ON WOODARD FARM—

Fertilization, Management Produce 105-bu. Oat Crop

Derel Fillingim and J. B. Woodard, cooperators with the Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District, own a ranch on the Bosque River three miles southeast of Hico. Fillingim is operator of the ranch.

Following an oat yield of 105 bushels per acre this year, 6,600 lbs. per acre of crop residue was returned to the soil. This is 3000 lbs. per acre in excess of the amount required to maintain the soil in its present state of productivity. The residue left on or near the soil surface eventually decomposes to form organic matter which is a vital and necessary component of the soil.

Fillingim applied fertilizer at the rate of 36-92-0 per acre when the oats were planted and top dress-

ed with 50-0-0 in February.

The grain from an oat crop such as theirs will remove approximately 65 lbs. of nitrogen, 40 lbs. of phosphate and 20 lbs. of potassium.

One thing often overlooked is pounds of plant nutrients contained in crop residue. Sixty-six hundred pounds will contain approximately 43 lbs. of nitrogen, 26 lbs. of phosphate, and 130 lbs. of potassium. Nitrogen, the number one plant growth element, can exist only in the organic materials in the soil. The key is the use of commercial fertilizer and the proper return of the resulting abundant crop residue to the soil over a period of time.

Fillingim and Woodard and many other farmers and ranchers in the district use commercial fertilizer as the primary tool to trigger higher soil fertility and higher crop yields.

WERE IN HICO

Many people are familiar with the Texas Water Rights Act of 1967, but information received by this publication leads to believe that it is of importance to farmers and ranchers in this area to investigate the Act, and make an effort to do this in a very timely manner.

By September 1, in fact, a great amount of publicity has been given the Water Act, and that many area people know nothing of the regulations and compliance regulations. So we asked an attorney, who studied the Act thoroughly as a written description of its contents and meaning, and provided with the following—

The Act requires that any person who uses public water of the State of Texas for anything other than domestic or livestock purposes must obtain a permit from the State of Texas, effective September 1, 1969.

The Texas Water Rights Act is a claim of his right to water, including the land on which said water is used and the water used during the period 1963 through 1967.

Water found in lakes, rivers, streams, canyons and depressions, together with the arms of the Gulf of Mexico, were declared by the Legislature to be public waters of the State of Texas. This would therefore make this Act apply to any water found in the rivers or streams of Hamilton County.

Regarding the use to be made of this, I have been informed that the "livestock" exemption is reported to mean a milk cow if any such public water is used for watering commercial livestock, such should be reported for writing to you.

It is further provided in the Act that such filing is made provided, all such water rights will be terminated.

At the press of time here, it would be a service to use your newspaper to inform persons in your area to the Act if they have water right at all, in application and construction of water right is quite hazy, as in this state is an uncertainty. Until the courts rule, no one will know just what the Act is applying to. Therefore I feel that all who might possibly be affected should protect themselves.

You have it, in a nutshell, would be the advantage of filing land on rivers or streams who have a large surplus, to investigate the Act with its restrictions. Regulations mean nothing to the public, but as we are passing on this information of the Act, a landowner should be protected against the penalty, etc., that may be applied by the courts.

Information should be obtained, then we'll pass it
