Properly Managed Farm Pond Produces Good for C. F. Hyles

By GLENN RILEY

Soil Conservation Service C. F. Hyles, owns and operates farm located about 31/2 miles southwest of Hico. He has produced and harvested approximately 300 pounds, per year, of edible fish from his one surface acre pond for the past eight years.

Commercial fertilizer is used during the plant growing season in the proper amount. This maintains the bloom of water and helps control the growth of water weeds as well His pond is cleaned out and restocked every 3 to five years.

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


