Game Laws Cited as Dove Season Nears

The 1969 hunting season opens Monday, September 1.

Mourning doves will be the first target of the season, and Game Management Royis Tucker of Hamilton noted two major changes in the law from last season.

Shooting hours will be from noon until sunset, instead of the 1 p.m. tiple cuts and bruises. daily start last year. Tucker also pointed out that the daily bag limit was lowered from 12 to 10 birds per day, with 20 in possession after the first day.

Tucker gave other information about the dove season, as follows: Shotguns must be permanently plugged to a three shell capacity. Not more than two shells in the magazine and one in the chamber.

It is unlawful to hunt doves or any migratory bird with a rifle. No open season on any public road. This includes county, state, or city maintained roads.

Fishing and hunting licenses expire Sunday, August 31, 1969. All persons receiving pay for

hunting game animals or game birds on their property must purchase a Shooting Preserve License. Cost is \$5. This license can be purchased at Blair's Hardware or Royis Tucker.
