Flower

DID YOU EVER TASTE A FLOWER?

Did you ever eat a clove? It is simply the flower bud from a tropical tree. The seed from the flowers of anise, dill, coriander, cumin and lovage are used to flavor foods.

In some parts of the world flowering daisies and lilies are eaten. Violets are made into salads and wine is made from dandelions.






