Questions & Answers

QUESTION: I am 75 years old, still working, and get \$94 social security monthly check. My wife is not yet age 62. We have four children under age 18. If I should retire, what benefits would the six of us receive?

ANSWER: Since you are over age 72, all six of you should be receiving checks now. If your benefit is \$94 (before Medicare premium withholding), an additional \$47 a month is due your wife and children—that's \$9.50 each. You should get your children's birth certificates and see our representative to file claim for them. Your wife should come with you to apply for wife's benefits.

Half Million Dollar Approval Given Housing Authority

Hico Housing Authority, which had submitted plans for 30 low-rent homes to be constructed here, won approval of a \$510,950 contract Monday from the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The information was received in telegrams from Congressman Omar Burleson and U.S. Senator John Tower in Washington.

The latest development is another step forward in securing the housing project, which has been underway for almost two years.

In a Tuesday morning telephone conversation with the ar-

chitectural firm of Pierce, Norris & Pace and Associates of Midland, the News Review learned that the latest approval was a technicality, only, and an indication from HUD that the plan was considered feasible sound, from a financial standpoint.

Spokesman for the firm also said that after approval at the Fort Worth office of HUD, plans would be re-submitted for final approval, and then acceptance of bids would get underway.

The spokesman said that final approval should be received

within 60 days and then advertising for bids would start. Without further delay, construction could start by mid-summer, according to the architectural firm.

Hico Housing Authority was created on May 20, 1968, when the City Council of Hico entered into an agreement with the Federal Housing Authority. Bernell Jernigan is Executive Director of the local authority and members of the board are Glenn Ross, chairman, J. R. Bobo, L. J. Chaney, Hershel Sherrard, and Sherman Robertson.

No Opposition in City Or School Elections

Final filing date—Wednesday—passed with neither the City or School Trustee elections drawing opposition for the seats to be filled.

However, both elections had one new candidate due to incumbents not seeking re-election.

In the trustee election, the new candidate is Lee Flowers, local dairyman, who is seeking his first three-year term on the board. Other candidate in the trustee election is Bruce Slaughter, who is completing his first term of office. Dr. J. B. Putty declined to seek a second term

on the board. County School Trustee V. H. Jenkins is also without opposition. He serves Precinct 3 on the County Board.

In city filing, Mayor O. L. Davis, and Aldermen W. C. Howard and Ray Keller are seeking re-election. Jim Jameson, other councilman up for re-election, declined to submit his name for a place on the ballot. A newcomer to city politics is Roy Bates, local cafe owner, who will seek Jameson's seat on the council. Date for both elections is Saturday, April 4.

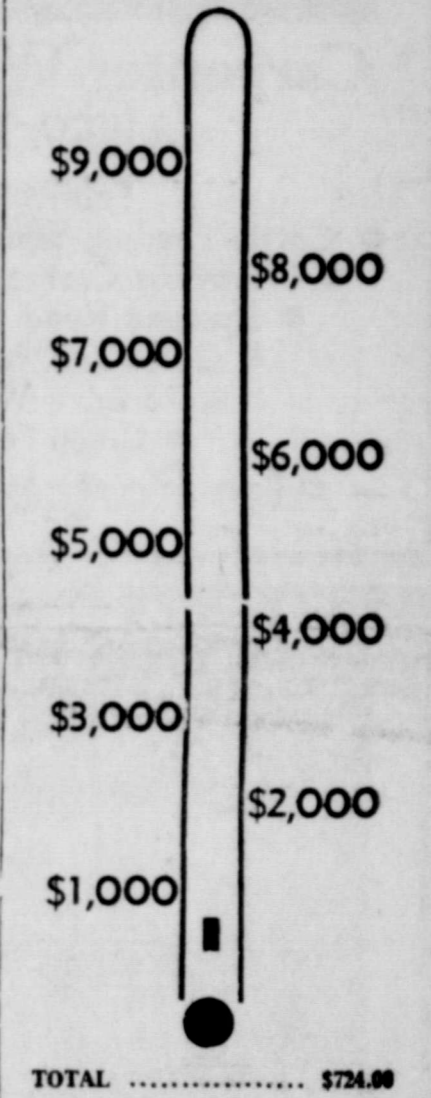
\$312 Added To Rural Fire Truck Fund

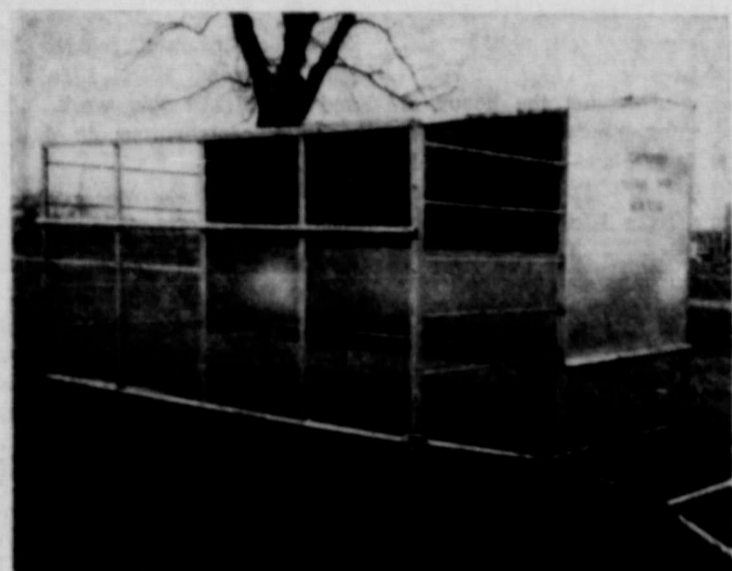

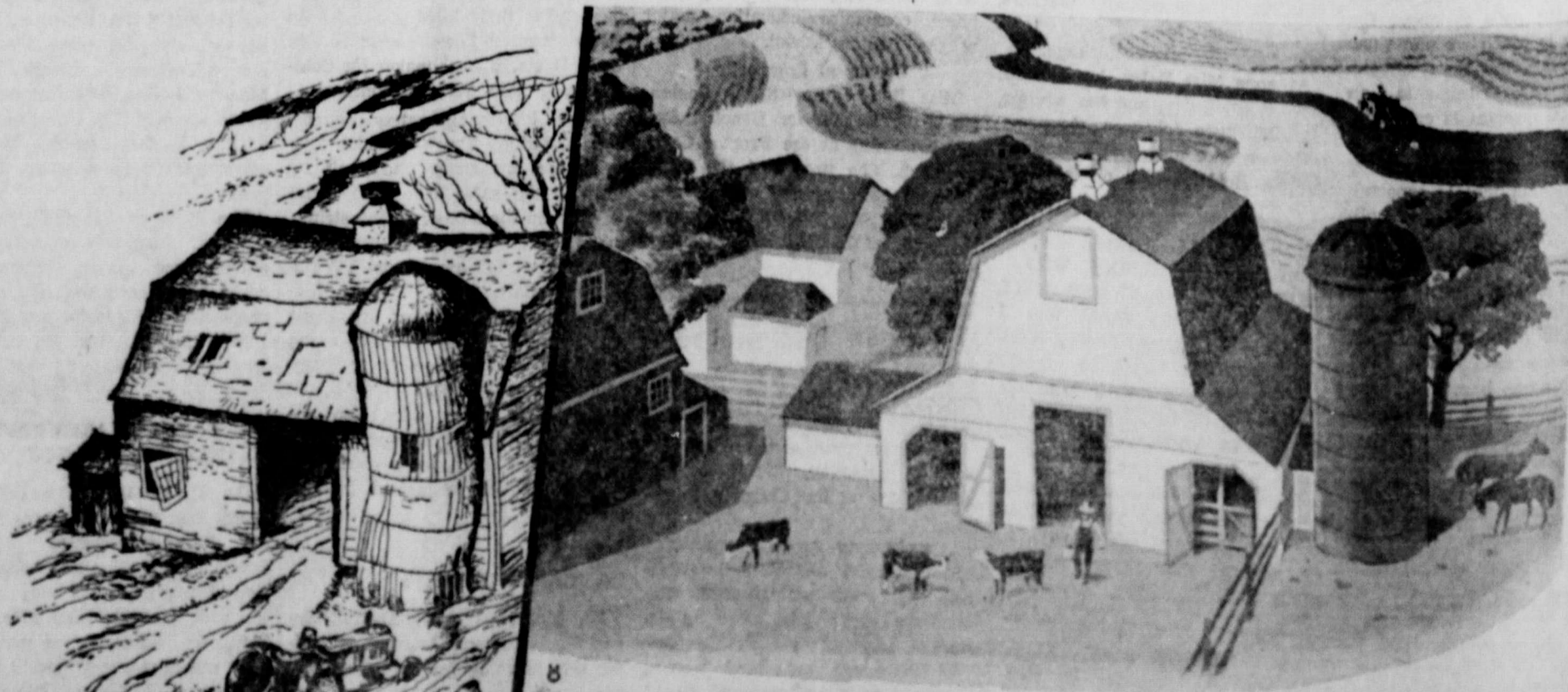

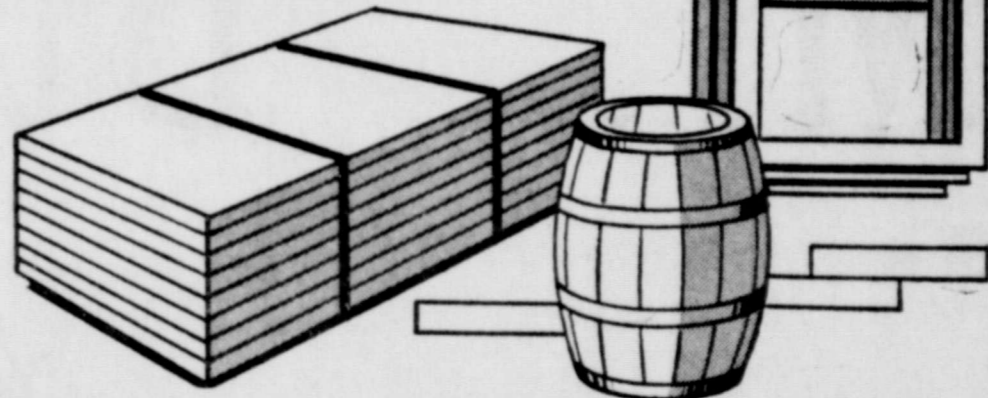

Washington, D.C. — There are strong signs that the health industry is rapidly approaching a crisis. It is already at the critical stage for many who have recently experienced serious and prolonged illness. The system by which America heals its sick, is itself a failing patient. The chart of rising health-care costs shows a degree of fever which calls for urgent

remedy. The burden of a cure rests partially on medical men themselves, who must act to protect their honorable calling from radical, and perhaps disastrous measures. Perhaps it rests even more on government not intruding into the sensitive doctor-patient relationship. Responsibility falls on the public who, whatever happens, will continue to pay the bills.

Last year, individuals and groups spent more than \$60 billion on health. This is almost 7 percent of our National Gross Product. So it is one of the biggest businesses in the nation. Of this sum, \$26.2 billion went for personal medical care. By comparison, in 1960 the bill was about \$20 billion. Fully half this \$50 billion increase can be charged to price rise alone.

Many factors conspire in these price rises. Inflation generally is, of course, first. This in turn has put pressures on those who make medical-care work, to increase hospital charges.

There have been tremendous advancements in medical hardware. These are machines undreamed of a generation ago, which help make people well—sometimes at great cost.

There have been countless improvements in surgical techniques, saving many lives that a generation ago would have been lost—but again, costing lots of money.

There has been an almost phenomenal development in medicines that cost millions in man-hours and research to discover. They have saved lives that are beyond price.

Results less dramatic have been caused by Government thrusting itself into health programs adding the heavy hand of bureaucracy to mushrooming medical cost. Estimated cost of medicare and medicaid payments is placing a threatening burden on our social security system.
