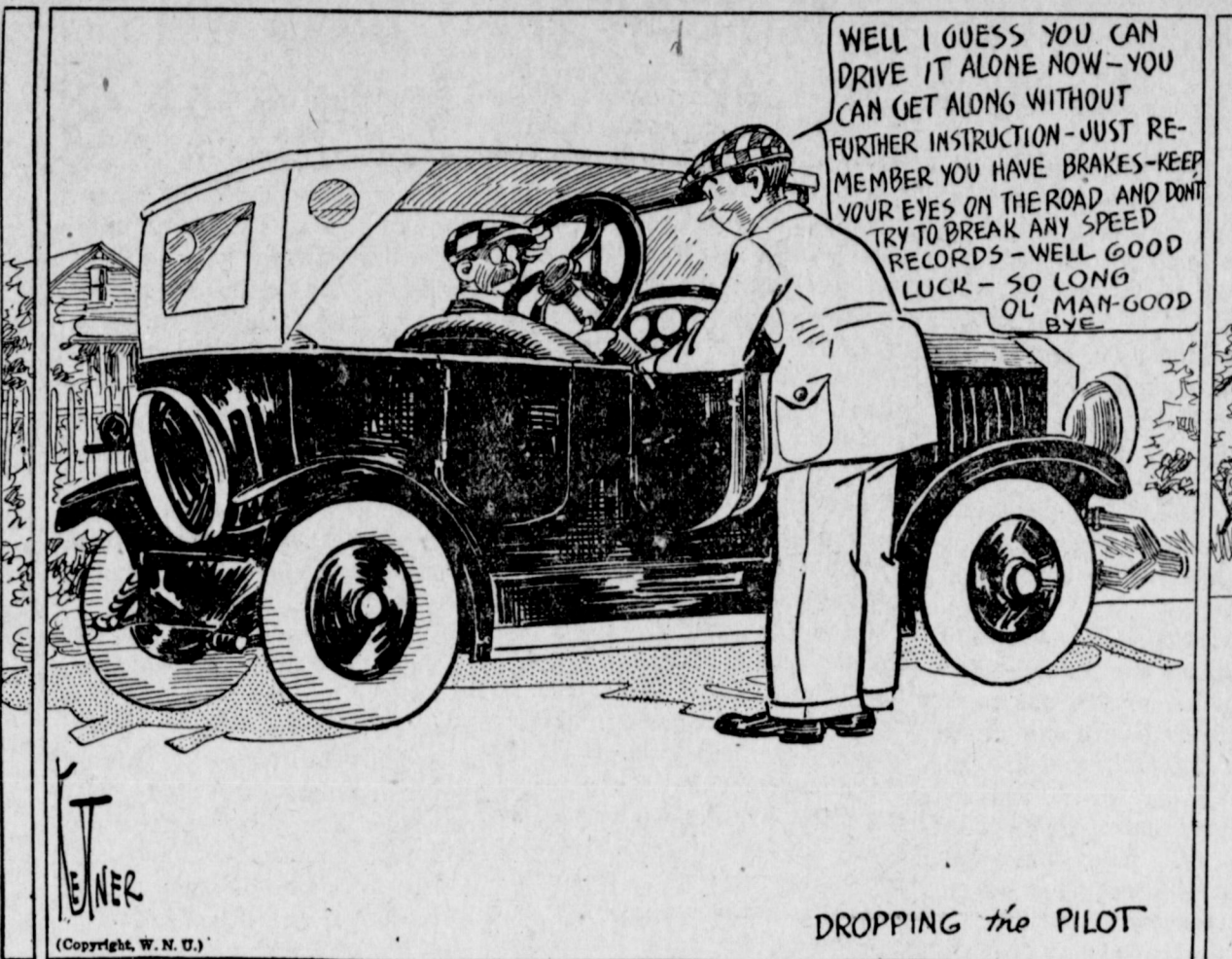

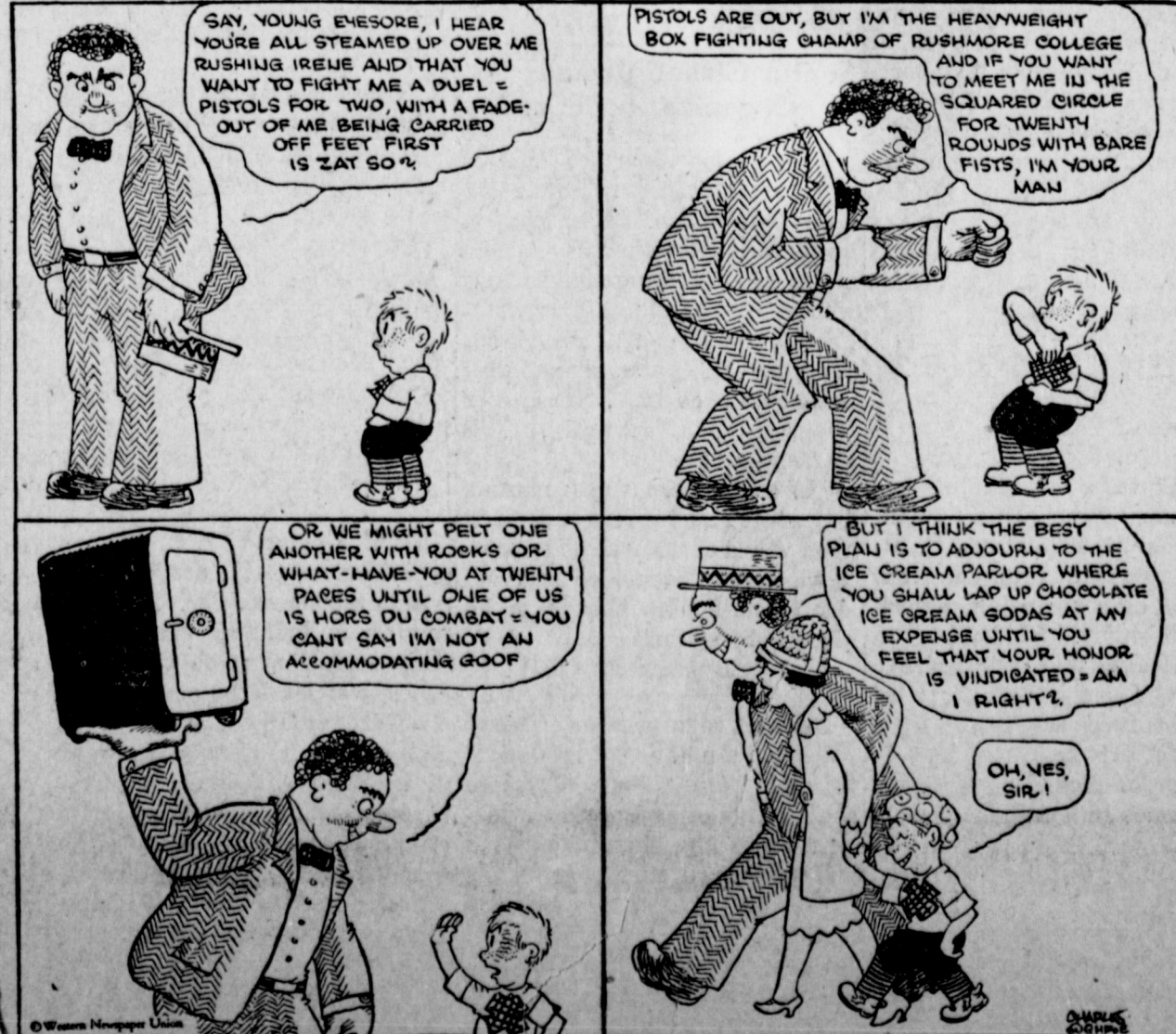

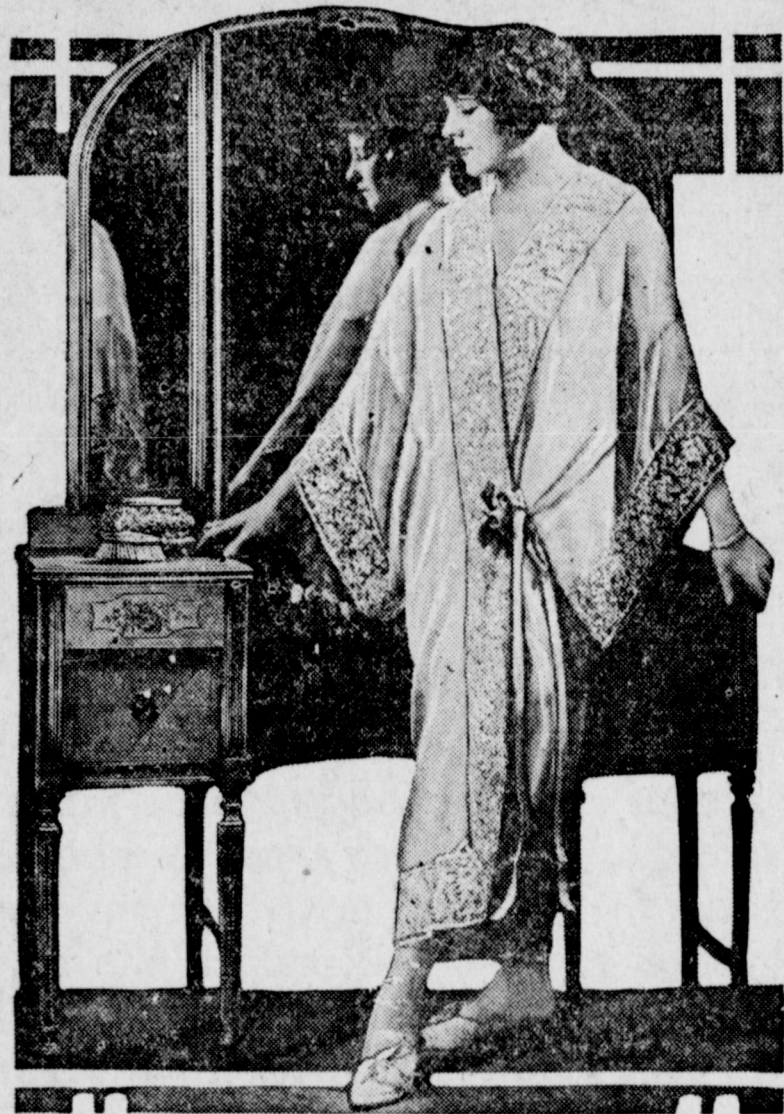

MAKE VINEGAR OF UNEXCELLED QUALITY



Apples Are Commonly Used for Making Vinegar.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Many fruit juices are well suited to vinegar making as they contain sugar in the proper proportion and other necessary or desirable substances, says the United States Department of Agriculture. Vinegar is the result of two distinct fermentation processes—an alcoholic fermentation, followed by an acetic fermentation.

Apples are most commonly used in the United States, but vinegar of unexcelled quality can be made from grapes, and very acceptable vinegar is made from oranges, peaches, persimmons, pears, berries and watermelons. Vinegar made from red raspberries will retain indefinitely the odor and flavor of the fruit, which makes it desirable for flavoring foods and beverages.

Much Material Wasted.

Fruit enough to make all the year's supply of vinegar is wasted in many homes. Surplus or inferior grades of fruit not desired for immediate use or for canning may often be turned into a useful product at a merely nominal cost. The best receptacles for making vinegar in the home are stone jars of three to six-gallon capacity. These should have straight sides and open tops and should be provided with covers. With most fruits used it is impossible to separate the juice from the pulp before the alcoholic fermentation has taken place, so a yeast inoculation is made in a mash of the fruit. The juice only may be used if it can be extracted easily. The following method, which calls for peaches, may be used, with slight variations, for any fruits.

Ripe fruit is selected. Overripe fruit may be used if decayed portions are removed. Enough peaches are used to fill a four-gallon jar about two-thirds full after they have been cut

in two and crushed with a potato masher. The stones need not be removed. Mix a cake of compressed yeast with a small portion of the juice and add it to the mash. Cover the jar with a double layer of cheesecloth to keep out insects, and a cover to exclude light. Stir the mash daily. In four to six days alcoholic fermentation will be complete.

The juice is then separated from the mash by straining it through a cheesecloth, or using a hand press at the last. Return the juice to the jar with a starter in the form of vinegar. Use one part of the vinegar to four parts of juice. Cover as before. Within a few days a thin coating or film will appear on the surface. This "mother of vinegar," which is composed almost entirely of acetic bacteria, is essential for a successful fermentation. Great care, therefore, should be taken not to cause it to fall by stirring or agitation.

To Determine Acidity.

During the acetic fermentation frequent tests should be made to determine the increase in acidity. As soon as this has reached its maximum the vinegar is filtered and bottled. Canton flannel is a good material for filtering vinegar.

The strength of the vinegar can be determined roughly by tasting. When the vinegar reaches a point where it is comparable in taste to that of a good, strong vinegar, it may be regarded as complete. For accurate results a vinegar tester, in which the strength of the vinegar is determined by the volume of gas given off when bicarbonate of soda (baking soda) is treated with a measured quantity of the vinegar to be tested, should be used. Farmers' Bulletin 1424 on "Making Vinegar in the Home and on the Farm," gives a full description of this apparatus.

PIECE THAT DON'T SPOIL APPETITE

Child Is Fortunate Who Has Been Brought Up to Like Milk.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Is your child hungry between meals or has she merely formed the habit of eating at all hours? It is easy to find the answer to this question by checking up on the kind of food she wants between meals or by observing whether or not she eats a full meal at the table without fussing. A rapidly growing child who is very active may well have food in the middle of the forenoon and afternoon if it does not dull the appetite for regular meals, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. But the patronage of the ice-cream-cone vendor and the everlast-

ing munching of candy, half-ripe bananas and pickles forms a vicious habit to which American children are particularly addicted. The nickels given to children for concentrated sweets might better be thrown away; they ruin appetite, digestion, disposition and good teeth. That child is fortunate who has been brought up to enjoy without question a glass of milk and a simple bread-and-butter sandwich while the neighborhood children are eating all-day suckers. An apple, orange or other fruit in season or a glass of cool fruit juice is especially desirable because it provides a part of the vitamin and mineral content of the diet needed for proper growth and good health.

French Fried Onion Has Very Mild, Sweet Flavor

French fried onions have a very mild, sweet flavor. They may be served hot or cold, and like potato chips, they may be kept for several days. If they are to be used when cold they should be fried in oil, since lard or fat which is solid at room temperature will cause them to look cloudy when no longer hot enough to keep the fat melted.

The United States Department of Agriculture gives the following directions for making them:

French Fried Onions.

Shave the onions crosswise into very thin slices and separate the rings from each other. Dip these rings into the batter given below, place the dipped onions in a frying basket, keeping the rings well separated, drain thoroughly, and fry in deep fat at 400 degrees Fahrenheit until crisp and browned. Drain on soft paper, salt if necessary, and serve.

Thin Fritter Batter.

1 cup milk 1 cup flour
1 or 2 eggs ½ teaspoon salt

Beat salt and eggs well together, adding the flour and milk gradually and continuing to beat. This is a pop-over batter, and should be of the consistency of cream. The amount given should be sufficient for frying from one to two pounds of onions of medium size.

Fruits and Vegetables Prevent Liver Troubles

Spinach, onions, rhubarb and other foods are sometimes said to be especially good for the liver, because they will "stimulate it." It is a common belief that many ills are due to a sluggish liver and that these ills can be overcome by eating certain foods. The apparent beneficial effect of these foods is probably due to the fact that they are mildly laxative, and nutrition specialists now believe that many of the ills ascribed to a disordered liver are really due to intestinal disturbances. Most of these ills would be avoided if the diet were well chosen and if various health habits were established which would do away with constipation. The United States Department of Agriculture has published much information on the rational diet and how to choose it. Such facts can be found, for example, in Farmers' Bulletin 1313, entitled "Good Proportions in the Diet," which describes the five food groups, and recommends that the diet include some food from each group every day, the proportion indicated. When vegetables and fruits occupy an important place in the diet, many of the supposed liver troubles disappear.
