# Homecoming Expected To Draw Large Crowd

## Hico-Lometa Grid Battle is Feature of Friday Activities

Hico's Tigers are bracing themselves this week for the homecoming battle Friday night with the Lometa Hornets in a 7:30 p.m. contest at Tiger Stadium.

Both teams go into the district tussle with unblemished records. Lometa has downed Meridian and Blanket, and Hico has slapped Richland Springs and Evant.

The Hornets tied for the district title last year, losing only to the Rising Star Wildcats. They defeated Hico last season 23-12. Lometa could be considered a veteran team, starting six seniors and five juniors. For the season they are 4-1, while Hico is a perfect 5-0.

The Hornets are led by four capable backs in brothers Pat and Mike McMahan, David Potts and Larry Maxwell. In past games they have come out strong in the first half, and then coasted during the second two quarters. Lometa defeated Blanket 40-0 last week, and all of the points were scored in the first half—28 in the second

quarter.

Hico will counter with a brother combination of their own in Eugene and Galen Lindsey, Reggie Grover and Barry Christian, plus a strong defensive unit led by Rusty Cryer, Lee Ramage, David Ashby, Melvin Powers, Rickie Jaggars, and a pair of flankers capable of doing the job in Mike Ferguson and Floyd Johnson. Others who have seen much action this year are Randy Canty, Galen Christian, Benny Baley, Charles Woolsey, Jim Ferguson, Robert Scott and Wendell Bell.

The game is about as important to both teams as they will have all year, and a real slam-bang battle is expected.

In other district play last week, Gorman kept pace with a 24-6 win over Richland Springs, and Rising Star dumped Meridian 16-6.

Games this week find Lometa at Hico, Evant at Gorman, Blanket at Meridian, and Rising Star at Richland Springs.

## Husband of Former Fairy Girl Gets High North Carolina Post

Raleigh, North Carolina (Sp.)—Gonzalie Rivers, a 22-year veteran of service with the Department of Motor Vehicles, has been named director of the Department's License and Safety Inspection Division.

Mr. Rivers is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Abel of Fairy, and he and his family have been frequent visitors here in past years. He replaces Charles D. Lindsey, who has been absent from the position for approximately one month due to illness and has been granted extended sick leave.

Rivers, 46, began service with the Department of Motor Vehicles in 1947 as a member of the South Carolina State Highway Patrol. He became an inspector with the License and Safety Inspection Division in 1951, and served in that position until 1947, when he was promoted to district supervisor. He has been assistant director of the Division since 1965.

A native of Chesterfield, South Carolina, Rivers moved to North Carolina shortly after birth and was educated in Hoffman school system. He served in the U. S. Navy during World War II. Following his discharge, he was employed in private business in Hamilton for two years prior to joining the Highway Patrol.

Since becoming associated with the Department of Motor Vehicles he has been stationed in Moncure, Pittsboro and Salisbury. He has resided in Raleigh since 1965. In his new position Rivers will supervise 243 employees with responsibilities in the areas of automobile thefts, licensing and supervision of motor vehicle dealers, overweight trucks, automobile inspection, stored vehicles and the collection of bad checks.

Rivers is married to the former Joylette L. Abel of Hico, and they have one son, Jimmy. They are members of the Hayes Barton Baptist Church in Raleigh.

## Three Hico Students Speak at Somervell 4-H Awards Banquet

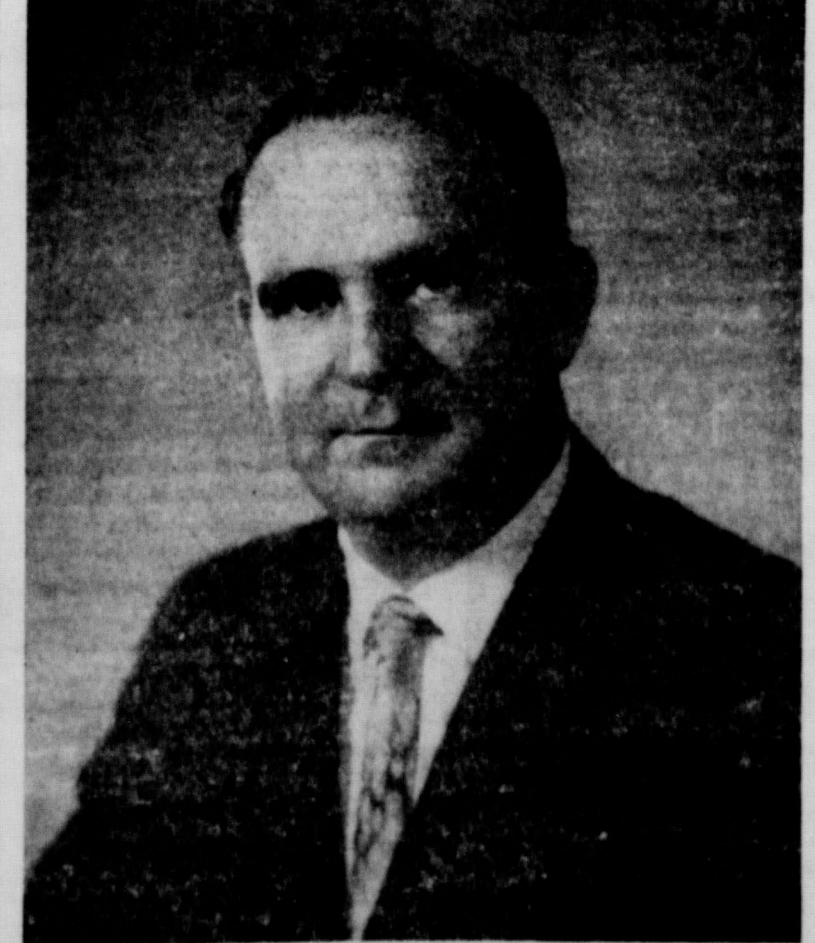

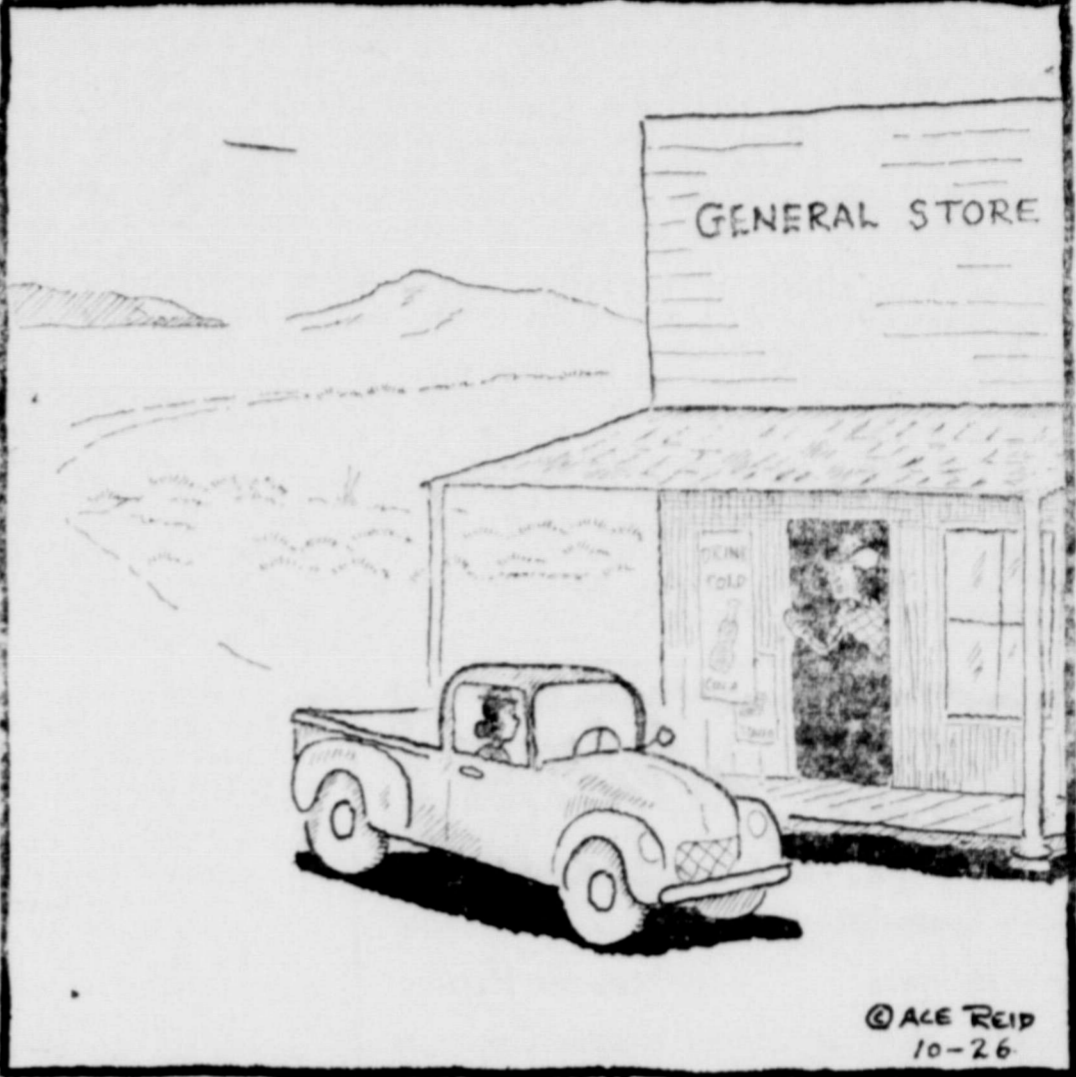
