Properly Managed Farm Pond Produces Good for C. F. Hyles

C. F. Hyles, owns and operates a farm located about 3 1/2 miles southwest of Hico. He has produced and harvested approximately 300 pounds, per year, of edible fish from his one surface acre pond for the past eight years.

In 1960 he constructed the pond, in his pasture, primarily for livestock water. He decided a secondary use of the pond might be fish production and recreation. Through proper stocking of fish and management of the pond, fishing has been provided for his family and friends.

Both the Elks and Tigers feature strong running attacks, with

Evant powered by 200-pound Kyle Arnold, the big fullback who played a major role in the 6-6 battle between the two teams last year.

From all sources comes word that Evant has perhaps the best team that they have fielded in several years, and the Tigers will have to go all-out to win the game.

Rumblings elsewhere last week in the district indicate that the loop is enjoying its most successful year, and the teams

are definitely stronger than in past years.

Richland Springs Downed In Successful Loop Opener

Amassing a total offense production of 439 yards, Hico kept their record clean last Friday night by downing the Richland Springs Cayotes in the district opener for both teams.

However, the Tiger defense lost some of its pride by allowing the first touchdown of the year. Final score was Hico 27, Richland Springs 6.

The Tigers rushed for 314 yards, and put another 125 in the books on passes. Reggie Grover, Hico's quarterback, had his best game of the season, personally rushing for 88 yards and passing for another 125 on five completions in 15 attempts. He had two of his throws intercepted.

The Lindsey brothers, Eugene and Galen, rushed for 98 and 128 yards, respectively. Only other rushing attempt was by Robert Scott, who lost 3 yards.

Two Tiger receivers accounted for all of the receptions in the game, with Mike Ferguson enjoying his finest hour with four catches for 82 yards and a touchdown.

The scoring play came on a 42-yarder. The other reception was by newcomer Floyd Johnson, who was on the end of a 43-yard scoring play from Grover. Johnson is one of the Carlton transfers, who prior to this year had never played in a football game. He has shown steady improvement in each of the games played thus far, and should be a big help to the Tigers during remaining games. Johnson also intercepted a Cayote pass on the game's final play.

Ferguson, who has had trouble catching the ball this year, caught passes good for 42, 13, 22 and five yards.

Hico's defense played well, but gave up more yards than in any previous game. They allowed the Cayotes to take liberties to the tune of 210 yards rushing and another 84 passing. The passing figure would have been much higher had Cayote receivers been able to hang onto the ball. They were open, and the passer got the ball to them.

Hico scored one in the first period, twice in the second for a 20-0 halftime lead, and made the score 27-0 in the fourth quarter before allowing Richland Springs their marker.

All of Hico's markers were honest as they put together drives of 76, 97, 92 and 69 yards.

The first tally, starting at the 24, took six plays with Ferguson taking a pass that covered 42 yards. Galen Lindsey kicked the point and Hico led 7-0.

Recovering a fumble at their own three yard line late in the first quarter, the Tigers used 16 plays to travel the 97 yards, with Eugene

Lindsey plunging the final two steps. G. Lindsey's kick again was true for the 14-0 lead.

Third counter came shortly before the half, with the Tigers going 92 yards in 8 plays. Floyd Johnson was open about the 20, and took the scoring toss from Grover. The play covered 43 yards. A run try was stopped on the conversion, leaving the score 20-0 at intermission.

The third quarter was scoreless, with Hico starting their final drive in that period. The drive took six plays to cover the 69 yards, with Grover going 27 yards up the middle for the TD. He had previously ran for an 18-yard gain on a similar play. Tough blocking in the middle of the Hico line by Rickie Jaggers, David Ashby, Rusty Cryer, Lee Ramage and Melvin Powers let Grover blow through on the quick-opener for the TD.

Richland Springs scored their only marker following a short kickoff. They moved 55 yards for the score.

All in all, the game was well-played.

Anterless Deer Permits October 22

Representatives of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue anterless deer permits for the regular gun season for designated areas of Hamilton County on Wednesday, October 22, at the Courthouse in Hamilton, according to Royce Tucker, Wildlife Management officer for the county.

Mr. Tucker said that permits would be issued to landowners or their agents between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Permits in Bosque County will be issued on two days, October 20 and 21 at the Courthouse in Meridian. No information was available on issuance dates for Erath County.

Designated area in Hamilton County eligible for anterless permits include land which lies East of Farm to Market Road 1602, from Hico to Jonesboro. The area is designated Compartment I, and permits will be issued on the basis of one for each 200 acres.

Mr. Tucker said that permits would be issued on that one day only, and landowners desiring to secure permits should apply then.

A map showing the area is posted in the Hico News Review office.

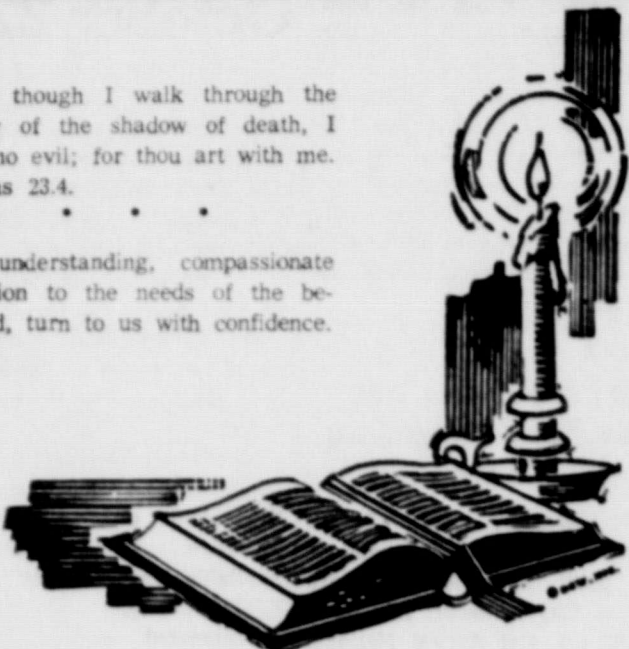

Awards were presented to 4-H'ers from the five county organizations, Hico, Hamilton, West Point, Pottsville and Norse Clubs. The awards were as follows:

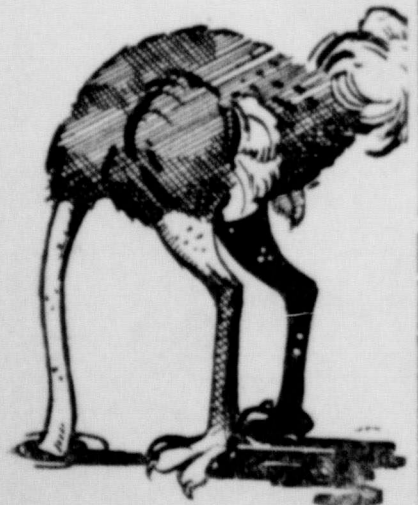

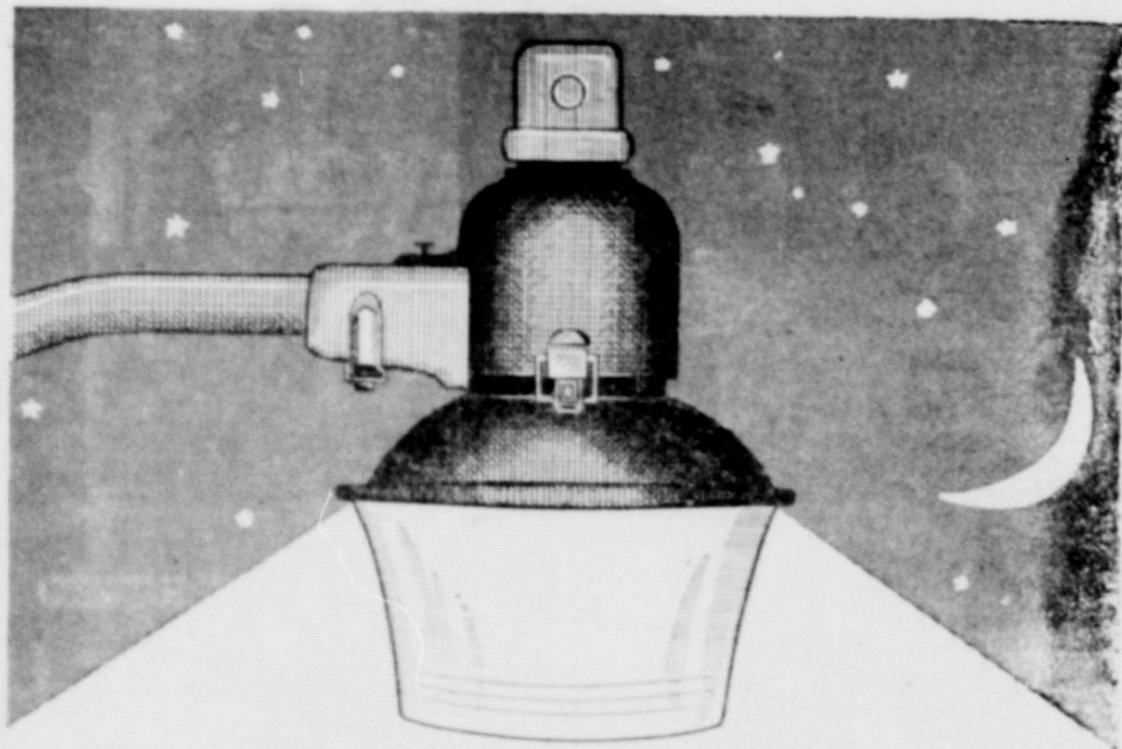

The first norther of the year causes many predictable responses from the local populace. Most of the youngsters get "runny noses" and sore throats, causing most mothers to get grey hair and a little irritable. This also has an affect on the adult male of the household. It causes him to get an itch on his right index finger.

All of these things seem to be closely correlated with the opening of the deer season. Whether the incentive is from the thrill of a hunt or just to get away from it all for a little while, deer hunting is a popular sport with many Hamilton County residents.

For those lucky or skillful enough to bag their game the resulting venison steaks can become either a treat or a treatment. The quality of venison depends primarily on how the deer is handled from the time of the kill until it is placed in the freezer.

Two bulletins are available in my office which should be of interest to deer hunters, L-634, "Field Dressing a Deer," and B-987, "Wild Game Care and Cooking."

for obvious reasons. He is a nocturnal insect and cuts off the small limbs smoother than you could with a pocket knife.

Usually the damage to the three is negligible. In most cases he simply helps prune the tree. If you are worried about the damage any good long residual insecticide applied on the limbs will discourage this insect.
